Established January 7, 1854, with 111 members, it now has 8,222 members, and is considered the largest German Society in the United States. During its forty-four years of existence it has expended \$371,000 for charities. It owns and controls the German Hospital, a noted and commodious institution. GOLDEN GATE KINDERGARTEN ASSOCIATION. Organized October 6, 1879; incorporated October 6, 1884. This work had its inspiration in the Bible Class of Mrs. Sarah B. Cooper. Its object is the establishment and maintenance of free kindergartens in San Francisco, and the sustaining of a free Normal Training School for Kindergartners, and to further promote care of and help for neglected children. There are forty well-known ladies on the Board, also thirty representative gentlemen of the city and vicinity, including the Presidents of the Leland Stanford Jr. University and the University of California, and other distinguished professors. Up to October 6, 1897, 24,334 little children, under six years of age, have been trained in these kindergartens. The first year the total receipts were \$1,805.70; the nineteenth year the total receipts were \$21,359.60. No meetings have been organized to encourage thrift, economy and hygiene in the families connected with the kindergartens, and to bring something of new hope and comfort into their hard and cheerless lives. A free Normal Training School for teachers has been in successful operation for four years, under the supervision of Miss Anna M. Stovall. The graduates from the Golden Gate Free Training School are in demand from all parts of the country. The Golden Gate Froebel Association, an organization composed of the teachers and graduates of the association, is also in successful operation.
