Library.—The University Library, room 2, contains 37,500 volumes and 18,000 pamphlets, and is a repository for government documents. In it is included the famous Hildebrand library, the Hopkins railway library, and a complete library of Australian history, literature, science, religion, and politics, which was presented during the past summer by Thomas W. Stanford of Australia. The Library is open every week day from 8:30 a.m. to 9:30 p.m., with the exception of Saturday, when it closes at 5 p.m.

Thomas W. Stanford has given one half of the money left him by Senator Stanford to be used in erecting a library building.
