

opportunity to make good his deficiency at a future examination. A minus [-] means failure. If received for an entrance examination no credits will be allowed for that subject. If received by a special student as a semester mark in his major subject, he is considered as dropped from the University. In other cases the work must be taken again in class, before credit can be given. Students "conditioned" or marked "failed" in a subject in the semester immediately preceding, may not take more than fifteen hours except by special permission of the faculty.

Museum.—The Museum, a concrete building 313x156 feet, including wings, is situated a quarter of a mile from the quadrangle and to the west of University avenue. The vestibule is 45x56 feet and 70 feet high, faced with marble. The Museum contains the archaeological and art collections of the University. Admission is free to students; to others a charge of twenty-five cents is made.

Religious.—Religious instruction is given in accordance with the provision of the Charter, which prohibits sectarian instruction, but requires the teaching of the "immortality of the soul, the existence of an all wise and benevolent Creator, and that obedience to His laws is the highest duty of man." Voluntary chapel exercises are held daily, and a sermon or address on some religious or ethical subject is given every Sunday morning by some clergyman or layman invited from abroad, or by some member of the faculty.

The University Chapel Union attempts to organize the religious forces of the University without defining beliefs, "for the promotion of the spiritual life through worship and service." A Students' Christian Association, a Young Men's Christian Association, and a Young Women's Christian Association have also been organized and hold regular meetings. The Associations have compiled a *Hand-Book* containing special information relating to the details of University life at Palo Alto, including Library regulations, registration rules, boarding places, etc. This hand-book will be mailed to prospective students on application to the Registrar.
