ALPHA.—The society aims to train its members in public speaking. The program consists entirely of speeches and debates. Membership is limited. Meetings are held every Saturday evening in room 23 quadrangle. Open to all.

PHILOLEXIAN.—The program of this society is devoted to set speeches and debates in connection with a large amount of extemporaneous work, one of the principal objects of the society being to give members practice in thinking and speaking on their feet. Meets Saturday, room 13 quadrangle. Visitors admitted upon invitation.

NESTORIAN.—The program of this society includes speeches, debates, and declamations. Meetings are held Saturday evening, room 11 quadrangle. Visitors admitted upon invitation.

SATURDAY NIGHT CLUB.—Membership is confined to the women of the University. Its object is general literary training, papers, discussions, and debates comprising the major part of its work. Meets alternate Saturday evenings, room 24 quadrangle.

LAW CLUBS.—The Bench and Bar, the Coif Club, the Curtis Law Club, the Marshall Law Club, the Erskine Moot Court, the Coke Law Club, and the Field Club are composed of law students. The purpose of the clubs is to supplement the courses in the Law Department by carrying on regular moot court work.

PRESS CLUB.—Composed of students who are interested in journalism. Most of the members are or have been engaged in work on the college publications or in newspaper work elsewhere.

ZOOLOGICAL CLUB.—Meets alternate Monday evenings at Dr. Gilbert's. Program consists of reports from the members on observations made in the field. Meetings open to all students.

GEOLOGICAL CLUB.—Composed of graduate and undergraduate students in Geology, and others interested in that science. Its meetings are by special appointment, in which local and other geological problems are studied and discussed.
