

STANFORD UNIVERSITY

This directory aims to give only the names of people actually living in the places chosen, so a great many names of faculty members are omitted from this list and the names of others who actually live on the campus are included. Faculty members and the members of their families living in Palo Alto and Mayfield are included in the lists for those places. People connected with the university but not living in any one of the three places are not included. The names of Stanford University people are taken from the directory published by the university and corrected to January. The other names were secured by personal canvass. Museum of Fine Arts and Art Gallery

The Museum of Fine Arts is situated north of the chemistry building and is composed of a magnificent lobby designed by Tiffany, and sixteen large rooms containing exhibitions of ancient and modern art and other objects. Among these collections are the following: The Ikada collection of oriental art, the Cesnola collection of Egyptian art, Indian collection of handicrafts, ancient Egyptian collection, museum collection of Leland Stanford, Jr., Stanford collection of paintings and statuary, Timothy Hopkins collection of paintings and numerous other collections secured in every part of the world by Mrs. Jane L. Stanford and other donors. The museum is open from 10 a. m. to 5 p. m. Admission 25 cents.

The Thomas Welton Stanford art gallery is situated north of the new library and is composed of four galleries containing paintings by prominent artists and collected by Thomas Welton Stanford, a brother of the founder of the university. A changing exhibition of paintings and other art objects takes place monthly in one of the galleries, permitting the community to view the best art material available in the United States. The gallery is open every day of the week from 10 a. m. to 5 p.m and admission is free to the public.

Stanford Memorial Church

The Memorial Church erected by Mrs. Stanford in memory of her husband is considered the finest building of the kind in America. It is rich in mosaics, art glass windows,
