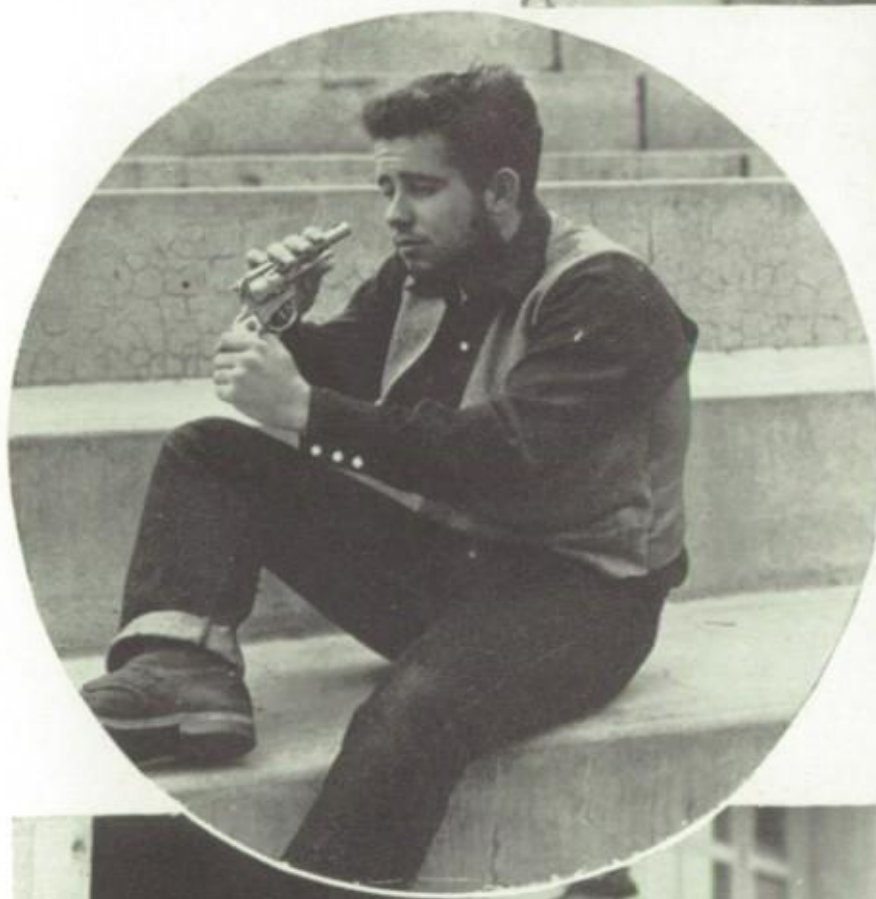
This 49-50 Roundup is dedicated to that period 100 years ago when the groundwork for the foundation of the State of California was laid by the people who believed in this territory.

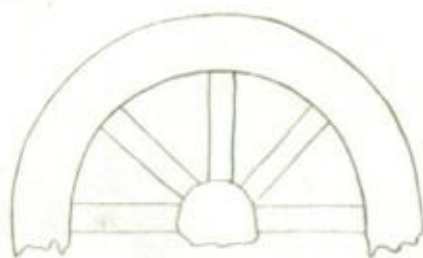

INDUSTRIAL ARTS

Machine shop, under Mr. Andrews, and art-metal shop offer such projects as the making of ashtrays, screw-drivers and paper holders and other useful objects. Woodshop, taught by Mr. Mosby, gives training in the making of cabinets, book ends, chests and the like for future carpenters and cabinet-makers.

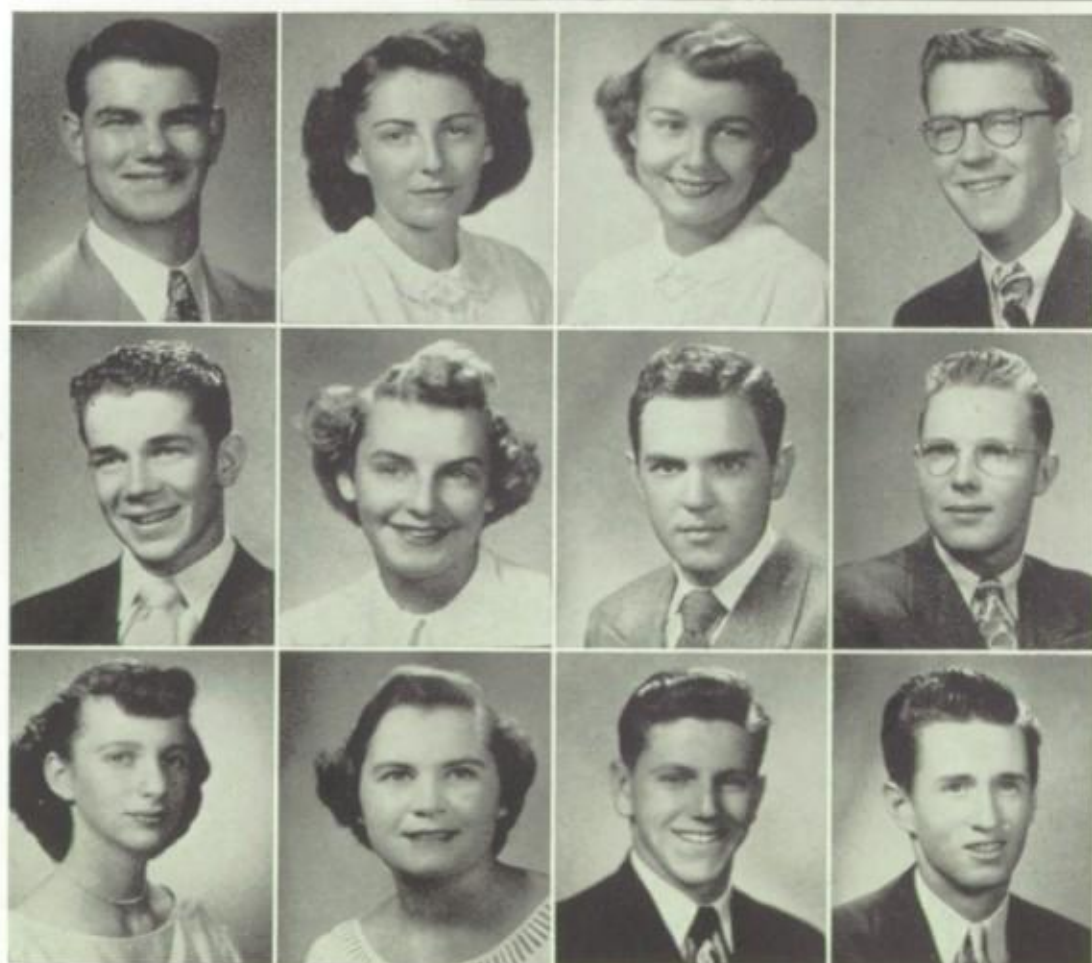

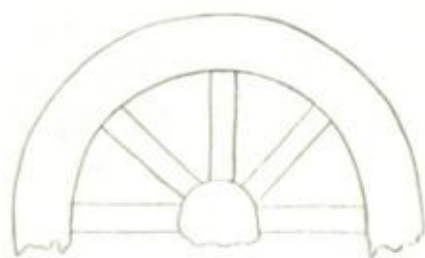

ELEMENTARY AND ADVANCED CHORUS

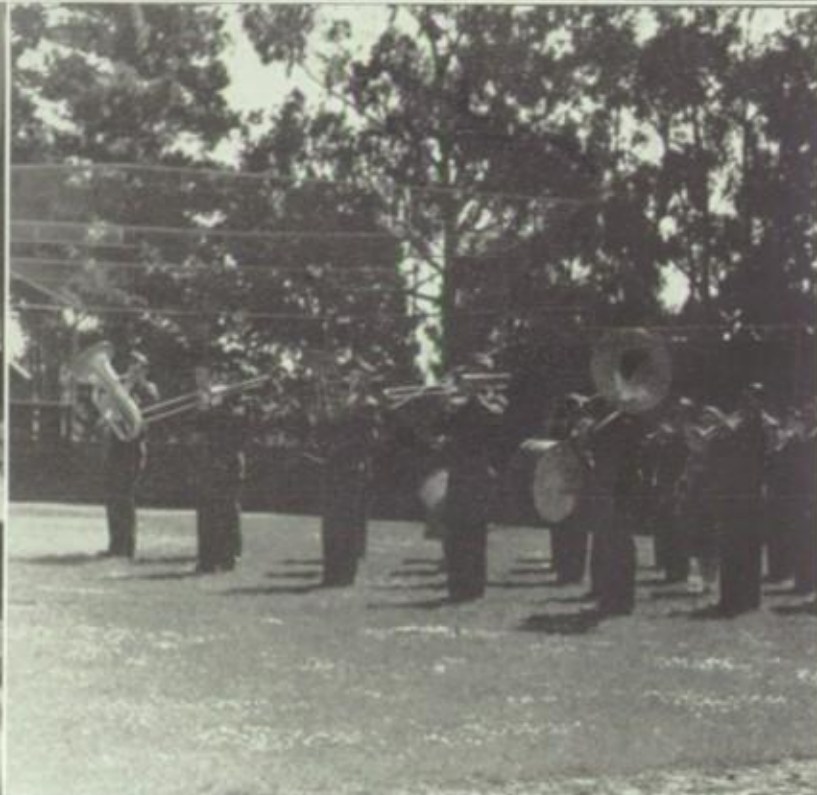
Two of the most interesting and profitable classes in the school are the Elementary and Advanced Chorus under the able instruction of Mrs. Helen Cutlir.

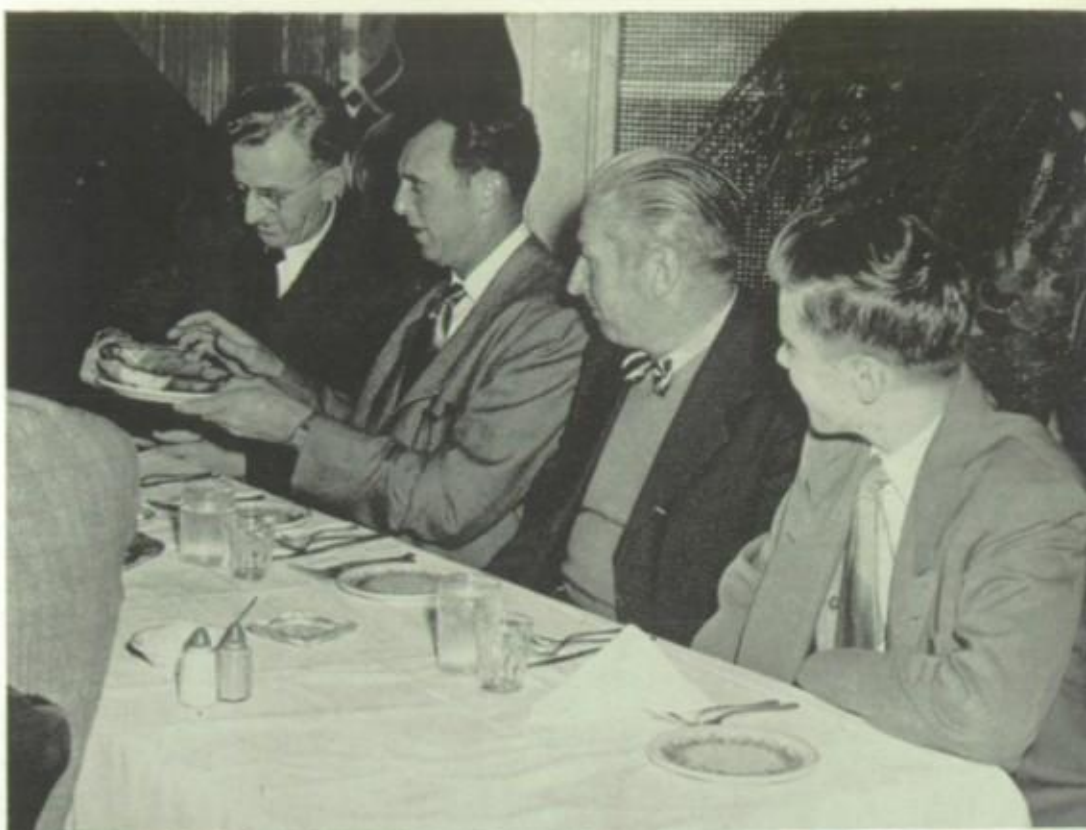

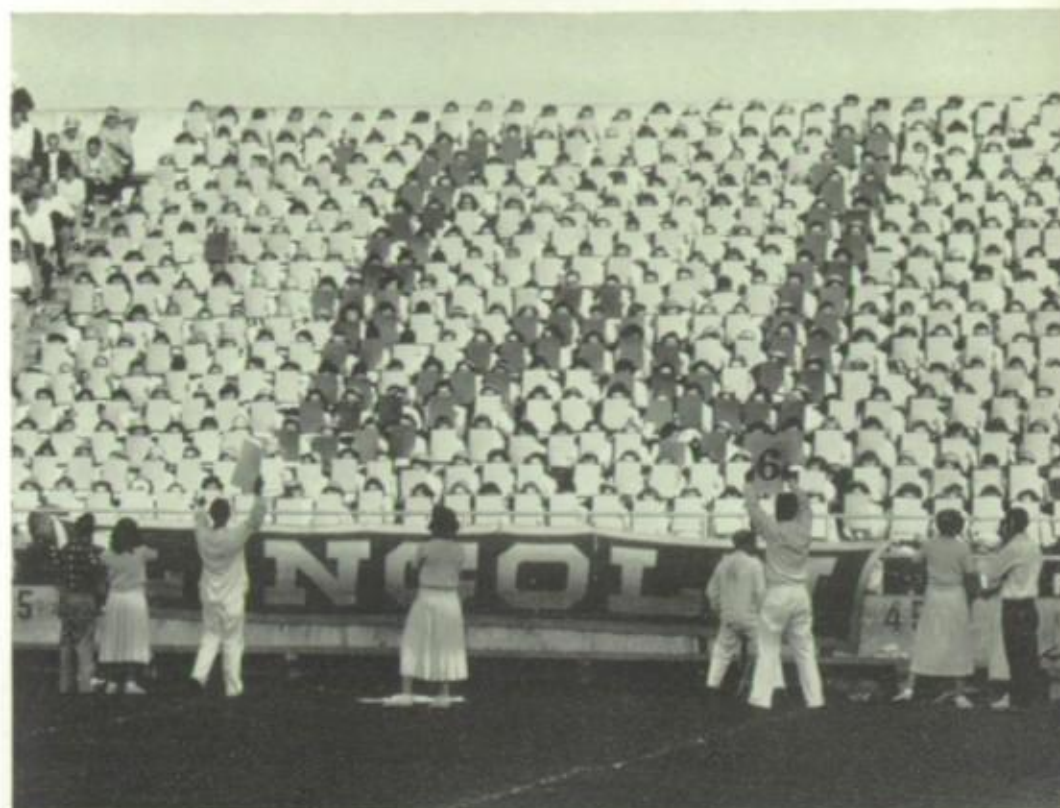

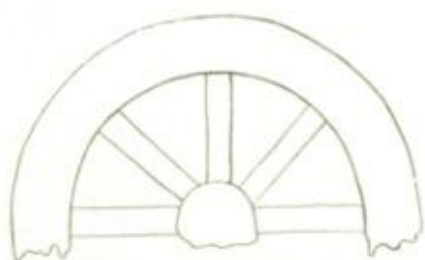

LINCOLN 53 — LOWELL 7

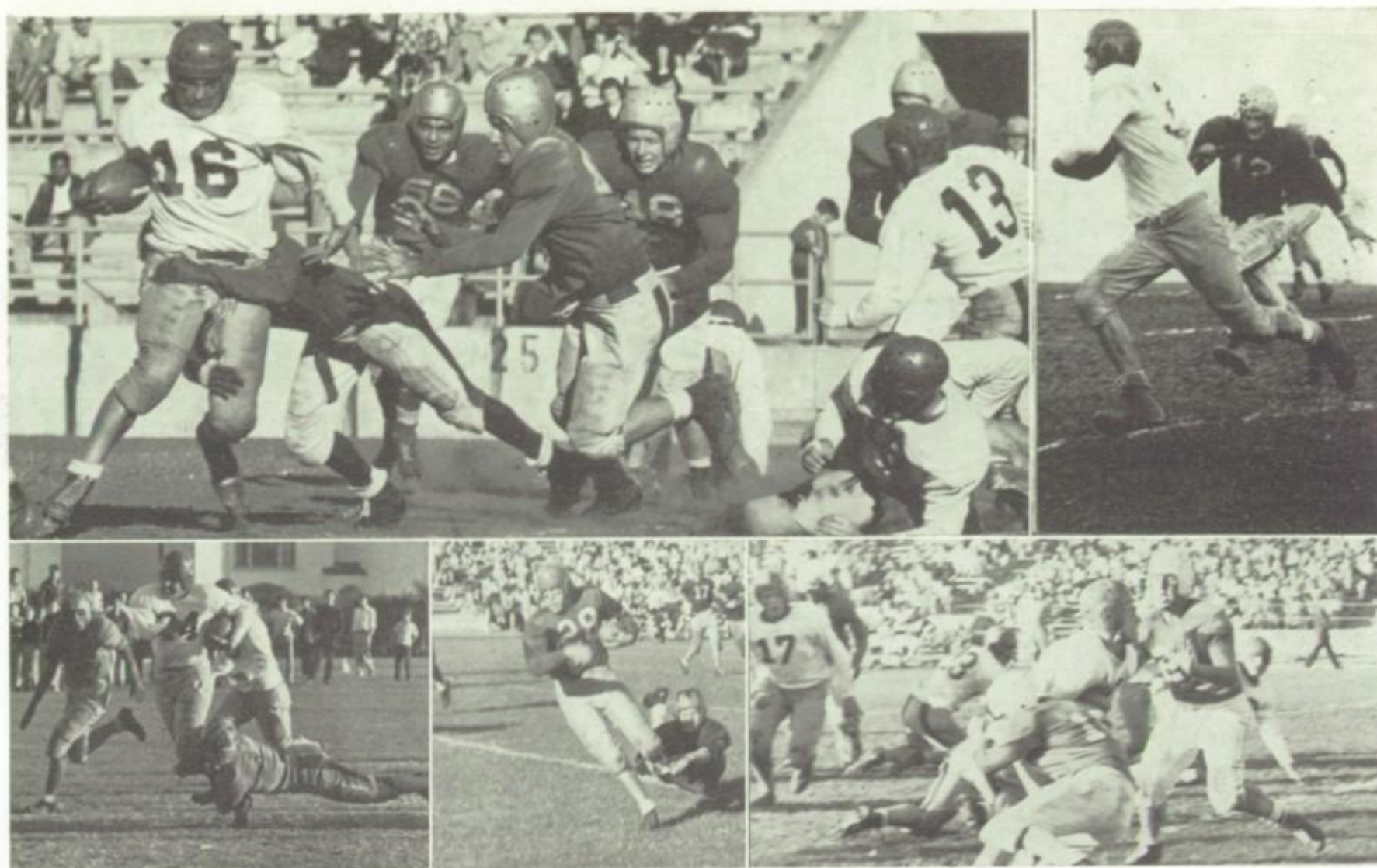

Coach Ryan, now recognized as one of the best high school coaches in the Bay area, again demonstrated his ability to get the best out of the material available and to develop basketball players for the future when the Lincoln varsity cagers, perennial casaba leaders, won second place honors in the 1949-1950 AAA Basketball League. In league play the Mustangs won six and dropped two, one by the narrow margin of two points; in the play-offs they trounced S.I. to reach the finals, but were outscored one basket in the championship game by a clever Galileo five. As statistics and the following game write-ups indicate, the rooters were treated to well-played, thrilling tilts. The team exhibited court finesse—with emphasis on their game control, tricky, smooth-working offense, and their aggressive, solid defense.

The team's success was reflected in the various All-Star team selections, on which Lincoln's basketball artists were invariably represented. The San Francisco papers unanimously selected Jerry Harrington as All-City first string center and Don DeLong as All-City second string forward.

Toni Lazzari Jr. gained recognition as second string forward in the Call-Bulletin and elsewhere he received honorable mention. Mohr, Martino, and Hochede, other stars of Lincoln's invincible quintet, found their glory on the honorable mention lists.

Jerry Harrington also received honorable mention on the All Northern California Basketball Team.

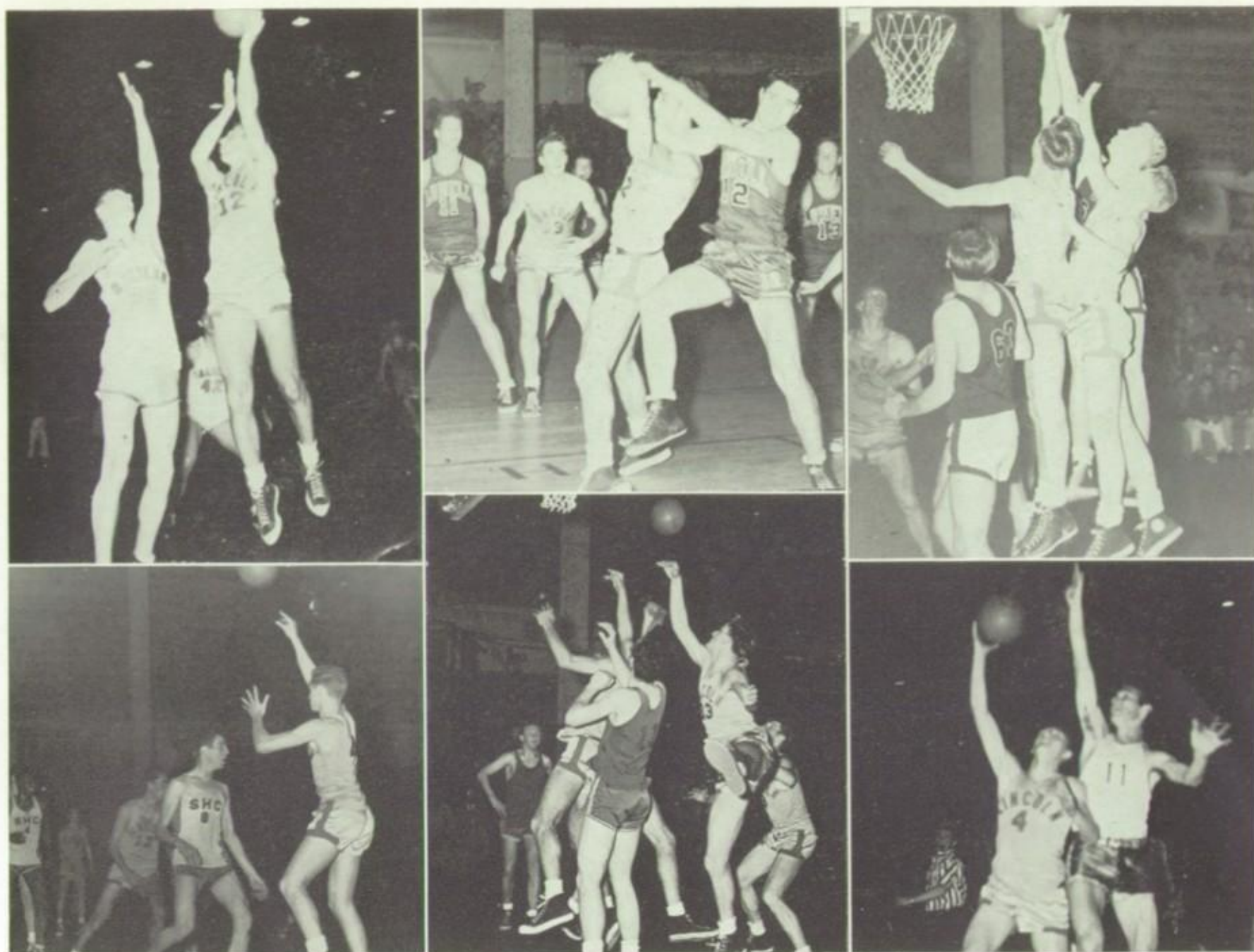
SEMI-FINAL GAME

LINCOLN 43—BALBOA 32

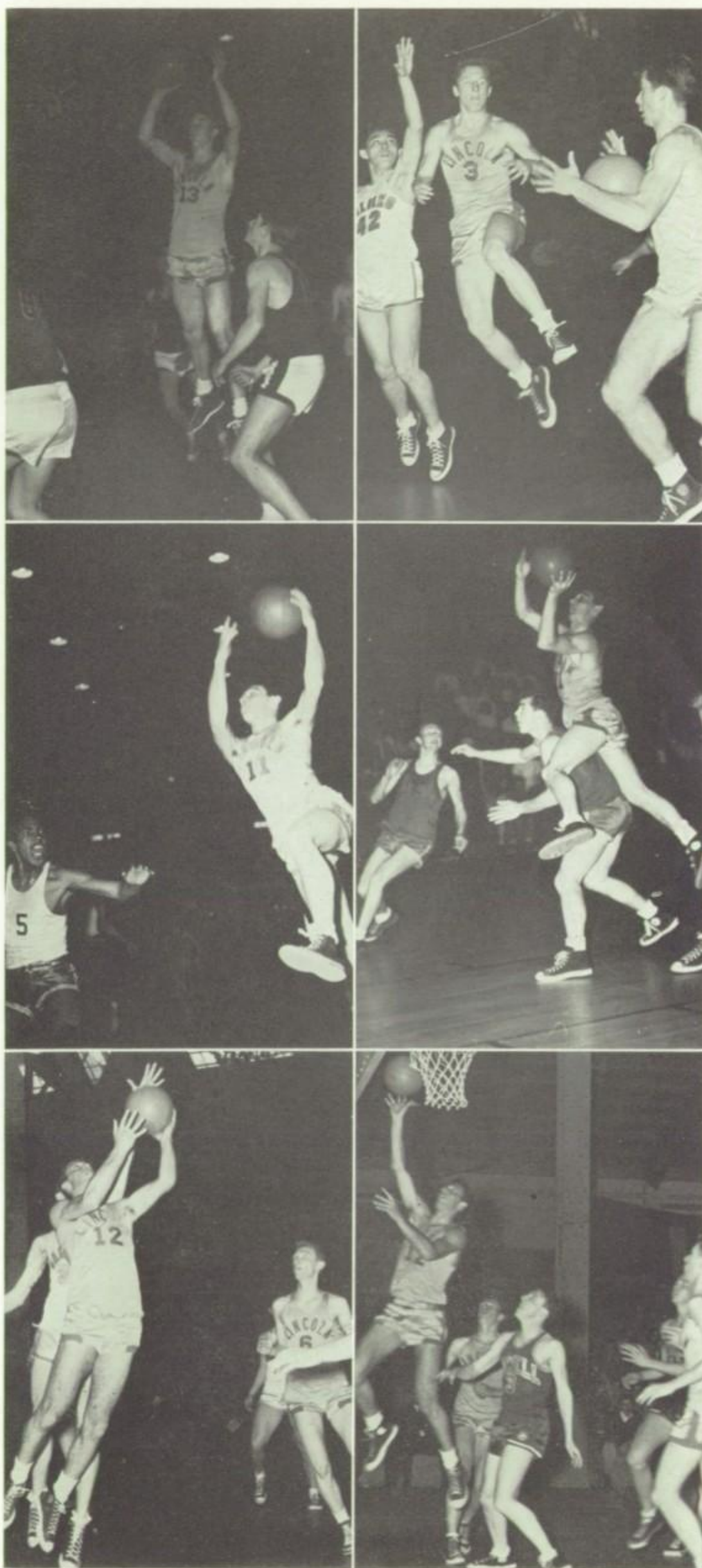

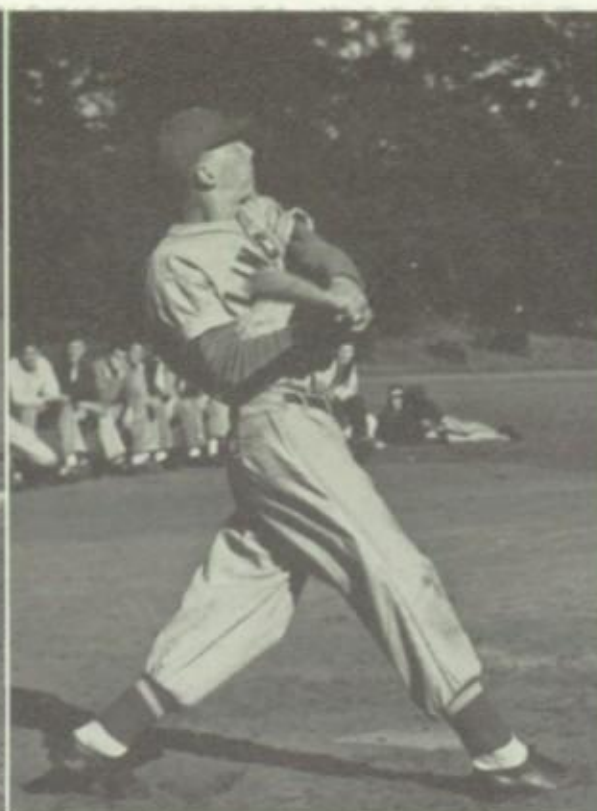

Varsity Track

Lincoln's Varsity Cindermen, lacking depth in all events, were defeated in all eight of their A.A.A. dual meets. Outstanding performances by Bob Springer, sprint speedster, and Don Mattson, broad jump artist, highlighted the Link track season. Mattson's 22' 11" leap in the Balboa meet was the season's high for his event. Other Mustangs who consistently entered the Link point column were Tom Griffiths (sprints), Don Galli (440), Bob Carew (880), Jacque DeLorimer (mile), Bill Parker (hurdles), Warren Olsen (pole vault), Tom Scott (shot put), Bob Holm (discus), Ted Worrall (high jump), and Al Patzel (low and high hurdles, broad and high jump).

Coach Parker, who took over for Mr. Kauer, deserves much credit for the excellent job he did in conditioning the boys and keeping their spirits in high gear throughout the season.

In the Annual All-City track and field classic at Kezar on May 6, the Links placed seventh in the varsity division with 14 points. Springer, as was expected, added 8 points to the Mustang total by coming in second in both sprints—the century and 220. Mattson outclassed a good field, taking his usual 5 points in the broad jump with a beautiful 21' 11½" leap. The remaining point was accounted for by the relay team which took a fifth place due to the efforts of George Ayers, Ed McMurray, Griffiths, Springer, Mattson, and Galli. Holms and Galli qualified for the finals in their events, but they failed to hit one of the pay-off spots.

Lightweight Track

The 130 tracksters, who came home in front in two of their eight A.A.A. dual meets, were paced by Pennington in the century and Auloth in the broad jump. Others who garnered points in dual meets were Kotta (220), Schmidt (440), DiSuvero and Holman (low hurdles), Mills and Landsworth (880), Bernn (high jump, and Ignoffo and Bost (shot put).

In the All-City Meet the 130's finished seventh with a total of only seven points. Pennington's second place effort in the 100 and Auloth's third place in the broad jump accounted for all points. Davis (quarter) and Mills (half) qualified for the finals.

The 120's, the mites of the track squad, outdid both their 130 and varsity brothers by outscoring their opponents in six of their A.A.A. meets. The combination of Lee (100), Kellogg (100 and 220), Raison (low hurdles), and Checchi (broad jump), who won almost every time out, together with O'Dea (sprints) and Cordano (low hurdles) made the twenties a well balanced, powerful squad.

The "midget tracksters" won second place honors in the All-City with a total of 17½ points and with a few breaks might have won top honors. Kellogg (220) and the 880 relay team each racked up 5 points for their first place efforts, while Hall's second in the century and Checchi's second in the broad jump accounted for the remaining points. Raison's qualifying effort in the hurdles was also noteworthy. Due credit belongs to Mr. P. J. Prinz, who once again took over the coaching of lightweight track.

In the closing show of the season the Links fought hard against Mission only to lose a close one by a heartbreaking score of 1-0.

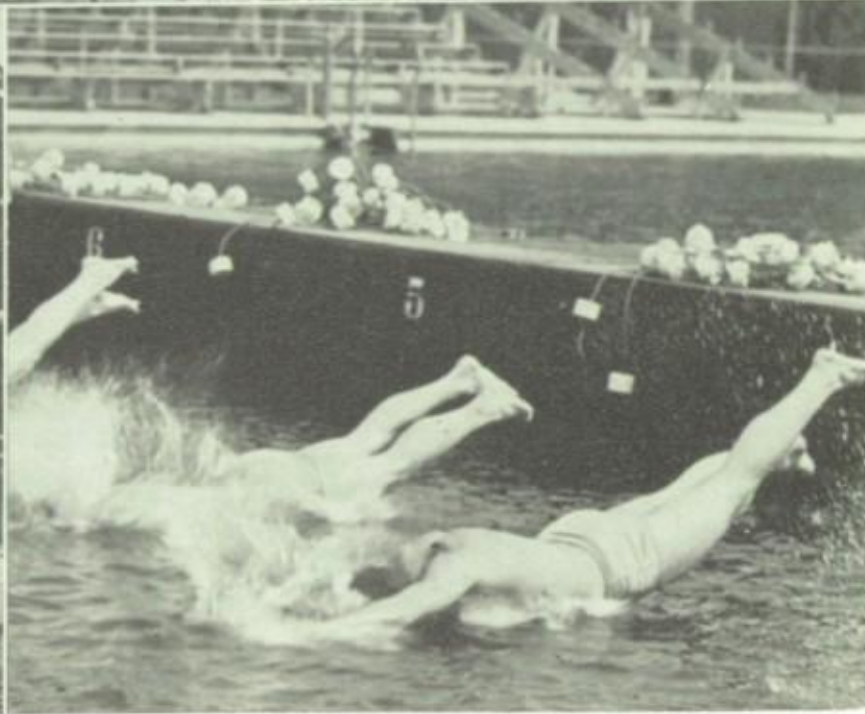

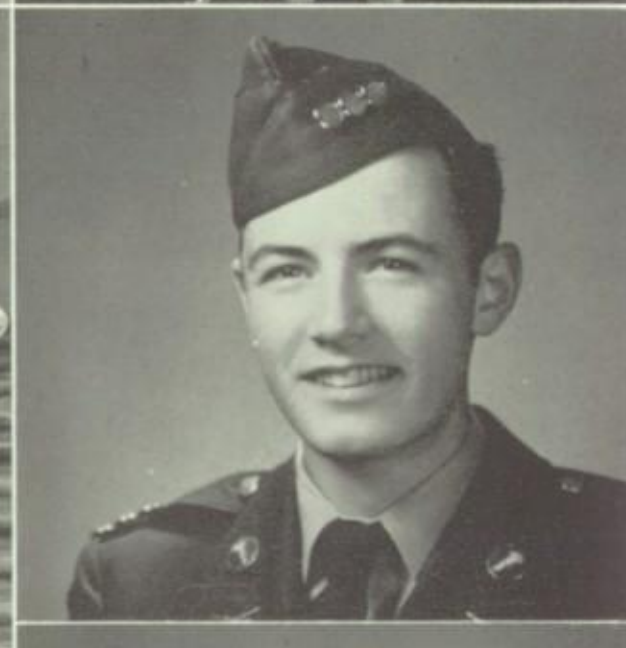


Lincoln's R.O.T.C.

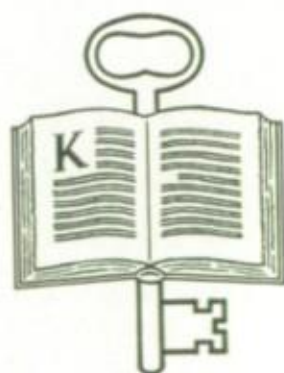

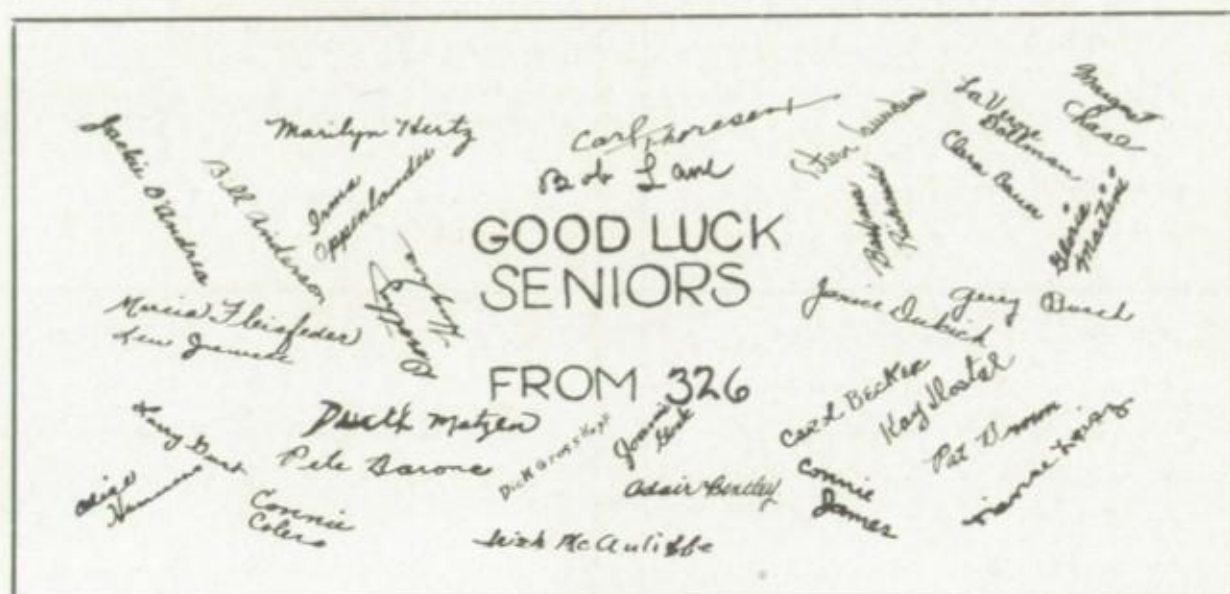
