With the pre-game hand-shake completed, the toss of a coin and the game is on. The bench-warmers root for the team on the field, and for a chance to become heroes themselves.


Winning seven encounters, tying one, and losing two, the 1935 edition of the Balboa Varsity presented itself as a formidable foe, and finished higher in A.A.A. standings than any previous Buccaneer grid team. As this Galleon goes to press, the Orange and Blue eleven has yet to meet the Galileo Lions, and if the boys win this game they will still rate a mathematical chance for the San Francisco prep championship, having lost but one league game to the Polytechnic Wonder Team by a slender margin.

Coach Walt Lester sent his boys against their first practice opponent, St. Mary's High, with only three days' practice, and the boys gave a good account of themselves, making 17 first downs to the East Bay team's two, but were held to a scoreless tie. Roosevelt, the next practice opponent, gave the Bucs their first taste of defeat. A long pass in the waning minutes of the final period spelled disaster. Roosevelt made three first downs to Balboa's two.

The loss, however, pepped the gang up, and the day after, the team traveled to Pittsburgh and trimmed the local aggregation by a score of 21 to 7. A week later the team tangled with their traditional A.A.A. rivals, the Mission High School Bears, in the first league game of the season. Mission was the favorite to win, but when the final gun sounded the Bucs had won 12 to 0. Roy Yuretich, who passed to Beans Campbell for the first touchdown and blocked a kick for the other, besides turning in a great defen-

sive game and kicking two quick kicks, both over fifty yards, was the star of the contest. Threatened only once when Mission had the ball on the Balboa 2-yard line, the Pirate line staved off a tally with a remarkable goal line stand.

Jefferson High of Daly City provided the next tilt, a non-league game, and with reserves dominating the line-up, the Buccaneers walked off the field with a 14-0 victory. Roy Yuretich scored both touchdowns, with Eglehofer converting.

Lowell High proved the next victim in a league tilt, but only after a thrilling

battle. The Bucs staged several marches, but were unable to score until the last three seconds of play. Lowell had the ball on its own forty-yard line. The Cardinals wanted to win and one of their backs threw a short quick pass. It was intercepted by Johnny Schiechl who lateraled to Roy Yuretich who in turn lateraled to Duke Worsham. The gun sounded as Worsham passed the thirty yard marker, but the ball was in play and he scored standing up. It was the most thrilling play of the year.

A weak Commerce Bulldog, riddled by

injuries to key men, offered little opposition to the Bucs in the next game. Reserves played most of the game for Balboa, and the Orange and Blue Varsity won 13 to 0.

San Jose, champions of the peninsula, were the eighth team to face the Buccaneers. It had been raining throughout the contest, and San Jose was ahead 7 to 0 by virtue of a blocked punt, but the Buc crew came back in the last half to march down the field twice and win the game, 12 to 7.

The fighting Irish of Sacred Heart, outweighed and lacking good reserve material, fell before the Balboa boys by a 13-0 count in the fourth A.A.A. embroglio. Reserves again saw plenty of action. Roy Yuretich smashed through for both touchdowns, and Beans Campbell added the extra point.

Meeting the Polytechnic High team in what was doped out as the championship game of the year, the Bucs put up a great fight, but were outweighed by a goodly margin. Vance Peters scored both touchdowns for the Parrots, and was a constant threat all afternoon. Behind 6 to 0 in the third quarter and down in their own territory, the Bucs staged a march when passes started to click. John Schiechl scored the touchdown on a power-house drive through the strong Poly line and over two thousand Balboa rooters went wild when Campbell added the extra point from placement to put the Bucs ahead 7 to 6. The lead was short-lived however, for six minutes later the Parrots

had ripped the Balboa line to pieces and scored the winning points. The Bucs came back fighting, and threw passes all over the lot, but one of them was intercepted, as the gun ended the game. The Parrots were the better team and deserved to win. Roy Yuretich was lauded as the greatest defensive man in prep football by Coach Hungerford of Polytechnic, for it was Yuretich who made the tackles when it looked as if the Parrots were off to the races several times in the hectic struggle.





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Although handicapped by a lack of material, the 110-pound basketball team gave its opponents tough competition before dropping many close hard - fought contests. The "tens" have had an unsuccessful season to date, but the schedule is not completed as the Galleon goes to press and hopes are still high for a few wins.

With a few veterans and a wealth of untried material, Coach Lloyd Leith organized his 120-pound basketball team. After being beaten by Galileo by a score of 28 to 12, the 120's bounced right back to beat their rival, Mission, to the tune of 28 to 27. But the next week, they dropped a decision to St. Ignatius 11 to 19.

Balboa's championship lightweight soccer team appears to be coasting onward to another title. Although held by Mission to a scoreless tie, this squad defeated Galileo I to 0, and Lowell 3 to I, in successive league games. Coach John Clarke has a smooth-working team, that makes up with fight what is lacking in finesse.

The unlimited soccer squad, although having a record marred by two defeats, has established an enviable reputation as a scrappy ball club. In three league games, the Balboans, heavily out-weighed by all opponents, out-fought Mission I to 0, succumbed to Galileo I to 0, and lost to Lowell in the last few minutes 2 to 0.

Lloyd Leith's tumbling team brought more honors to Balboa by capturing the city title. In a contest held in the boys' gymnasium, a team of three outpointed the other San Francisco high schools decisively.

Another championship has been won by the 130-pound crew. After winning the A.A.A. championship, they went out and won the Columbus Day regatta. Galileo Lions had held the 130-pound placque for ten seasons before Balboa finally wrested it from them.

Balboa's unlimited crew climaxed its season by winning the annual Navy Day Regatta after St. Ignatius had held the cup for three years.

The Freshman-Sophomore football team has run into very tough luck. During the season the squad tied one game, lost two by one point, two by one touchdown, and one very decisively. Opening against Commerce the baby Bucs went down in defeat 19 to 0. The next game was a hard fought contest with Poly nosing out Balboa 7 to 6. The Frosh-Soph then tangled with St. Ignatius and played to a scoreless tie. They then fought Commerce, McClymonds, and Poly losing them all 13 to 7, 12 to 6, and 7 to 6 respectively.

going to press, the band is working hard, under the drum majorship of Lieutenant George Pray, for this military competition in an attempt to win the Commandant's Cup for the second year.


