



TRACK FINALS

"Galileo's varsity track team? There isn't any!" That's what any one of the 3000 people who poured into Kezar Stadium on May 8 would have said before the meet—that is, everyone but Earl Massoni, Frank Hutchinson, Richard Firebaugh, and a few other stout-hearted cindermen. The team that just couldn't seem to "click" in the dual meet session really applied the heat and turned in a surprising third just behind champion Lowell and runner-up Poly!

It was all done in a very quiet and modest way, so much so that no one in the stadium thought even when the meet was over that Galileo had done any better than fifth. But there it was, plain as the nose on one's face—27½ points and third position.

Five men—count 'em—rolled up those 27½ points against insurmountable odds. Hutchinson, the loose hurdler, was high-point man on the squad, piling up nine points with a first in the 220 low hurdles and a second in the 120 "highs." Massoni accounted for seven digits by taking a third in the hundred and fourths in the broadjump and in the furlong. Joe Covello, the miler, contributed three points by finishing third in the mile. Don Goodman added another trio, in the quarter mile. Firebaugh came through with a tie for first in the high jump, sharing honors with Lowell's John Hardgraves. He then changed events and grabbed a single digit with his fifth spot in the 220 "lows" to finish the day's scoring and give the Purple and Gold enough tallies to wind up in their highest berth in several years.



Once again Tony Hierro shone in the city finals. He boosted himself from a third place, last year, to a mighty first place in the 120-pound century. Hierro was the only winner on the lightweight squad. Casazza placed fourth in the same event.

Sophomore whiz, Bob Alvarado, swept to a second place in the 130-pound furlong in exceptional time. Alvarado is possibly the greatest newcomer on the entire squad.

Ed Luke hurdled his way into fourth in the low "sticks" and Scosseria landed in fifth in the eight-pound shot put in the 130-pound division.

Felix Duag dropped to a fifth spot in the broadjump, while the 120-pound relay quartet of Hierro, Hadlich, Suen, and Casazza went unplaced in the finals.







Diamond Demons of '43



Baseball Champions Again

Coach Ras Johnson's "hitless wonders" marched on to capture their third consecutive A.A.A. pennant on May 21 when stringy Art Sheehan mowed down the powerful Sacred Heart nine, 5-0, to win his fourth

straight shut-out of the '43 campaign.

Prior to the Sacred Heart title-clincher, the Lions were in the midst of one of the tightest championship races in many years. (Four clubs were within a mathematical chance of winning the crown until the Lions beat Sacred Heart on the last day of the regular season.) Consequently, the road to victory was long, narrow, and difficult for the Galileans; but they took everything in stride, capitalized on their "breaks"—both good and bad—and as a reward retained their title as the "Kings of the Diamond."

The rugged road to the championship was opened with Lowell on April 6. It took George Cirelli's booming triple in the top-half of the seventh to start the locals rolling toward victory and another flag. The rally resulted in a home team win, 4 to 1, with Sheehan the

winning pitcher.

The Lions then picked off lowly George Washington, 5 to 1. All-city outfielder Peter Lommori took to the hill and twirled the win.

With Lommori handling the pitching chores again, the champs exploded with their finest batting splurge of the season when they slugged the Lincolns into oblivion, 11 to 1. Irwin Semple hurled the final three frames and allowed the lone tally.

The Lions met with their first "crucial" successfully; they handed Balboa its first league setback. Sheehan was the pitching hero of the day as he shut out the

Buc batsmen, 4 to 0.

A surprising Polytechnic nine scared the life out of the Galileo ball club on April 30. However, the home team capitalized on a costly Poly error to sneak by with a 1-to-0 victory. Lommori hurled his third and final triumph of the pennant drive in beautiful fashion; he had the Parrots literally "eating out of his hand."

Sheehan once more saved Galileo's face and championship by pitching and hitting the locals into another 1-0 winner, this time over the rapacious Commerce

Bulldogs in the year's second title match.

But with the Commerce win went first baseman Cirelli and shortstop Bob Domergue, who were essential players in the smooth-working Lion infield. They were a terrifying loss to Galileo supporters, but a gain to Uncle Sammy; for Domergue and Cirelli enlisted in the U. S. Navy.

The loss of Cirelli and Domergue caused Mr. Johnson to revamp his entire squad. Roland O'Farrell was shifted from third to first; Frank Tornay, from second to short; Dick Apman, from the outfield to second; and so on. But the make-shift line-up proved fatal to the Lions, for they were "dropped" by eighth-place St. Ignatius, 8 to 6. Lommori was the "Cats" victim; he was pounded for five runs in three innings. Sheehan

was sent to the hill to relieve the battered Lommori but to no avail; the red-hot Wildcats could not be stopped.

This Galileo loss threw the pennant scramble wide open, but not for long; for the Lions came roaring right back again with fire in their eyes and determina-

tion in their hearts.

Another "croo-shul" was up for play and against the Lions' arch rival, Mission. The result was a "lu-lu" of a ball game from the first pitch to the final put-out. The Lions, with still another line-up, were held hitless for six frames, and the Bears only gathered a single themselves. Then that 'lucky seventh," "as they calls it," arrived. Mission first threatened to puncture the home plate when Vick doubled to right. But Sheehan settled down and retired the side before any further damage could be afflicted.

The Lions were up! Lommori started the rally with a timely single. Mike Tufo was safe on a fielder's choice. Then big Benito Piazzale slammed Lommori across the platter with the winning run. Final score: Galileo 1, Mission 0.

The finale was a cinch, for Sheehan tossed another goose-egg and the boys obliged by punching home five markers. The Purple and Gold's victory, coupled with Balboa's 5 to 6 loss to Mission, enabled the North Beachers to remain sole possessors of the A.A.A. flag.

Sheehan was accredited with five wins and no losses. Four of his hurling triumphs were shut-outs, and they were against the four too teams in the league: Balboa, Commerce, Mission, and Sacred Heart. Furthermore, Sheehan, in his three-year career, hurled seventeen league wins for the Purple and Gold, with only one defeat. His record stands as the greatest three-year pitching feat in San Francisco prep baseball history. Enough can't be said about this superb twirler and his incredible record.


Besides his normal duties in center field, Lommori took to the mound four times, winning thrice, and played first base after Cirelli's entrance into the Navy. An all-city for three years, Lommori completed his sports career at Galileo by batting an astounding .458 clip this year.


Gordon (Slick) Jones, left fielder, hit .349; Domergue, 286; O'Farrell, .240; Tornay, keystone ace, .222; Cirelli, .158; Tufo, .105; sophomore whiz Lou Landini, .080; and Moe Torres, left fielder, and Ap-


man, right fielder, .167 each.

As one can well see, pitching made a normally fair Galileo nine a great one. (Five of the nine Lion adversaries were shut out, and three others were held to one run.) When the Lion pitching department cracked—and it did once—so did the entire team. Yes, they did win the triple-A crown again, but pitching is what won the championship; and that's what Sheehan and Lommori did . . . win the 1943 prep baseball championship.

Basketball

Maybe it was miscalculations, but if practice games meant anything, Galileo's varsity was rightly predicted to steal the show in the '43 casaba sessions.

Four times this calculation was found unable to hold water, but regardless, the Purple and Gold did itself justice in comparison with the past three seasons. To break the ice, the locals were tested by Mission's Bears; not all of the team's talents were in complete operation, but the varsity finally overpowered its weaker opponent in a 27-14 opener with Art Sheehan tallying 12 points.

The next game was certainly a miscalculation of the first water; Washington's Eagles swooped down on the unsuspecting Galileo Lion and put the bird on him before the scrappy Lion was able to get hold of himself or the winged foe. The 19-0 half-time score finally evolved into a 24-15 plastering.

A trio of varsities—Poly, Commerce, and Lincoln—were the objects of the wratch which had to be vented on some team, luckily spread out among three outfits.

On January 21, Poly had its creditable 19th straight victory sheet torn down in a see-saw battle which terminated with everyone on his feet, mouths open, and either too happy to shout or too sad to speak and wondering at the 28-27 score. Commerce was next in line, and no less luck befell the cagey Bulldogs; but considering their rating, they gave the locals more than an even battle which wound up with the Galileans taking a 22-15 decision. Lincoln's game with the Lions proved fatal to the Mustangs, but the game was accompanied with its usual troubles which were finally overtaken as well as the Mustangs in a 36-28 tussle.

St. Ignatius provided the next miscalculation, but not such a drastic one, as the locals had been defeated by Washington previously in the year's most astonishing cage upset. In a 32-19 walkaway, Galileo was fatally wounded by the casual and nonchalant champions.

With such disappointments, something had to break, and fortunately, a prep record—rather records—as the Purple and Gold scored freely against Balboa. John Garcia shattered the prep scoring mark for one game as he pumped home 33 points, ten better than the previous mark. Garcia's incredible marksmanship, together with the remainder of the team's cooperation, led to another record—scoring the most team points in one game, 56. Also, the bloody Lions tallied 40 consecutive points, while the Bucs stood helplessly by, for still another record-smasher. Incidentally, the score was 56 to 9.

Pressing themselves to their greatest effort, the local team dashed onto the hardwood with a score to settle, but the Indians from Lowell were a step ahead of the determined Lions and thus were three points superior to Galileo's 19 at the termination of play. The North Beach crowd had some consolation though when they were in front of the "wahooing Injuns" 12-8 at the half.

Gordon Jones received countless high honors on several of the all-city selections, as did Ed Dalley and John Garcia.

Although less fortunate in their win pursuits, the 130-pound division featured some of the bigger upsets of the league by flattening St. Ignatius 25-20 and squirting sour grapes all over the Balboans' hopes for a clean slate and a championship in a 27-21 rollicker.


It was Bob Domergue and Bob Wong throughout the entire nine games, ably assisted by Mario Pompei and Roland Sands. The two "Bobs," Wong and Domergue, were the principal reasons for the other teams' fretting when meeting the scrappy Lions. Wong provided, although not alone, the boost in the point department, while Domergue was heating the hardwood with his floor scootings and also heated the basket with his point tallyings.

The last game with Lowell as well as the S. H. debate, where the '30's lost their title hopes, were the usual heartbreakers. However, wins over Commerce and Mission gave the Lions a four out of nine victory rating.

Domergue and Wong were naturally all-city men and ranked high among the city's best '30's.

120 Pound Basketball

Still able to point with pride at their third place standing the 120's bettered both the '30 and varsity and took five of their eight contests. A grand total of 172 points for the season was split principally among Ernest Baldini, Erwin Semple, Charley Lum and Milton Harris; Lum accounting for 55 of the total. Soccer Winners

Even as they trampled the very turf they played on, the Purple and Gold's '42 soccer kings ran roughshod through six competitors, only being held momentarily by Mission's Bears in a 0-0 "kick-aroo."

Games between the Lions and the other squads—such as the 4-0 victory over Washington, the jousting of Poly, 3 to 0, Commerce's defeat by 2 to 1, and Balboa's trampling 5 to 0—were mere preludes to the "heart-palpitator" with Mission. Some consider the Mission tilt as technically a victory as the "ref" seemingly misjudged a perfect drive by Peter Lommori, playing inside right, which threw, by shear impact, the Bear's goalie in back of the goal line. Vengeance was in order for the furious locals, and they cleaned out Lowell in a 6 to 0 lopsider as they did to Lincoln's outfit in a three to nothing pasting.

With the exception of Ray Kirner, George Vivet, and Lommori the '42 kings of the soccer course will return to ring-up pleasing victories for the Van Ness school in Fall '43.


