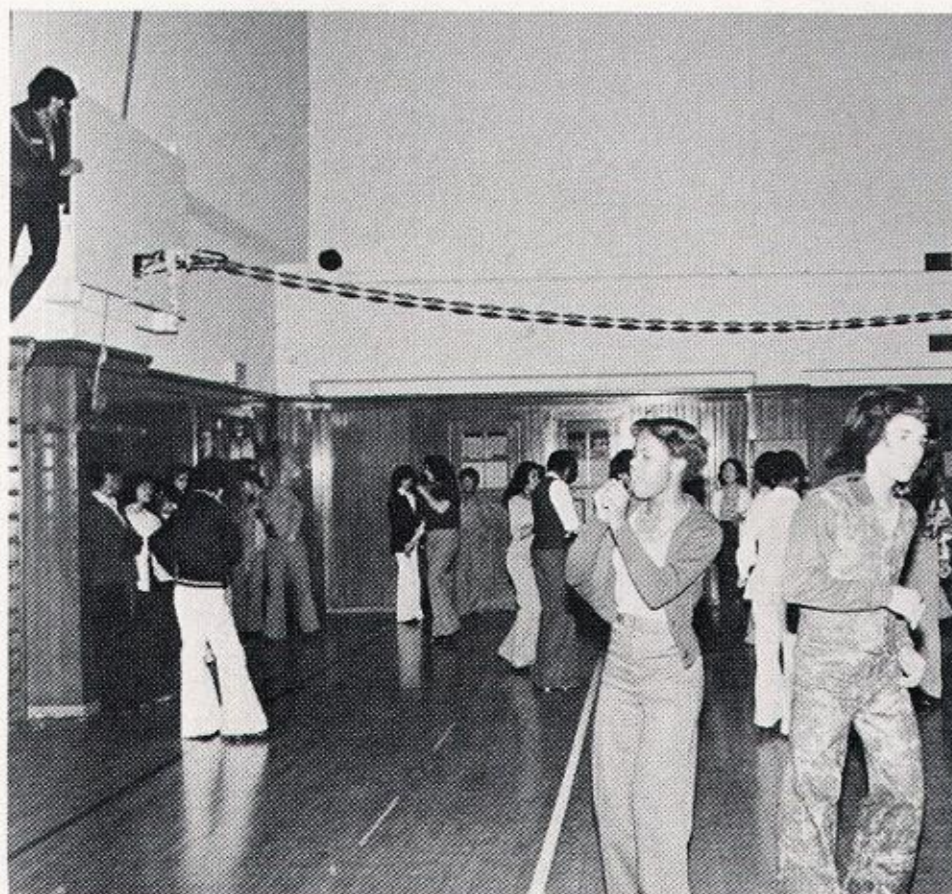
off to a great start

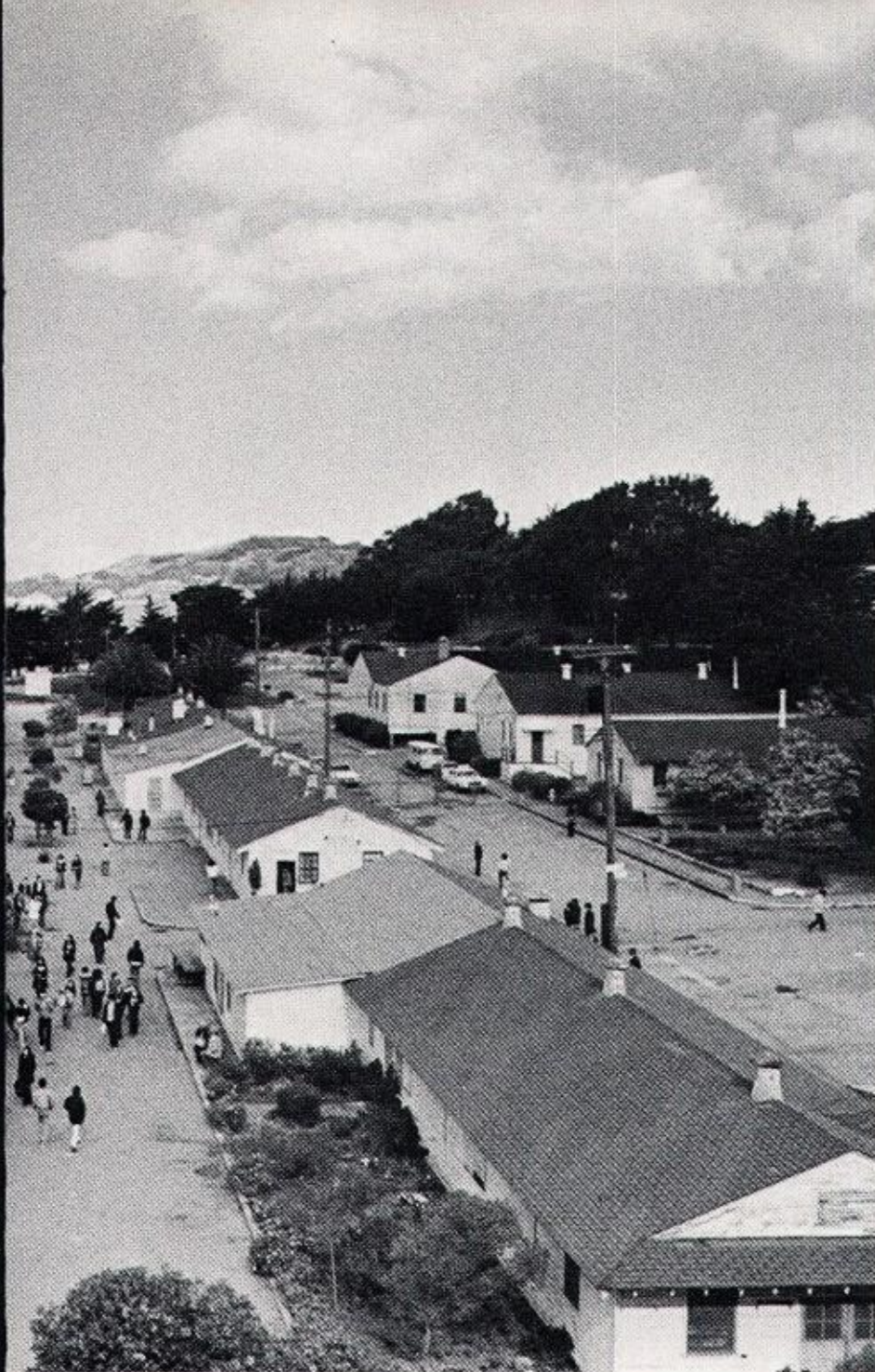


An overhead view of the West Campus.

The main Galileo building at Bay and Van Ness was built in 1925 to comfortably accommodate about 1800 students. In 1964 the enrollment of our school exceeded that number and more space was needed. One proposal was to bus students for certain periods to an elementary school in North Beach. It was more feasible to use some of the old Army barracks at Fort Mason. Influence was exerted in Washington D.C. and in the spring of 1964, Galileo was allowed to use 4 buildings at Fort Mason. These were the first four buildings as you look directly north from the entrance at Octavia St. Mr. James Kearney, now Principal of Lowell was the first administrator at what came to be known as the West Campus of Galileo High School. The first classes held there were English and History classes for the 11th grade and there were about 6 faculty members teaching there. When Mr. Kearney was reassigned to the central office, Mr. Paul Lucey now an asst. principal at Lowell and Mr. Leslie Burke now Principal of Lincoln each served one term at the West Campus.

Due to increased immigration and other factors, enrollment at Galileo reached 2900 by 1967. Mr. James K. Donohue went to the West Campus as administrator at that time and has remained ever since. In programming it became easier to program the 10th grade to the West Campus since 10th grade students usually take a number of the same subjects (Biology, Algebra, English, Driver Ed. etc). This cut down the amount of moving to and from the Main building for other classes. It is a 10 minute walk. Thus, the Science Dept. and the Math dept. had classes at the West Campus.

In 1970, Mr. Kearney, then the Principal of Galileo petitioned through Mayor Alioto the government in Washington to release further buildings to the school. In particular the school wanted the 5th barrack as you look straight ahead from the entrance and some other buildings to the

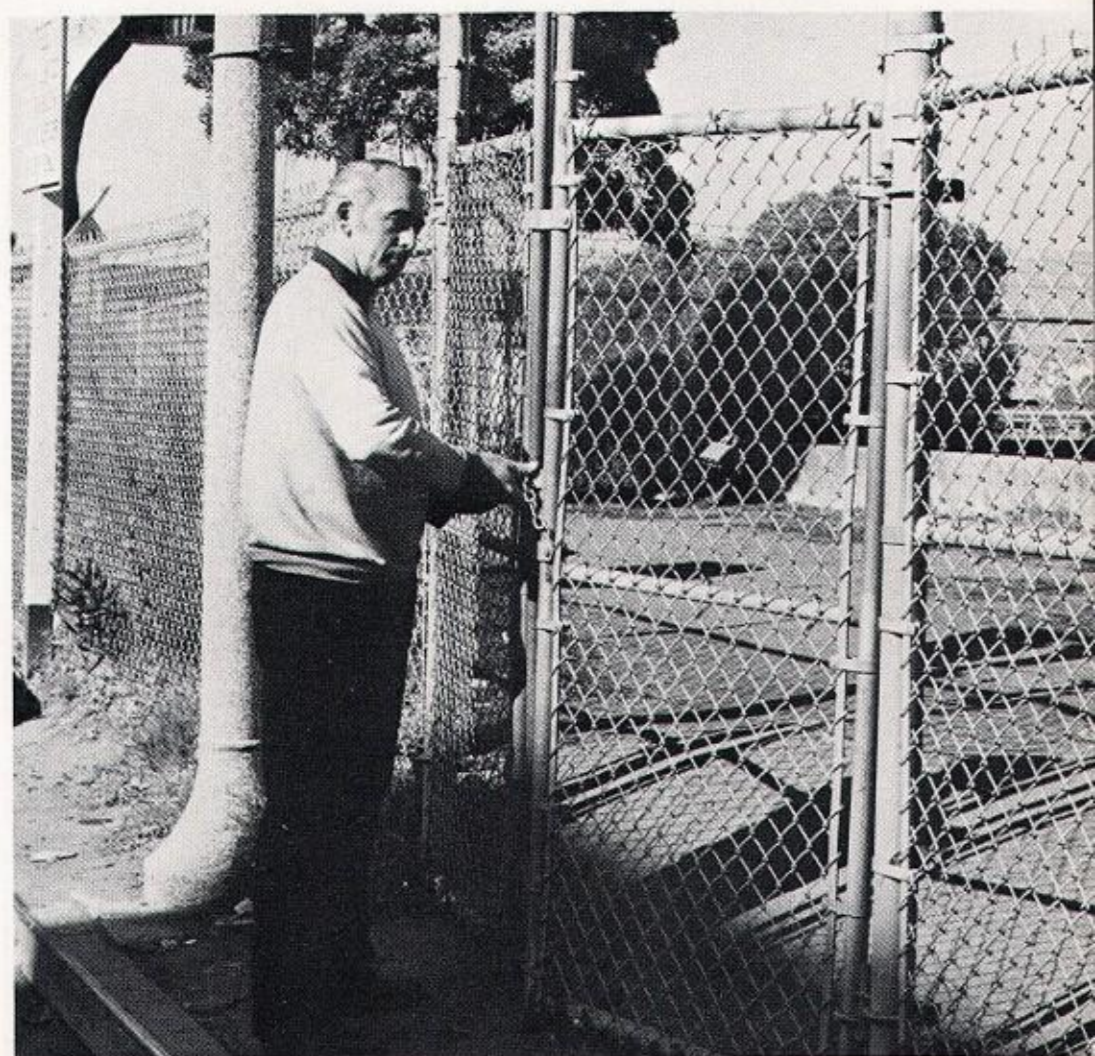
north of the present campus which were being used by the Adult school at that time. The school did receive the 5th barrack which was used by the Science Dept. then and now by the Journalism classes. The school also received the old Army kitchen building, the former bowling alley and the Post theater. These buildings were renovated into classrooms, the ones that we know today as A8 through A16, the ROTC building and A18 & A19. Home Economics occupied the kitchen which is now used by the Art Dept. The fences surrounding the campus had to be uprooted and replanted since it was the agreement between the school district and the Army that students would not be on the Fort Mason property itself. The only official passage to classes at the West Campus was along the south side of Bay Street.

In 1971 the main Galileo buildings at Bay and Van Ness were condemned as being earthquake hazards. First, the Van Ness building was renovated and so Science/Drivers Education, Home Economics, and Industrial Arts moved West. Then the Polk street building was renovated and Business, Art and the remaining English and Social Studies classes moved. Building 141 was acquired. There were over 50 teachers.

The West Campus was intended as a temporary facility in 1964 and was not planned to last very long. No buzzer system was installed until 1970 and during the early years, classes were dismissed by the use of a hand bell.

The Golden Gate National Recreation District has taken over Fort Mason and wishes to obtain the Galileo property for recreational purposes. When they took over, the Recreation district negotiated a new contract with the school district which allows us to stay until July 31, 1976.

Since the Galileo enrollment is slightly over 2100 it is going to be a tight fit back into the Main Building. But since the contract expired, we must move, and Goodbye West Campus!

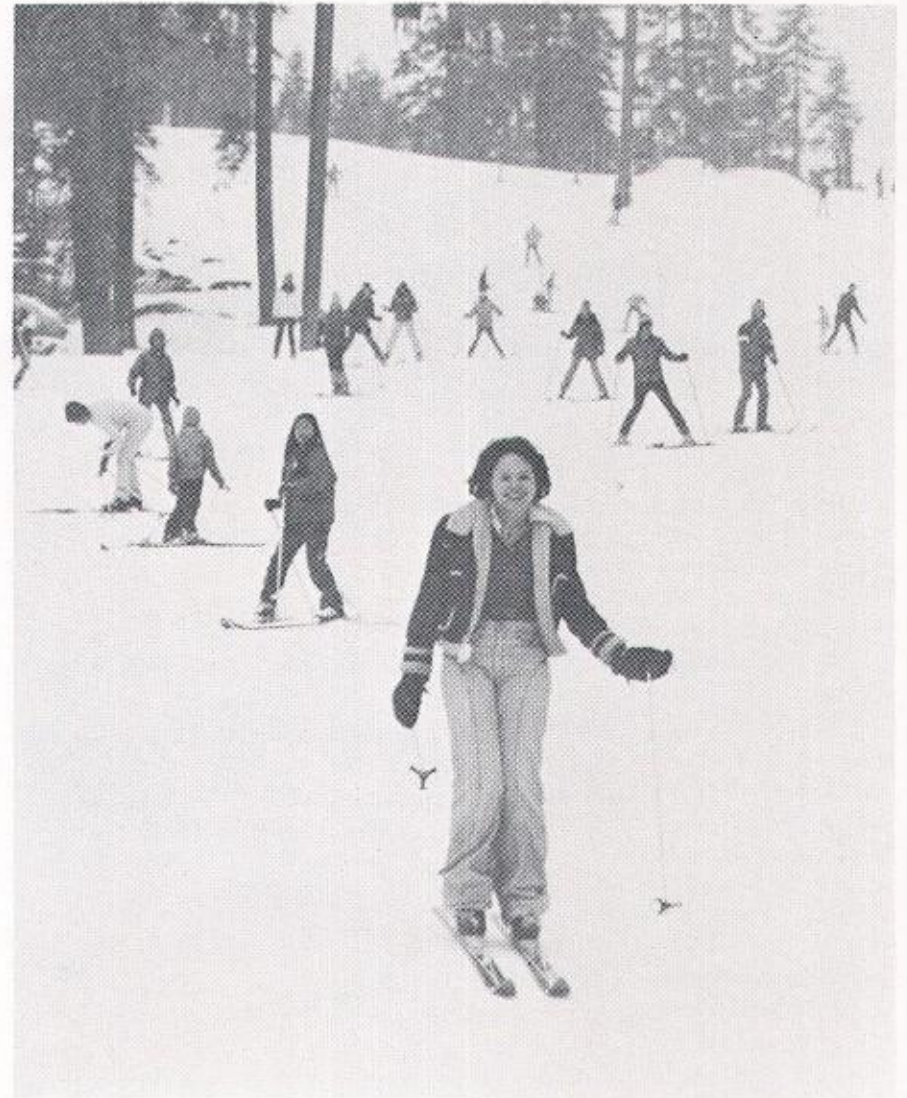

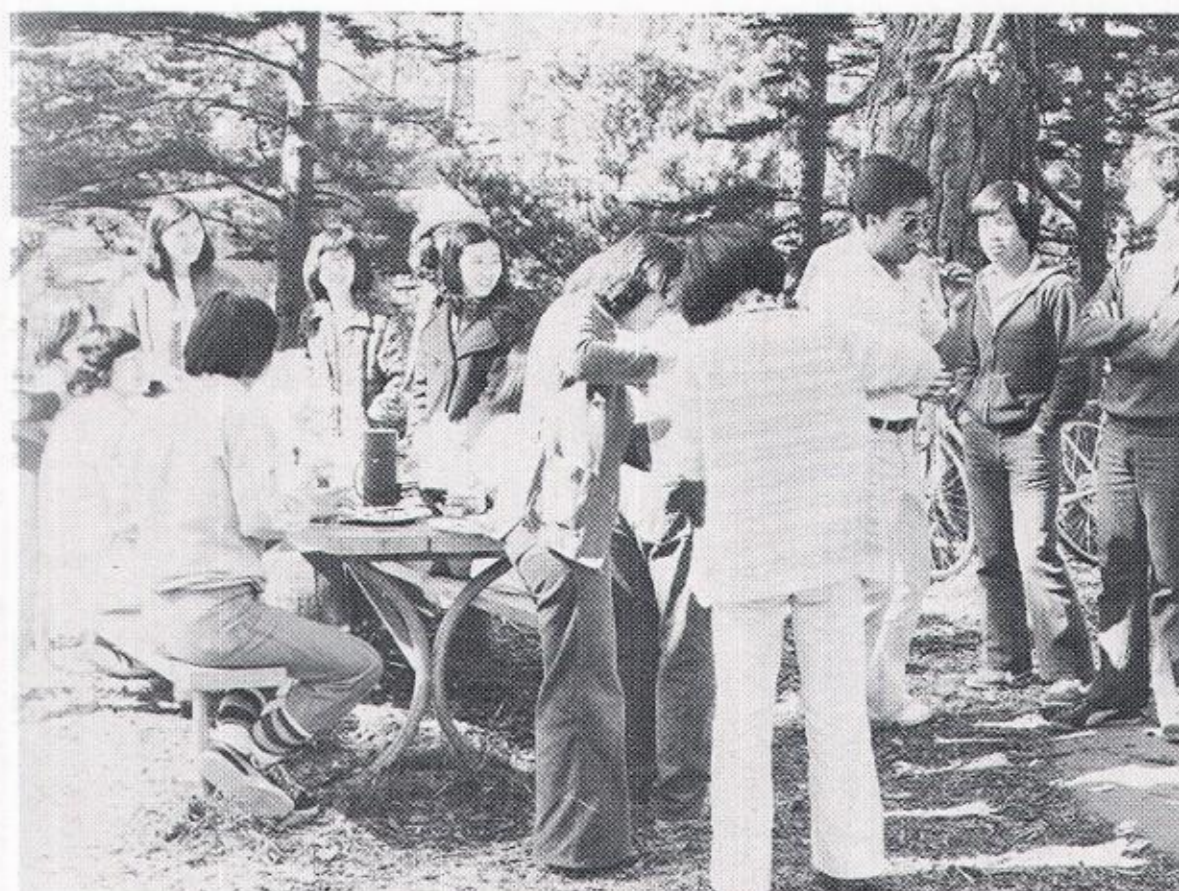

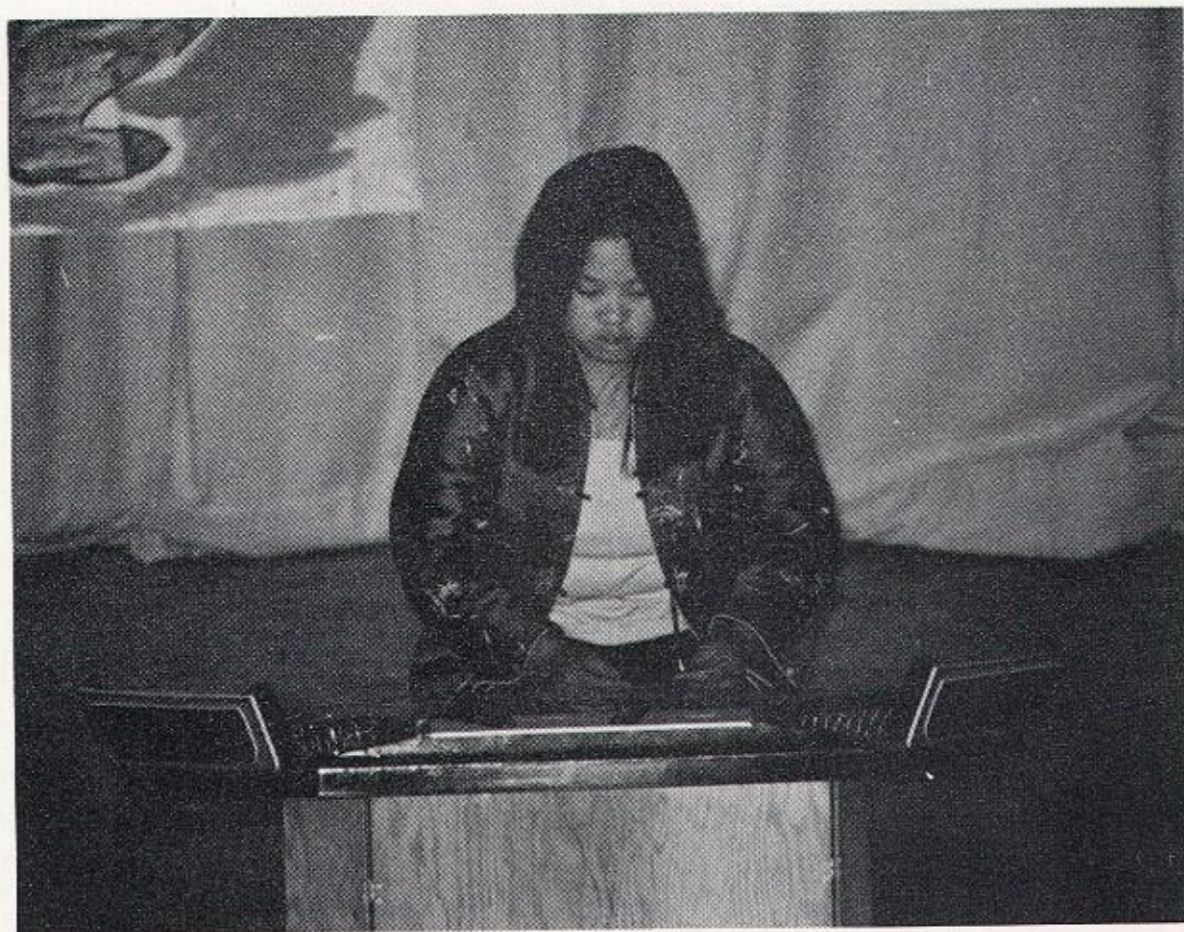

6. Career Goals: an orientation program for all 10th graders.



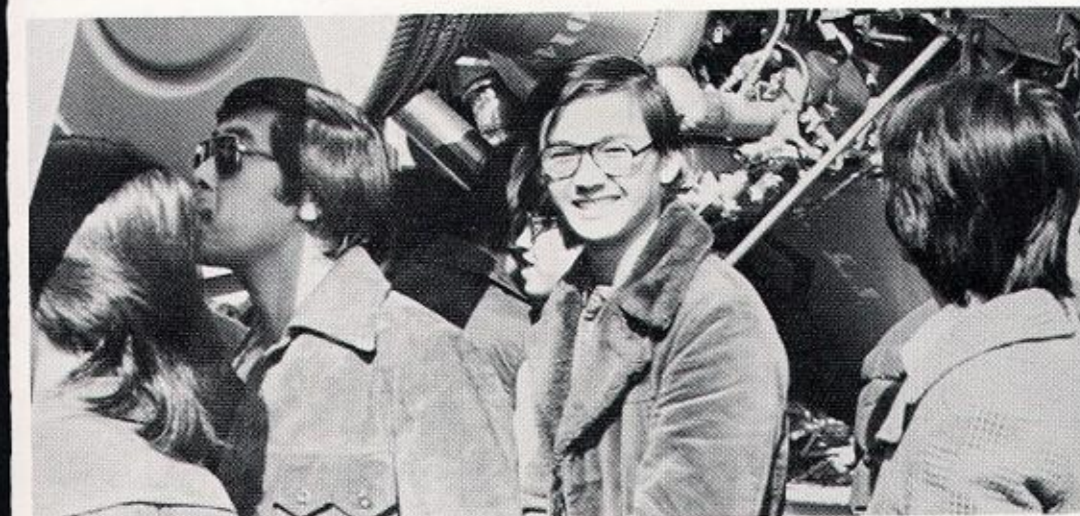

Youth in first aid program

For two consecutive years, Galileo Red Cross youth volunteers have been actively involved in helping others. The "Twins" program which started two years ago is geared to help "Newly arrived" Asian youths in becoming familiar with their new environment. This objective was implemented through a one-to-one relationship with another Galileo Red Cross Youth Volunteer. During the past year, this group of sixty students have carried out numerous service projects to both the young and the old in different communities. The most exciting project was entertaining approximately 400 aging people at the San Francisco Senior Citizen Center during Christmas.

Along with the Twins Program this year, Galileo also had a Red Cross Club. Under the leadership of Mrs. Chang, this group of students have participated in several types of service. The Multi-Media First Aid Program was one of their successful projects. Through their activity five Galileo students became trained first aid instructors. In turn, these certified instructors taught more than 45 students the basic knowledge of first-aid and accident prevention. During Christmas, the club raised over \$100.00 through donations and a car wash to buy toys for needy children. In April, 55 students participated in the Annual Red Cross Fund Drive. A 15 mile walk-a-thon which started at Galileo and finished at Galileo, raised approximately \$1000.

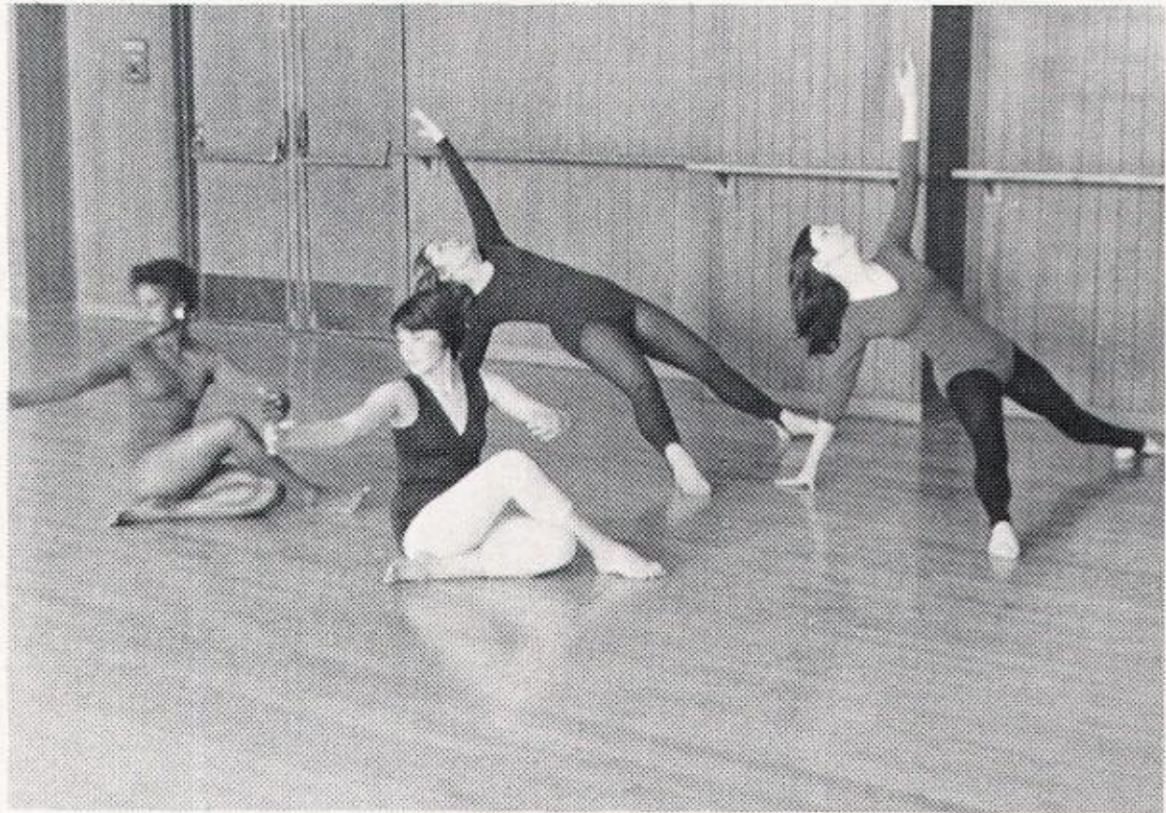

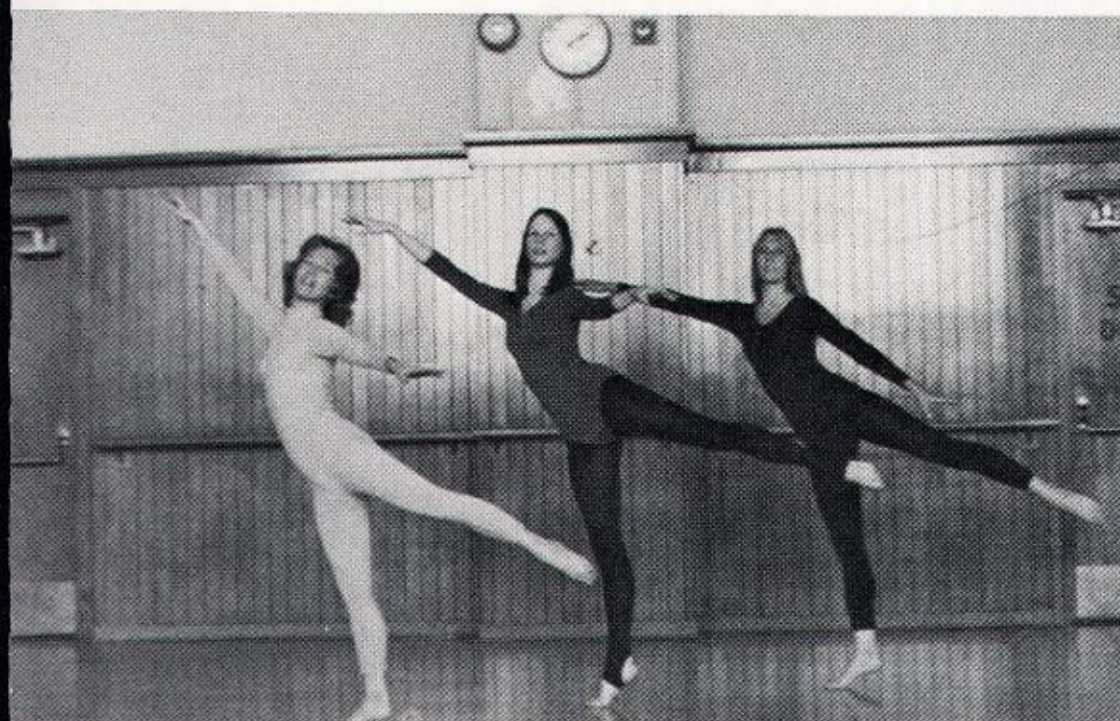

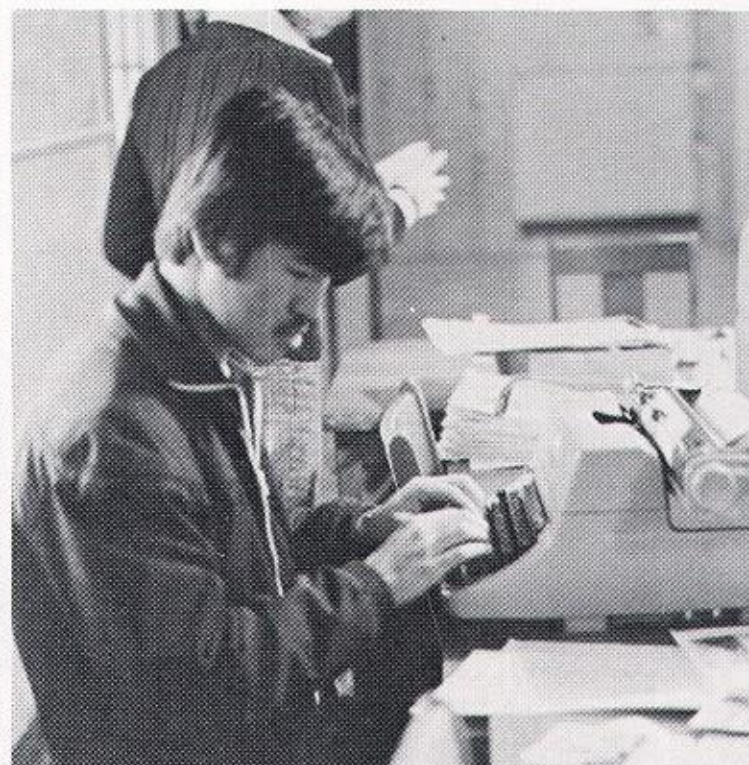

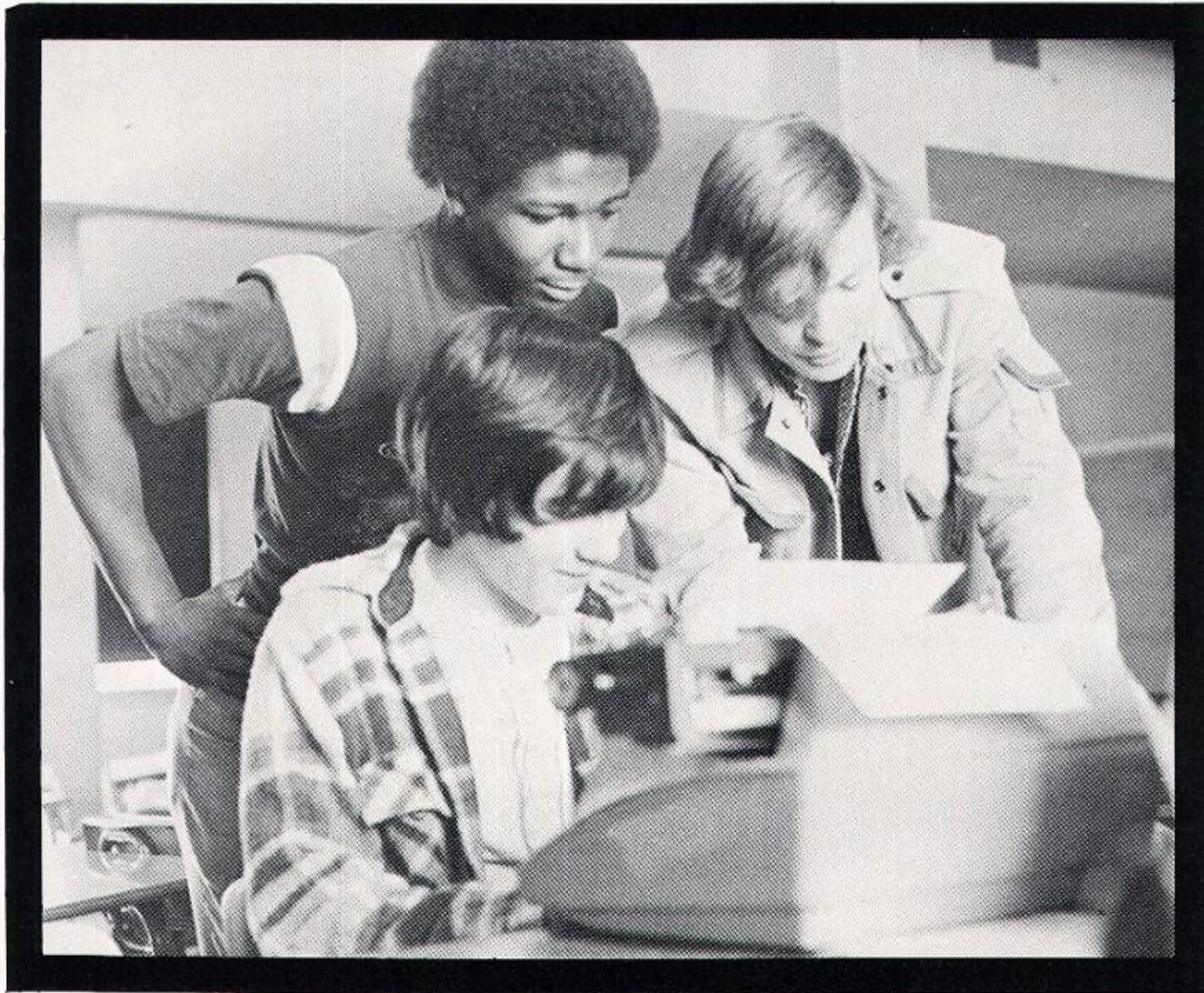

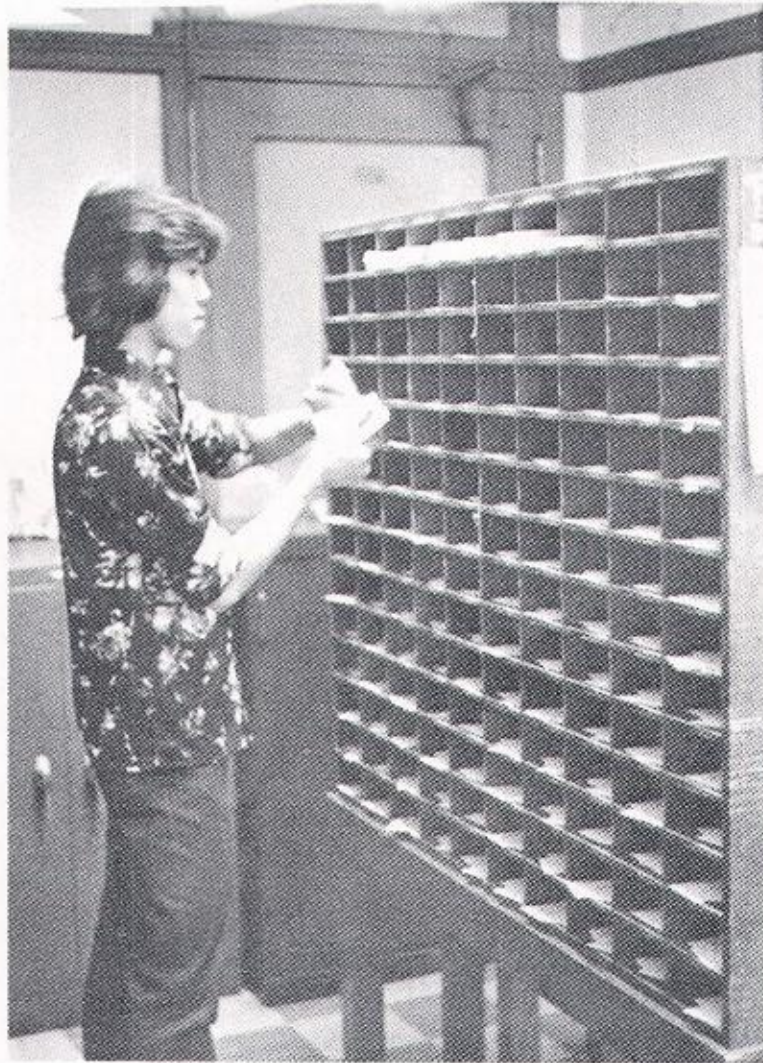
the team was winless this season there were several outstanding individual performances. Most notably was the consistent play of Sherli Kong.

While part-time jobs are very limited, students with business skills such as accounting, typing, and other clerical tasks are in great demand.

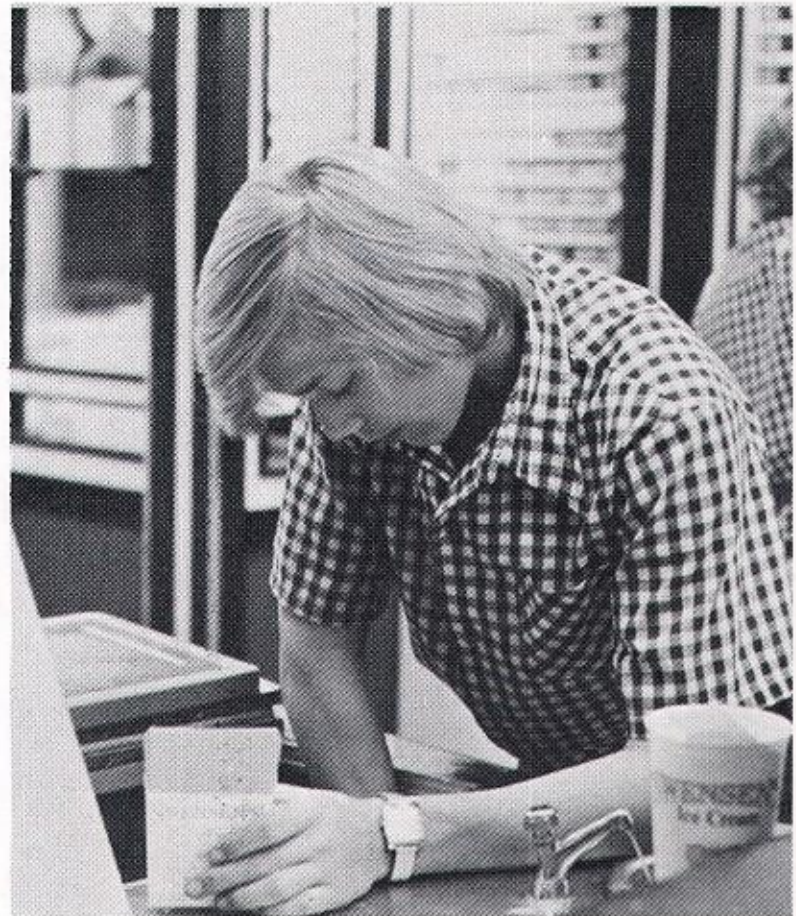
Most are employed in private businesses in the community, and through this employment students are learning about employer-employee relations as part of their general education.

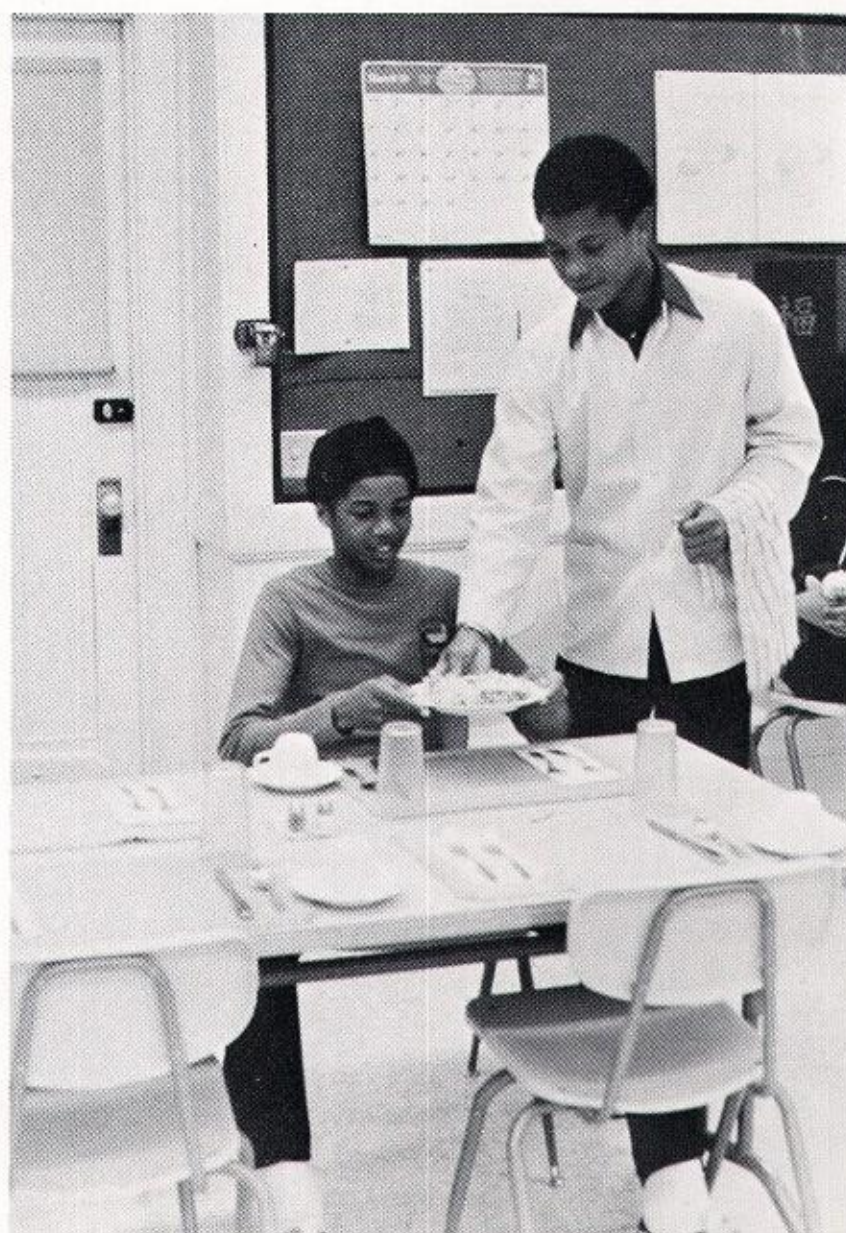

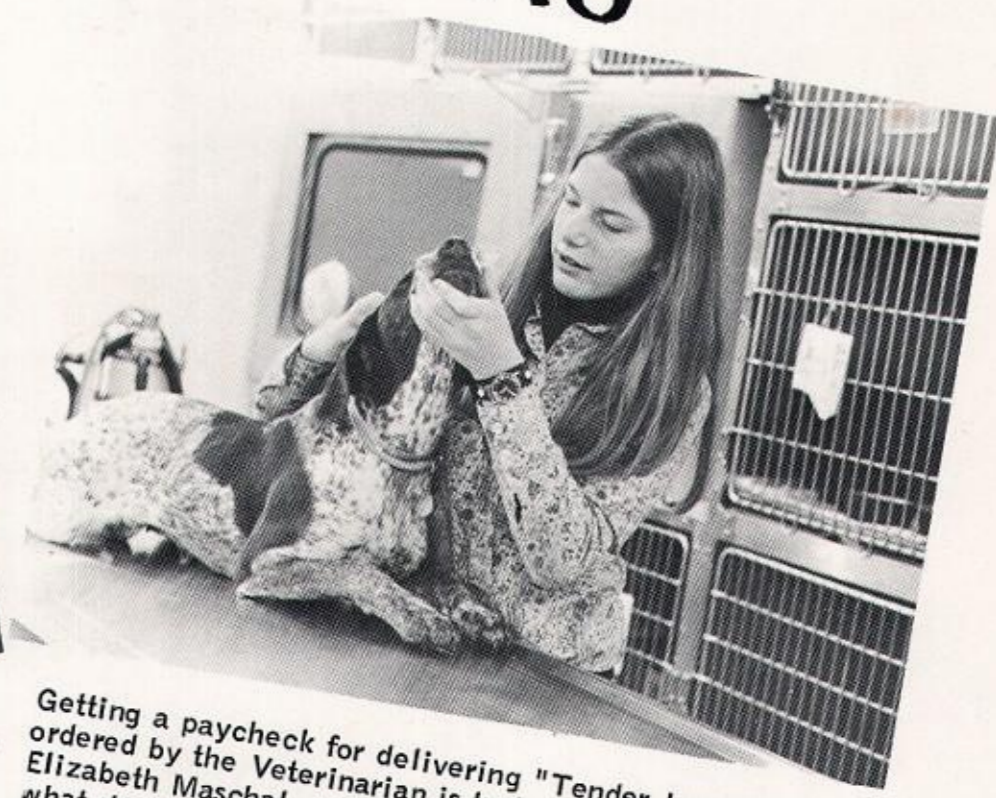

The Health Career's class has been given every term since Spring 1974. It came into existence because of a belief that students should explore careers before high school graduation; because the Health Services have an ever-increasing need for qualified people, and because students have shown considerable interest in the field.

The program at Galileo gives the student a chance to explore both practical and academic aspects of the Health Service field. Students choose an area of interest and then work closely on a one-to-one basis with a person in that field. The current group of Gal students work in hospitals, clinics, pharmacies, etc. At the same time, various interest inventories are given and other evaluations take place. Many times recommendations and references from the supervisor turn out to be the deciding factor when applying for entrance to college for a career.

Perhaps the most important benefit from the program may be the feeling of independence, worth and value to someone else and accomplishment and development of decision making ability.
