







### WASHINGTON 0, COMMERCE 9


Overpowered by a team that outweighed them almost 20 pounds a man, the Eagles nevertheless fought a gallant batle.

### WASHINGTON 0, POLY 24





Four students of Mr. Roberts' fifth period geometry I class stand at the board during one of their regular recitation periods. They really seem to know the angles, and they go right ahead proving that DC equals EC; AB equals DB, and what not, far better than we can ever expect to do. But then, geometry is logical when you look at it from the standpoint of a geometry teacher. If a dotted line is dropped from the top of a triangle, it stands to reason, if, of course, you have this viewpoint which may prove very valuable in later life, that this dotted line should eventually reach the bottom.

Room 138 was the scene for this picture. It is a bookkeeping class. Students learn to balance books and keep accounts. From what we know about it, to make your books balance is quite a job—and many a person credits his white hair to his inability to acquire identical readings on the debit and credit sides. These students may some day be important cogs in the machinery of the commercial world.

The lower picture shows Mr. Hill's algebra class in action. During a recitation period, students took to the blackboards and worked problems dictated to them. Beginning physicists here are calculating the displacement of water. With much of the finest working materials, Washington's Physics laboratory is equipped to carry on many fine experiments. Weights and balances, and everything from rocks to oscilloscopes, may be found in it. Mr. James Ripley is the teacher of most physics classes in school. Physics I is mainly the study of matter in motion and properties of matter, while physics II is concerned with sound, light, and electricity.

The shops, as well as the science laboratories at George Washington High, are possessed of the finest and newest equipment. In this picture Mr. Rex Harris, instructor, is supervising the class while they wind coil to be used in any number of things; radios, electro-magnets, telephones, telegraph sets, et cetera. Mr. Harris teaches the boys the mechanism of all electrical appliances, explains circuits, and trains boys ably in this field.

In this science class conducted by Mr. Seymour Pearson, the students at the work table are studying slides to record their findings in their books. The girls in the background are studying the mounted specimens made by ex-physiology and biology students. The mounts compare beaks, legs, and wings of many different types of birds; they illustrate types of leaves and flowers. Many organisms preserved inside alcohol-filled bottles offer interesting details to inquirers.

In the home economics class, girls make dresses, skirts, blouses, and other apparel. The girl at the extreme right is being measured to see how the dress she made fits. The rooms are surprisingly neat, and many good looking clothes are turned out by these young dressmakers. Yards and yards of material are turned into products almost professional in appearance, under the supervision of the sewing teachers.

In the middle picture, we see a very intelligent young lady selling Eagles to sales class students, a rather remarkable achievement, proving that Washingtonians are always anxious to read the school newspaper. The Eagles are distributed during registry period, six issues having been issued this term. The paper, put out by the students in the journalism class, is rated very high among high school newspapers throughout the country.

The lower picture shows a machine calculating class. The machines are very expensive and detailed, and students learn the value of such machines, as well as their operation. This is a good course for a student preparing to do office work or accountancy after graduation. George Washington has a well equipped commercial department enabling students to work with the same kinds of machines used in actual business.
