



Script writing calls for serious work to make an interesting, understandable program. Clear and concise thinking is necessary for all work, but is especially important for radio programs which depend upon split-seconds for perfection . . Striking the gong which signals the opening of the program is the school radio announcer, who, as the voice of Washington, presides over the broadcast . . Jotting down notes as to the effectiveness of the program and its good and bad points is the studio secretary's task, definitely an important phase in the improvement of presentations . . Radio is a profession of highly technical instruments of which the control board is one of the most important, requiring well-trained young men to operate. Washington, having a fine radio shop and having its own studio, provides a splendid training ground for ambitious young radio operators.








In this world of machines, of science, and of electricity, the ideas and the activities of the people still are of primary interest.

Suppose you can't do much about it just now; look up anyway. Before jobs, between jobs, between promotions you will never then acquire the hangdog shuffle of boredom or discouragement.

When you get started, and all of you are getting started, choose only the trails that lead upward. You will recognize these trails easily because they are not crowded and you have learned already to scan them from here. Steep trails are for you young people anyway, for you have the strength to climb. Be sure you use your strength that way. With this advice and this encouragement we send you on your way to success: chin up, head up, vision up.

School days are often regarded as a time of preparation for the life that is to follow, just as if life were divided into distinct and definite stages. Or you may pretend that there is no need for improvement.

Fortunately for civilization there is another attitude, one that most properly belongs to youth, to those who say, "Life may be hard, but we love it. The world is hard, we know, but we are in it; we are part of it. We can face it courageously. Surely our effort can make it different."

It is out of such an attitude that the power comes to make tomorrow better than today. It is out of an effort to put meaning into life, "to make the ideal the real" that an improved world will come. In such an attitude and in such an effort, too, lies the sterling happiness that I wish for each of you.

#### CALIFORNIA SCHOLARSHIP FEDERATION

Washington's Chapter 403 of the California Scholarship Federation has had a successful term under the able leadership of Miss Eleanor Parsons and Miss Bernice Bilafer, and its officers, President Charles Crompton, Vice President Louise Horne, and Secretary Phyllis Mirsky.

To become a member of the Federation it is necessary to receive ten grade points a term. A's are counted for three points, B's are counted for one point, and a C or lower disqualifies a student. Four terms, one in the Senior year, are necessary for life membership.

The object of the society is to raise scholastic standards of the public schools. Washington's chapter has helped to do this by being one of the first schools to inaugurate the student coaching system. Students who belong to the Federation volunteer to help pupils who have troubles with their studies. Such coaching is done approximately every other day before or after school.

During this term, the C.S.F. went to a convention at Stanford University where they were the official guests of the university. They were shown around the campus and entertained by Palo Alto High School. At this meeting Evelyn Siegel was elected vice-chairman of the Central Region of the C.S.F. Members of the Federation also attended the State convention at St. Mary's High School and College.

Among the activities sponsored by the C.S.F. were the school book covers, sold for one cent each; literary and oratorical contests; and dances.

A program committee of members of the Federation helped teachers make out student programs at the end of the term.

One of the most important social events this term was the dance the Federation gave for its members. Two students of the C.S.F. from each school in the city were invited.

With a membership of 108 this term, one of the largest enrollments in the city, the Federation ended a successful term with their semi-annual banquet, having lived up to their motto, "Scholarship for Service."







If the Lions hadn't stalled in the last few minutes of play, Washington might have pulled through with a victory. As it was, this triumph gave birth to an inspiration that carried Galileo to the loop championship.

In the Poly game, the Eaglets just couldn't get started, and lost to a brilliant Parrot team by a score of 24-18. Jack O'Brien led the Washington scoring with six points.

Washington finally displayed the ball playing of which they were capable in the Mission game. Trailing by 2 points at the half, the Eaglets came to life in the second portion of the contest. Lear, Stone, and Terry went on a wild-scoring spree to pile up an amazing 35 points in 20 minutes of play, and win 46-27.

## Officers Training Corps

With an unusually high reputation to maintain, George Washington High School's Reserve Officers Training Corps battalion, under the leadership of Cadet Lieutenant Colonel Virgil Revie and the instructorship of Sergeant F. Feliciano, has been making every effort this term to earn again the title of Honor School. Last year the Eagle unit was rated one of the thirteenth highest schools in the Ninth Corps area in the annual judging in which nearly fifty schools in the Area compete.

Another triumph of the corps last term was the winning for the second time in a row of the Commandant's Cup, which designates the best marching battalion in San Francisco.

The Rifle team was successful in defeating West High School in a telegraphic match held in March and finished its season by placing third in the city and seventh among all the schools in the Ninth Corps Area. It also participated in state and national matches.


