





Yearbook

The President's Job Is

John Rothman is one of the most vivid and dynamic personalities who has ever strolled down the halls of Washington. Never having held elected office before, he nevertheless ran his administration like a veteran, while establishing a close relationship between the students and their president. He publicized more ROTC functions and many of the lesser known school sports. He held more open Executive Council meetings, was President of the Teenage Republicans of Northern California, originated the Council of Presidents for the San Francisco Youth Authority, and created the Hall of Fame at GWHS. The spectrum of his activities extended outside the school to the improvement of community relations, and the publicizing of our school through interviews on Radio Station KYA. The 30th Anniversary was also successfully promoted by John. He handled more jobs than anyone would have thought possible, was everywhere at once, and left no pebble unturned. By providing constant incentive, John bolstered student zeal and unity. Not the least of his accomplishments was being dubbed "Mighty Mouth" by the entire student body.









Important Role in Student Life














Season Opened;

We opened the season against Sacred Heart with a disappointing 6-6 tie, because of the large number of JV players who weren't yet used to Varsity ball. Next came an easy 33-12 victory over Mission at Kezar, but it was a costly one because we lost our first string tackle, Paul Hoobyar. Lacking his services, as well as those of all-

city halfback Doyle Miller, who had suffered a bad sprain, the Eagles were handed a bitter defeat by Lowell's Indians. After an impressive first half, the Eagles folded to the Mustangs' stiff defense in the annual Bell Game. Then our gridders broke loose with a two game winning streak over helpless Galileo and previ-



After an auspicious opening winning streak of three games, the Junior gridders suffered the loss of three top players to the Varsity at the request of Head Coach Al Lubamersky. As Coach Firpo is quick to point out, this move actually created six empty positions that had to be filled by less experienced players, since each of those three men were both offensive and defensive starters. Our first defeat came against Lincoln in the fourth game, which saw five of the first string sidelined with knee and leg injuries. At the conclusion of the season, the Eagles were tied for fourth place (4-4-1) behind Lincoln and Balboa (both 8-1) and Mission.

Out of a normal squad of forty, only nineteen valiant Washingtonians and their coach remained intact.



The Coach is to be commended for the fine job he does in developing the relatively inexperienced sophomore players and, of course, on his fine 5-3 record this season.







Led by all-city goalie, Harry Ozols, and all-city center half, Clive Butler, the regular season record was 7-0-1. Our play-off record, 2-1, landed us the round robin and city championships.

We were defeated by Galileo in the first of two play-off games, 2-1, but the second game was ours. This victory was due to an outstanding last minute play by Steve Meyer and Ed Lopez. The win returned the AAA soccer trophy to Washington after a year's absence.

The Eagles now pass on a sixteen year record of 91-26-28, with a play-off spot every year and five city championships.

Coach Ellinger will remember this team for its tremendous balance and competitive spirit. The coach and his players are to be congratulated on yet another fine season.





Coach Ellinger feels that next year's team will be experienced enough to join an established league program and tough enough to go all the way to the top. The prospect of wrestling becoming an AAA sport in the near future looks increasingly bright. Five schools must participate in order to receive the Triple A's recognition, and since four of those five already have strong wrestling teams, the formation of the wrestling league seems certain.











Chorale received excellent ratings at the Solo and Ensemble Festival at San Francisco State in March, and participated in a music workshop with UCLA.



Against fantastic odds, "Oklahoma!", Washington's term play for spring '67, opened as scheduled. Rehearsals had gone on for seven hard weeks without mishap until three hours before the curtain when John Del Carlo, who had been playing the male lead without an understudy or alternate, had to be rushed to an emergency appendectomy. Within another hour, Bill Kelley, who had mastered the role of Will Parker, was notified that he would instead be playing Curly for all four performances. Yet from the first notes of "O' What a Beautiful Mornin'" to the spirited finale, no one would have known that he had not been developing the characterization of Curly for weeks, so vivid was his portrayal. The manner in which the cast had met the crisis was a display of true showmanship.

Double casting helped to save the day. Because Bill and Tyrone Hanna were both cast as Will Parker, Tyrone was able to take over the part of Will for the entire run. The dream ballet, one of the highlights of "Oklahoma!", was danced on alternate nights by Bill and Tyrone with Alexis Handleman and Nina Raleigh as the dancing Laurey.

The play with Laurey, admirably played by Toni Stone and Karen Marchesi, determined to make Curly, a very cocky and fresh young cowboy, jealous. To do this, she decides to go to the "Box Social" with Jud Fry, played by Ed Lawrence and Jim LaBounty. Concurrently, Ado Annie, the girl who couldn't say no (Debbie Simon and Sandra Hollins), is being wooed by both a Persian peddler-man (Lance Greenfield), and her long-time admirer Will. Sulpicio Warner as grizzled and shotgun-carrying Andrew Carnes, and Deborah Davis as wise old Aunt Eller contributed strong supporting portrayals.

Involving the close collaboration of the orchestra; the stage crew; and the vocal, drama, and art departments, "Oklahoma!" was a fine example of student-faculty cooperation. For the over 2,300 persons who had the pleasure of seeing the musical, "Oklahoma!" was truly a professional production and an unforgettable experience.





The top scorers were Johnson, with 115 points, and Peoples, with 111. Grootman was noted for his aggressive battles for control of the boards.













In a season-long pitched battle with SI, the Varsity swimmers came out only second best in AAA competition this year. 








Dainty Seniors Kicked-off




Day Surprises





Among these speakers were representatives from Synanon, Governor Reagan's administration, and a Conscientious Objector. Also, there was a debate between a hippie and John Rothmann, a past GWHS student body president. The World Affairs Club represented Japan in this year's Model United Nations at Berkeley, where our club placed in the top ten delegations. Their faculty sponsor was Mr. Donovan.

Problems

The Negro History Club was organized in the spring semester of 1966 by students who desired to acquaint themselves with that portion of American history too often neglected by our textbooks, yet, which is vitally important for peace and understanding in today's world. The club has sponsored three benefits to raise money to purchase books that focus on the American Negro—his culture and his contributions to our nations. They have also been active in presenting speakers for debates and discussions on the role of the Negro in American life. 

The work load was sectionalized and divided among the hard working and imaginative staff.













Served Faithfully

With an eye to the future, Gordon plans to follow in the footsteps of his father, his step-father and an older brother by becoming a doctor.


Reflecting the attitude of many Washingtonians, Gordon said, "This is a good school. A person has to work hard and keep up, but it's well worth it."









Most GWHS students will always remember Mr. Pagano as a man deeply dedicated to maintaining the superior stature of George Washington High School.









Plays Hard






