## Dedication

When the *Red & White* editors sat down to decide on the dedication of the 1947-1948 journal each wrote this question on a separate piece of paper:

"Which faculty member has served Lowell students faithfully in a difficult position for many years?"

Each editor jotted down two names, a first and a second choice. The slips were compared. They had made the same first choice—Mr. Monroe, dean of boys. The Fall *Red & W hite* staff was then asked to comment. Their approval was unanimous.

For sixteen years Hudson M. Monroe has been Lowell's dean of boys. Spend only one day in his office and we're sure you'll reach the conclusion that to be able to maintain a cheerful attitude after sixteen years of such a life would be somewhat of a miracle. He has done just that.


Mr. Monroe is not the stern, convicting type of boys' vice principal such as graces some high schools. Instead, he is a friendly fellow who meets a boy with a straightforward, assuring, "What's yours, brother?"

Born in a small town near Cincinnati "some time in the latter part of the nineteenth century," he entered a "college" (the quotations are his) in the vicinity, from which he graduated to teaching in Indiana. The call of the West shortly took him to an Idaho mining hamlet and a job in the assay office. A railroad was put through to the place and one of its first passengers was Mr. Monroe, enroute to a principal's job at The Dalles, Oregon, later to a like position at Calistoga, California.

With the beginning of World War I, he layed aside his tweeds for khaki to serve in the mud of France with the Army. After the Armistice he went to the University of Edinburgh, Scotland, for graduate work. Completing his university work, Mr. Monroe came to San Francisco and, after years in business, returned to teaching—at Commerce High—then to the position of secretary to the Board of Education.

In June, 1932, he became Lowell's dean of boys. Sixteen years of listening to the trials and tribulations of boys, teachers, and parents, has trained him to be judge and jury; prosecution and defense; and still be known as "friend" to countless Lowell boys.

For such an achievement in human relations we are proud to dedicate this 1947-1948 Red & White.



# The Principal's Message

Lowell proudly boasts that its history goes back to 1856, the year in which San Francisco added Latin, Greek, and other high school courses to the program of the old Lincoln Grammar School. In this way was founded the first public high school in California.

Since that early date and those very meager beginnings, Lowell has had many homes, has changed its location many times, from Powell Street in downtown San Francisco west to Sutter Street, and in 1912 west again to our present school on Hayes and Masonic. As "Westward the course of empire takes its way," so may Lowell follow its destiny and move ever westward toward the setting sun. Lowell will change its home again, but the spirit of the school must remain constant, faithful to its traditions of scholarship, leadership and character, made strong by a fervent love of humanity and by faith in the future of mankind.

In 1926 Mr. F. H. Clark, a true scholar and principal of Lowell for many years, in calling upon the devotion of his students to the ideals which have made Lowell great, gave this slightly modified translation of the old Athenian oath. As a fitting ending of this short message to you, may I again quote this oath:

"We will never bring disgrace to this, our school, by an act of dishonesty or cowardice, nor ever desert our comrades; we will uphold the ideals and sacred things of the school, both alone and with many; we will revere and obey the city's laws, and do our best to incite a like respect and reverence in others; we will strive unceasingly to quicken the general sense of public duty, and transmit this school greater, better, and more beautiful than it was transmitted to us."

## The Dean of Girls





The officers for the Fall term were Tom Campanella, president, and Barbara Watkins, secretary. In the spring Delano Fuller served as president, Tom Cline


as vice-president, and Don Green as secretary.

## Card Gridders of '47

Sparked by Phil Liberty, Jack Lynd, Herb Kessler, and Bill Morgan, the Lowell Indians ended the season with a record of four wins, four losses, and one tie.

Pulling one of the biggest upsets in prep history by beating Washington in the semi-finals, the Cards earned the right to meet Poly for the championship on Thanksgiving. But Poly had one of the best high school teams San Francisco has ever seen and severely trounced a fighting Lowell eleven to take a 17-16 game edge in the 34-year rivalry.

Opening the season with the Poly "Big Game," the Indians at least were able to score on a Poly team for the first time in four years, although losing, 29-13. Liberty scored on a pass from Lynd good for 79 yards, the fleet-footed halfback outracing the Poly secondary. Lynd scored late in the game on a quarterback sneak.

Lowell entered the win column with a smashing 31-0 win over Galileo, Dalpino smashing over for two touchdowns, Liberty for another, and passes from Lynd to Liberty and Scovil to Baker completing the scoring. A highly over-confident Lowell team was held to a scoreless tie by the Lincoln Mustangs, but from there went on to a 12-6 victory over Balboa.


Hampered by injuries, the Cards succumbed to title-


bound Washington, 33-13. An 80-yard march climaxed by a Scovil-Baker pass for the touchdown and a Scovil-Fenster pass produced the two scores.

Led by Phil Liberty, who scored both touchdowns, Lowell came from behind to defeat St. Ignatius, 12-7. Lowell's inability to hold onto the ball gave Commerce an 18-0 win over the Injuns.


A crippled Lowell team was in the playoffs. "Washington is a four-touchdown choice. . . ." "The Eagles are expected to repeat their earlier victory." And it looked that way, as Washington scored three quick touchdowns to lead, 19-0. Late in the first half, Lowell started to move. From the Eagle 21, Lynd and Liberty worked the ball to the 2, where Lynd went over on a quarterback sneak. In the third quarter, a pass from Lynd to Liberty went for 65 yards, as Liberty outraced Washington's Olmstead to score. Kessler went over for the conversion, 19-13. From the Washington 34, the Indians went to the one-foot line, where Liberty took it over on third down. On the important extra point, Liberty took a lateral from Lynd and raced around left end, 20-19.

Thus the crippled Lowell Indian upset all prep "experts" by doing the impossible and beating a title-bound Washington team to reach the finals.

Although they lost six games out of six starts, the '47 goof football squad gained experience that will carry over into future varsity teams.



#### 30's Cop 4th Straight Title




The championship did not come easily; it was due to hours of tedious practice every day, expert coaching from Bill Feiling, and the will to win by working together.




# Juture Stars Have Good Season




Coach Livingstone predicts that some of these boys will be future champions.



of June 18, 1948, was the setting for the prom of the Spring class of '48, with music by Larry Cannon.


Dressed up in formals and tuxedos, couples danced late into the night, and after the prom many couples found their way back to Lowell to sing traditional songs on the front steps for the last time.



The Red & White staff hopes that you, as well as our two little Indian friends Pow and Wow, have enjoyed your journey, "Round the Reservation."


