Seniors Face Future

When bombs burst over Pearl Harbor a jolt was dealt to every Missionite and especially to our Seniors, for they must now begin to cope with the war situation.

We have noticed the following changes: In our Spring Journal of 1940 the Journal staff conducted a poll. They found that prospects for jobs were not too bright and unemployment was the major problem. How untrue this is today! In this state of emergency the prospective graduate of Fall '41 faces a world of prosperity. Jobs are numerous. Twenty per cent of the boy graduates plan to work in defense industries, while 15 per cent indicate they will enlist in our nation's forces.

Vocational changes have taken place, too. In our survey of a year ago 25 per cent of the students planned to follow civil service as a career, as compared to the 10 per cent of this graduating class. This is largely due to the boom in employment. Although civil service is a secure position, the income now is less as compared to the salaries received in defense work.

In conclusion, we believe that our Seniors, through the training received at Mission, are prepared to do whatever is deemed necessary to bring this struggle to an ultimate and final victory.

The conversion attempt was good and the Bulldogs led, 7 to 6. The Bears started to roll again late in the fourth quarter and ate up 42 yards, then Ohlsen's pass was intercepted by Provost, who ran 82 yards to seal the Bears' doom.

Poly gave Mission its worst beating of the season with a 26-to-0 score. Even so, Mission had the statistics in its favor.

The champion Lowell Indians scalped the Bears, 13 to 0, on October 23. Their second touchdown came with Orsi dominating a 90yard drive that ended with his diving over the two.

The Bears then rose up and slapped the Galileo Lions with a 13-to-0 win.

On the second play of the game Martin Murray outran the Lion secondary men and scooted 58 yards for a touchdown.

After a brilliant downfield march, the Bears landed on the enemy one-yard line after Walt Hazen had cracked through the line for three yards. On the next play Quist dove over left guard and into the end zone to pay-dirt.

In the Bears' final game they handily defeated Sacred Heart, 13-6, and took fifth place in the A.A.A. race.

Except for a spectacular run by Rudy Isaquirre, the Irish never got past their own 49-yard line. Martin Murray broke the ice on a reverse from Walt Turchen to score the initial touchdown. Larry Marin's conversion attempt netted ought. In the third quarter it was George Quist who carried most of the yardage; eight times carrying the ball, he accounted for 24 of the 62 yards, passed for 34 more to Dick Worrell, and again for four.
