
FOREWORD

Officers, Rookies Build Strong Units

- 1. STANDING. Standing is the hardest of all positions to master in rifle marksmanship, because there is not the firm foundation from which to brace the rifle.
- 2. PRONE. The prone position is the first position taken up in rifle marksmanship. This is the easiest position to learn because your elbows are resting firmly on the ground.
- 3. SITTING. The sitting position is third in this course of marksmanship. Because this position is almost as easy as prone to acquire and approximately the same score is expected.
- 4. KNEELING. The kneeling position is a great deal harder to master because only one elbow is in contact with the knee.










Athletic Leaders Help Bears to Win

Girls Stress Games In Health Program


