

Government . . . Spring

Under the guidance of President Jack Feldman and Vice-President June Henry, student activities in Spring 1948 received thorough attention. Particularly important to Executive Board and Student Senate agendas was the problem of clean-up, and an extensive program was developed to improve school appearances. Under the plan, each class was responsible for policing a certain section of the building and grounds, and penalties were levied against the class whose section failed to meet the accepted standard. The threat of no assemblies soon saw classes competing against each other for a goal of superclean hallways. New book covers, a juke box, new instruments for the band, a trophy for the championship baseball team, and a host of popular assemblies were a few of the items that Spring student officers brought to Mission. Student Senate revived the old Bear Society late in the term, and was instrumental in rallying school support for the Journal.







Graduation Losses Spoil





120 Pounders Cop City






Named on All-City Team




Soccer Squad Wins Another
