
### ADMINISTRATION









#### MUSIC



Selling ads and collecting for them entails much paper work.









In the words of Coach Schwarz, "Next Year Our Year."



In the Poly game the Bears showed their greatest skill of the season, even though they


lost by a score of 21-12. The Bears showed great promise of winning this game at half time when the score was Mission 6 and Poly 7. But Poly came back to win.






Mission's unlimited basketball team ended up the season with a four won, five lost, record.












