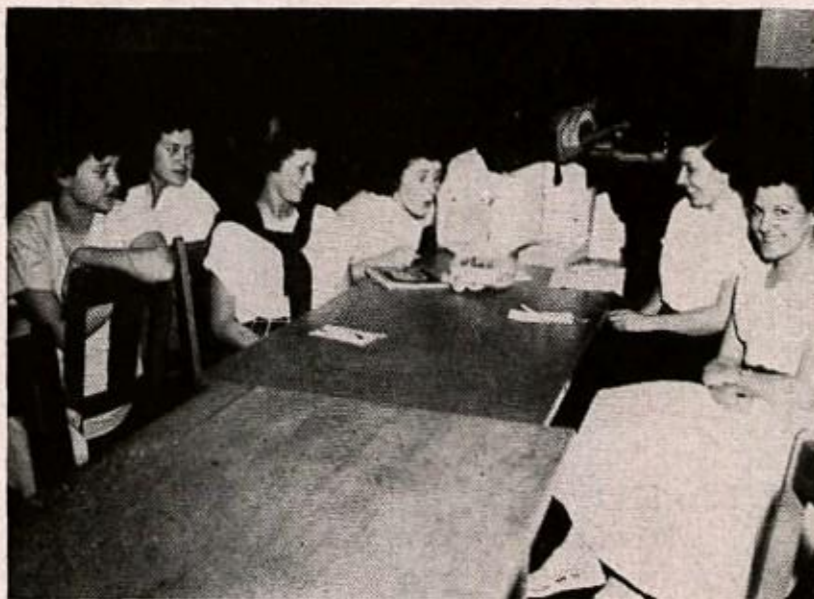

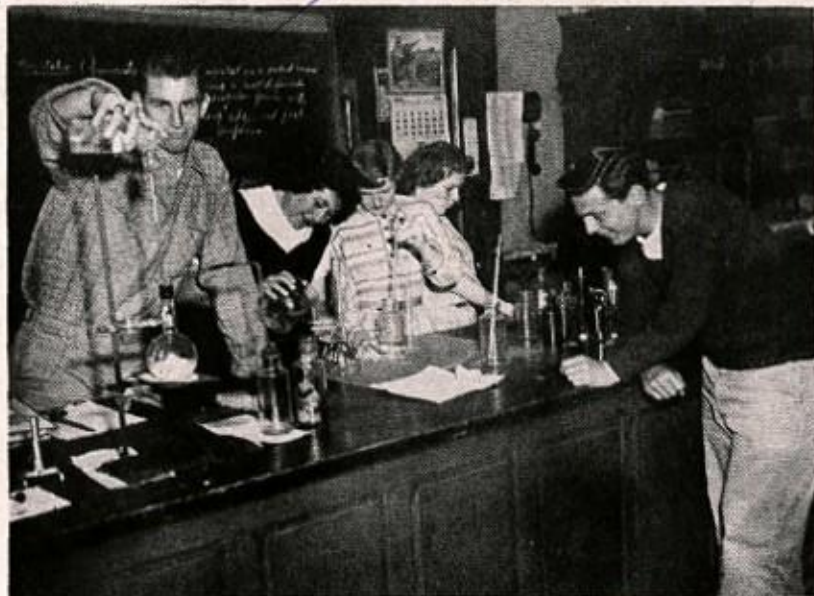

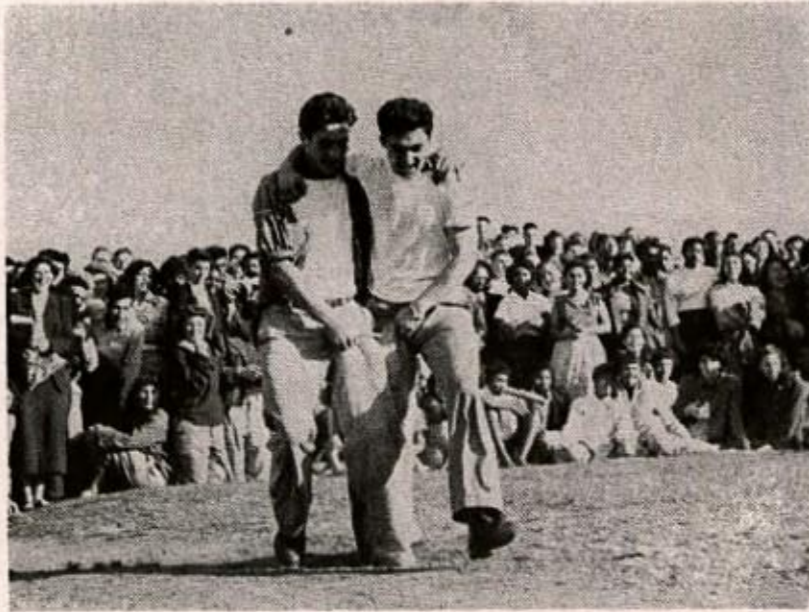

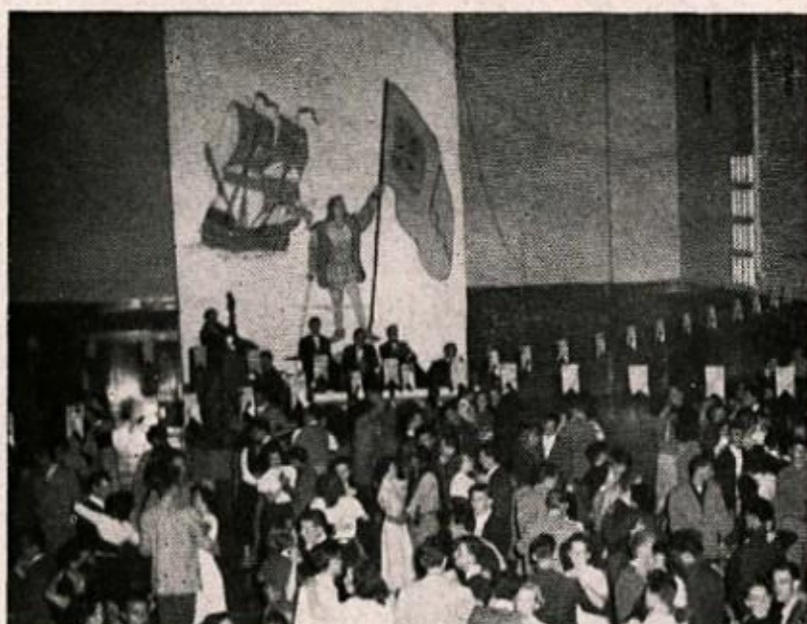

In the Poly game the Bears showed their greatest skill of the season, even though they

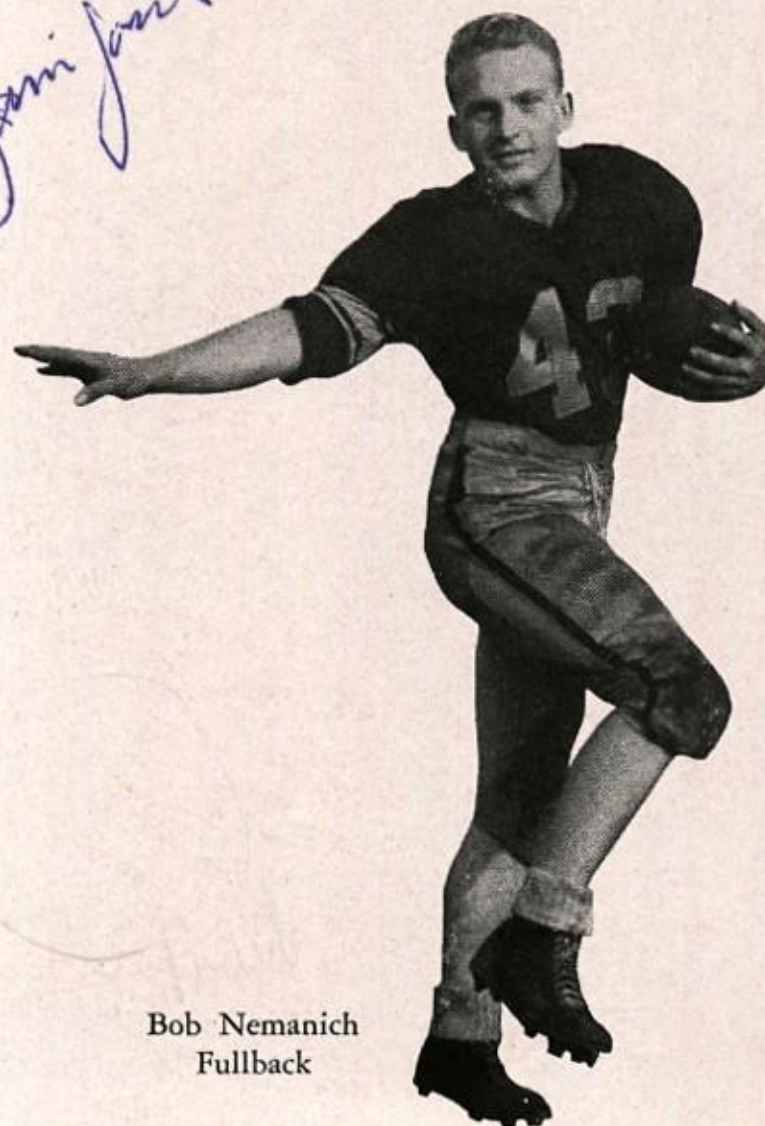
lost by a score of 21-12. The Bears showed great promise of winning this game at half time when the score was Mission 6 and Poly 7. But Poly came back to win.

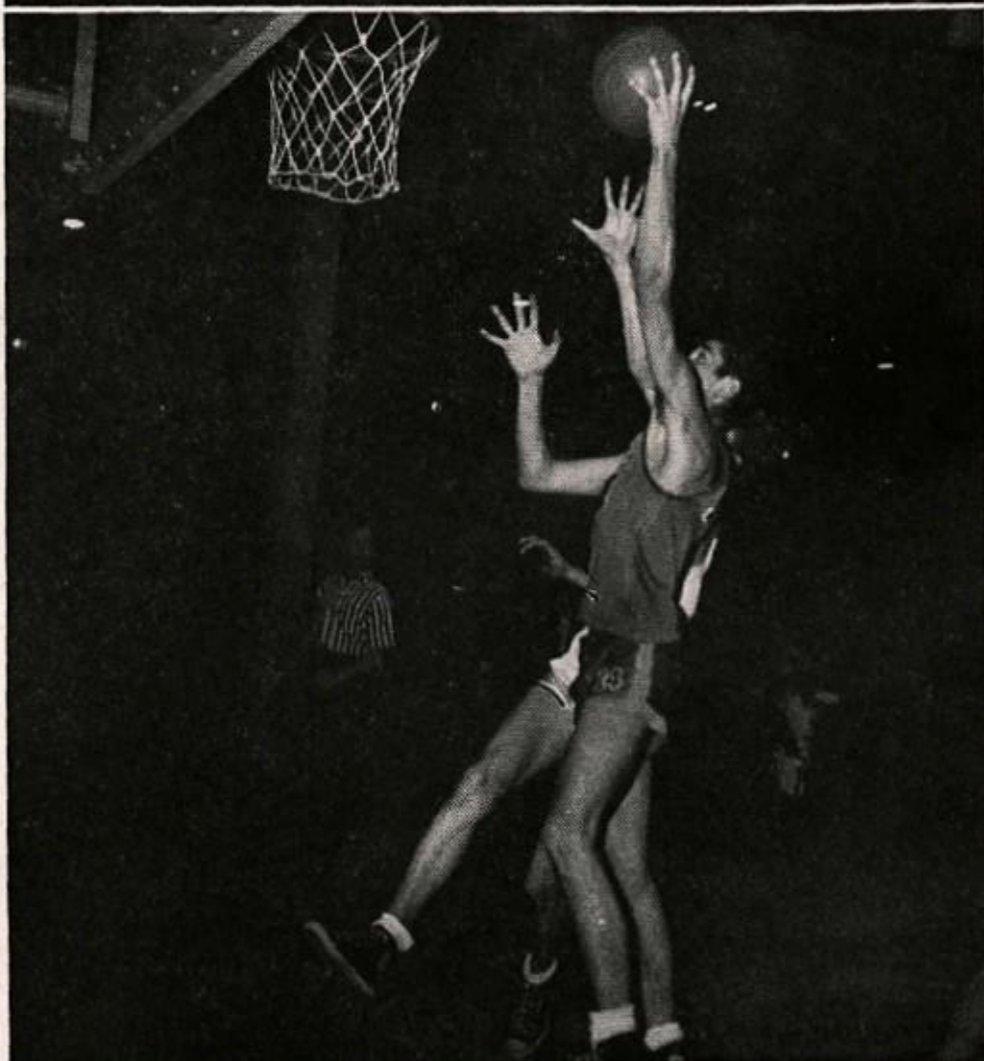

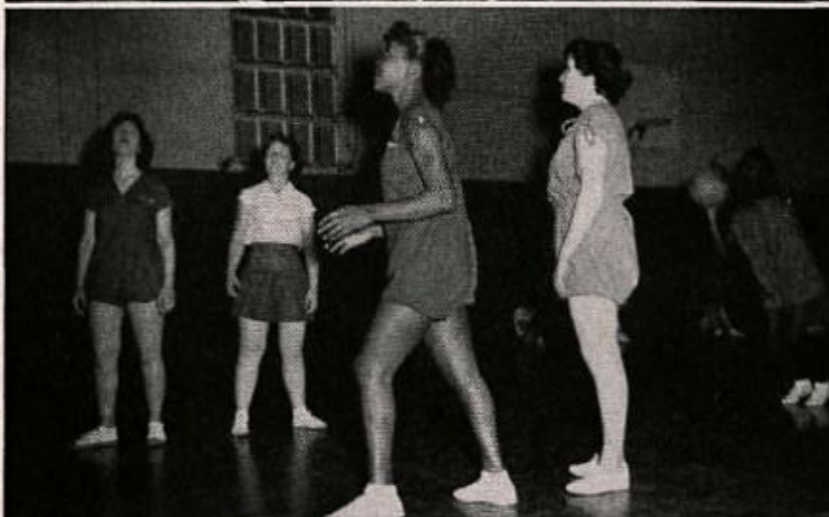

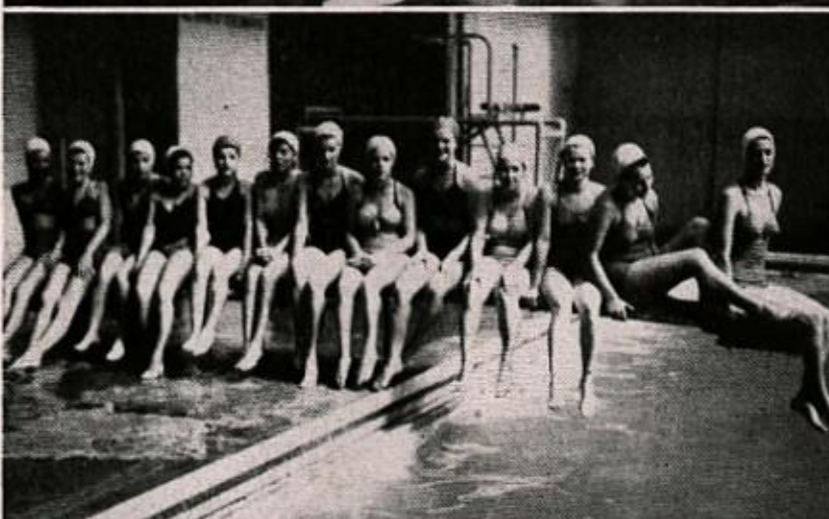
