Let us not erect cold, impersonal monuments of bronze or steel or marble which can speak only of death. Instead, let us remember them as they were.


It must be thus, for they would have wished it so.




OUR CAPTAIN...



Fred Earle was head coach for 1946, Ralph Johnson was backfield coach, and Ed Nordstrom, line coach.






Coach's Comment

We ended the season feeling that we had just started and everyone knew we would have played well if we could have been successful in scheduling another game.







Playing a total of 23 games, the 1946-47 Pirate basketball team ended the season with a record of seven victories and 16 losses. In league play the Bucs had four wins and 11 losses.

The team was hampered considerably in early season play. Luke Hinman, who later proved to be one of the main cogs of the team, was ineligible during the first portion of the season, and Art Allen, rangy center, was absent from the team for a short time at the start. Also, when Louie Lacoste got into shape, he provided the team with a scoring punch from the guard position.

Playing under a new coach, Ralph Johnson, the team met much stiff opposition in pre-league play.

The strong Oakland Bittners, led by former all-American Jim Pollard, initiated the Buc's season by administering a 63-32 wallop. Also Borlo Athletic club of San Francisco defeated Modesto 45-35 before the league campaign opened.

Of Modesto's four non-conference wins, two were gained in the 26th Annual Basketball Tournament held here.


Modesto initiated its league campaign in an unimpressive manner by dropping a 47-34 verdict to San Mateo JC. The San Mateo game was a harbinger of worse things to come as the Bucs ended the round-robin conference play with the scalps of only four of their league partners.

During the course of league play the Pirates were the contributing factor in the upset of two of California's finest junior college quintettes.





At the first base position was Jim Bowman, converted from short stop. To complete the infield, Harold Santos proved to be a good defensive man, as well as a good sticker.


Behind the plate, doing an outstanding job was Louie La Coste, who was dependable and full of fire. Sharing the catching position was Hal Ginsburg.

MJC's track and field team this year enjoyed its most successful season since 1928, as they won the conference championship.


Under Fred Earle's direction the team suffered only one setback, that being at the Fresno Relays when they finished behind Los Angeles City College and Compton.



BOXING CHAMPS


Varsity boxing returned to MJC this year for the first time since 1942. The squad under the able direction of Coach Ed Nordstrom, breezed through a successful season.
