



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EDITORIAL

Since 1872, young men and women have been leaving the Oakland High School until, up to this June, exactly 5,000 persons have received their diplomas from this old institution. The largest class ever graduated from the school thus far will leave this June with over 130 members in it.




But still it is going to be interesting to look back fifty years hence and see how our records compare with those of the "first five thousand."


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THE OAKLAND HIGH SCHOOL IN 1872 AND AT PRESENT




The Oakland High School has from the first been extremely fortunate in the choice of its principals. The school was started in a fourroom building in 1869 by Mr. Mc-Chesney. He led the school through the early years and saw it rise to a preeminent position among like institutions in the state.

When Mr. Mc-Chesney resigned in 1901, the most suitable man to be found to fill his responsible position was Mr. James Pond, Mr. Pond is effectionately known by hundreds of his students as "Jimmy" Pond. Our second principal served un-



til 1908, when he left to go into professional life.

Our third and present principal, Mr. C. E. Keyes, to ok Mr. Pond's place. The most brilliant testimonial of his career as head of the school is the position the school has taken and maintained since Mr. Keyes came to us. Student self-government has been successfully introduced and the Oakland High system is now the model for many other schools. Mr. Keyes has improved the school in many ways since his assumption of office and his efforts have not gone unappreciated by the students.



O^{HE} first class of the Oakland High School graduated in the spring of 1872, just fifty years ago. The surviving members of that class are to participate in our graduating exercises at the end of this term, June,



1922. The present class sincerely appreciates the honor conferred upon it by the first class. In commemoration of this happy event, this issue of the Aegis gives the names of all the 5,000 boys and girls who have graduated from the Oakland High School.

A brief historical sketch of the school may not be out of place at this time. The Oakland High School was organized in the fall of 1869. At that time the school system of Oakland consisted of fifteen teachers and something over one thousand pupils. There were four grammar schools, and the high school was organized in one of these —the Lafavette School—located at the corner

of Twelfth and Jefferson streets, on the site now occupied by the Oakland High School. The city then had a population of about 10,000. Previous to the organization of the high school, young people wishing an education beyond the eighth grade attended private schools, a number of which were established in Oakland.

The most noted of these was the College of California, located at Twelfth and Franklin streets. This college was organized in 1855. It merged into the University of California, which was first organized in the buildings of the College in September, 1869. Thus the Oakland High School and the State University began their careers at the same time, within four blocks of each other.

In the fall of 1871 the high school moved from the Lafayette Grammar School to a new high school building at the corner of Twelfth and Market streets, the present site of the Vocational High School. At the time of this removal the school had about seventy-five students and two teachers. As the city increased in population, the high school also grew in numbers. In 1879 it had 325 students, and 450 in 1889. On the evening of April 6, 1889, the high school building burned. The foundation and something of the first story were saved, but six months were required to rebuild it. In the meantime the school occupied Hamilton Hall, an old building on the southeast corner of Thirteenth and Jefferson streets, and a Jewish synagogue, just one block east on Clay street. The school moved into the reconstructed building October 21, 1889, and on the evening of November 6, just sixteen days later, another fire consumed the roof and the second story. The remainder of the year was spent in Hamilton Hall and the synagogue, with some classes in the first story of the school building.

In August, 1890, the school was once more back at Twelfth and Market in the building which had been a second time reconstructed on the old foundations. It is this building which now houses the Vocational High School.

In January, 1895, the school moved into the building which it now occupies. Thus, after an existence of twenty-five years, the Oakland High School came back to the spot where it was born. The Lafayette Grammar school in the meantime had moved into its new home at the corner of Seventeenth and West streets.

During all these years, Mr. J. E. McChesney had been principal of the school. He was the principal and the only teacher in 1869, when the school was founded, and remained principal until 1901, when he resigned. He was followed by Mr. J. H. Pond, who served as principal until 1908, when he resigned and was succeeded by Mr. C. E. Keyes, the present head of the school. It would be difficult to find stronger and more efficient men than these three, and the high standing of the school is due largely to them.

When the school moved in 1895, it was still a three-year school. The grammar schools at the time gave a nine-year course, and the high school course began with the tenth year. In 1896 the ninth grades from all the grammar schools of the city, except the Franklin School, were concentrated at the old high school building at Twelfth and Market streets, which had been renamed the Central Grammar School. Tenth and eleventh grade classes in home economics and commercial subjects were also added. This school was really a second high school, and in a short time its name was again changed to the Central High School.

When the Oakland High School occupied its new home in 1895, it had an enrollment of about 500. In 1901 all ninth-grade students from the Franklin School, and all from the Central High School except those taking commercial and home economics courses, were transferred to the Oakland High School. The school then had some 900 students. By 1909 there were 1100.

The Central High School had its name twice changed, first to the Polytechnic High, and then to the Manual Training and Commercial High. It was steadily growing into a well-equipped high school.


For a number of years after 1910 there was a falling off in numbers at the Oakland High School. This was due to the annexation of the Fruitvale district to Oakland, which opened the Fremont High School to the young people of the city; to the building of the new home for the Manual Training and Commercial High School, which at the time of its removal in 1915 was renamed the Oakland Technical High School; and to the organization of two new schools, the Vocational High School and the University High School. In 1917 the enrollment of Oakland High School was only 650. After this the numbers began to climb. In 1919 the school had 950 students; in 1920, 1150; in 1921, 1325; and in the spring term of 1922, 1450.

Throughout its career the Oakland High School has been an academic or cultural school. To prepare young people for college has always been one of its principal aims. But in 1915 the scope of its work was enlarged by the addition of a commercial and a home economics department. The music department has been enlarged and the work of the other departments has developed a more practical character. What is needed is a new site and a new building, in order that the school may become an all-around, modern, cosmopolitan high school.

THE BANK

The bank is the center of the financial activities of the school and has proven to be very successful.

The five chosen were Philip Berger, who spoke on "Success", Virginia Waters, on "The Irish and British Agreement", Charles Hogan, on "Position of the United States", George Roudebush, on "A Year of President Harding", and Edwin Duerr on "Practical Peace". The latter was the winner of the contest this year, while Virginia Waters was given honorable mention.

Mr. Capwell donated the first of the two loving-cups about ten years ago, and on these cups every year were placed the names of the winners. Last Year, John Truman was the first to have his name engraved on the second cup.

GARFIELD COTTAGE

AKLAND HIGH SCHOOL has sponsored Garfield Day Nursery since September, 1920. At that time \$200 was advanced by the A. Y. W. S. to equip the cottage for immediate use. The sum was soon paid back and a new revolving fund established to meet such emergencies as might arise. The work has proved both interesting to the school and beneficial to the cottage. The past year has witnessed various improvements in the welfare of Garfield. The cottage has moved to its new home on East Seventeenth Street and Twenty-second Avenue, the old home being included in the enlargement of Garfield School's playground. The present nursery is better suited to the needs of the youngsters. There is more yard space, more sun, and less noise from the outside. The cottage will be equipped to accommodate fifteen children. The present Garfield Nursery fund is \$377, which makes possible all necessities, such as cribs, food, and toys. Toys have also been donated by the students, thus helping to keep down expenses. Each term a committee is chosen to manage the cottage for six months. DEBATING

OEBATING is once more coming back into a position of prominence among the activities of high schools throughout the country. This resurrection of debating has been quite noticeable in the Oakland High School, especially during the last year. Not only did clubs thrive, but students interested themselves in debates, a league was formed, and a class in debating was instituted. Altogether, the past year has been a banner year for debating; a year of debating the like of which will not be seen soon in the future.

An important factor in bringing about the renewed interest in debating was the reorganization of the Tri-City Debating League. This league was tri-city in name only, for it consisted of Oakland, Technical, University, Fremont, and Berkeley High Schools. Its purpose was to promote interest in debating and to offer opportunities for interscholastic debates. Three debates were held during the last year. The one held in the fall term was on the question: "Resolved, That the East Bay Cities Should Own and Operate Their Own Water System." The first debate of the spring term was on the question: "Resolved, That the East Bay Cities Should Furnish Work for the Unemployed." Edwin Duerr, Philip Berger, Thomas Hill, and Pardee Lowe were the Blue and White debaters who lost the oratorical combats by close decisions. The last debate was on the question: "Resolved, That the Two Remaining East Bay Cities Should Adopt the Manager Form of Government."



The class in argumentation under Miss Bennett has also helped much to put interest in debating during the past year. It has been a success and is the only class of its kind in Oakland.

HONOR SOCIETY

N ORGANIZATION of all stars is the Honor Society. We hear of the stars and heroes on the track and court, but in the past we have heard practically nothing about the stars in the classroom. Everyone should be at school primarily to get an education; so it is proper within a school to give credit and recognition to those scholastic stars who so nobly deserve to be lauded. Greater than any distinction that may be gained from consistently pursuing studies, however, is the satisfaction one feels when he knows he has done his best.

The emblem of the Society is a silver O pin, which is seen on members' coats or dresses, to indicate that the wearer has been a diligent student, and has the qualifications requisite: that he must have received term marks, no less than ones and twos, for two consecutive terms.

When the Society was organized, in the fall of 1921, there were 92 members, and the officers elected for that term proved their efficiency by handling the business of this honorable organization and executing their duties in commendable fashion. These officers have been striving to gain certain privileges for the honor students, one of which is the right to leave the study-hall without being questioned.

R. O. T. C.

Oakland stood highest in the inspection drill, with a higher per cent of attendance than any of the other three schools.

The Third Annual Military Tournament of the R. O. T. C. was held on May 12, 1921, in the Oakland Auditorium, with the public as spectators. It consisted of exhibition drills and competition between the various high schools in Oakland. The school winning the competitive drill was presented with a beautiful cup by the Rotary Club, and the winning company received the City of Oakland cup.

Besides the cups, three medals were given for best individual work: a gold medal from R. C. Durant; a silver one from Leroy Goodrich; and a bronze one from W. N. Jenkins. Fred M. 




The R. O. T. C. is also helping the girls in the Rifle Team after school. This is a new activity in the school and already many girls have tried out.



"A Night at an Inn" was a thrilling melodrama concerning a stolen ruby and Hindu priests and idols. It was well received. The cast:



Reginald Keller (Reggie) was a husky tackle. Every now and then when he got mad, he would rip up his opponents rather ruthlessly.



Jack Helm with all the audacity of a steam-roller drove his way through his opponents' line. Jack played at half and fullback.

TECH HIGH 25, OAKLAND HIGH 0

Blume, on a pretty end run, scored our tally. Conversion failed. Vocational's safety was responsible for large gains in yardage, as he fumbled Red's punts.



During the pre-season menu that Manager Sibbett dished out, Oakland was not so successful. They lost to some of the best teams in the bay region by close margins, but took many other prep quintets into camp. Among the San Francisco schools to fall at our team's heels were Poly (twice), Lowell, and Mission.

Captain Al Levit was a very able leader and his fight and headwork were a large part of the team's success. Al was a perfect example of a basketball player and set a high standard throughout the team. Al played the whole league with only one foul called on him. This is a record hard to beat.

Manager Sibbett was the man seen every place on the floor and the fellow responsible for so many of the points made by Oakland. "Sib" was a bad man to stick and always had his opponents hunting and worrying.

"Coak" Coakley was one of the best all-around men on the team. He made center his permanent position throughout the league and played the position in class A style. "Coak" was the most active man on the team and he surely made it tough for all of his opponents.





Leo Barrett was one of the finds of the season. In Leo we found a wonderful forward, for he was one of the high point men of the team. He displayed his class in the Fremont and Vocational games, starring as a point-maker in each. Leo has another year for basketball.

Frank spent with pleasure many an hour giving pointers on the game, and we take the privilege of thanking Coach Boek, in behalf of the student body, for his untiring work.

Koford Coakley, the center cog of the team, was unanimously chosen by his teammates to guide the team through the season of '23. We wish you all the success in the world, "Coak."

TECH GAME

In the first game of the season Oakland downed Tech by the score of 18-15.

This victory over Tech was the first one since '19 in the hoop sport. The game was hard fought from beginning to end, with neither team sure of victory until the final whistle.

Every man on the team fought hard from start to finish. There were no individual stars.

VOCATIONAL GAME

Cecil Wright, captain of '23 squad, set a new mark in the running broad jump with a leap of 20 ft. $11\frac{1}{2}$ in. Charles Karpo established a new height in the pole vault with a flight of 10 ft. 8 in.

There were only nine fellows who placed in the meet.

George Blume, ex-captain, was caught by two watches at 10: and a third at 10:1 in the 100yard dash. The judges gave him a time of 10:2. He took first in the 220 also at 23:1. George took the last lap in the relay.

Jack Merrick ran a good race in the 440, but was beaten out by Prelli of Fremont, a heady and experienced quarter miler. He established a good lead in the relay when he ran first.

Cecil Wright was the high point man of the day, totaling 16¹/₄ points. Besides setting a record in the running broad jump, he took first places in the high jump and low timbers.

John Truman, who participated in his first track meet, ran in the 880. He took third place. Had John possessed a wee bit more experience, he would have been up amongst the leaders.

Jack Hughes hopped into third place in the running broad jump. Jack will be here for sev-





eral more meets, and there will be no doubt as to his taking the honors in the future.

Charles Karpo was conceded first place in the pole vault in pre-season practices.

Leo Barrett, despite a weak ankle, and somewhat weakened by his exertions in the high and low sticks, tied for fourth in the pole with three other fellows.

William Lynch was our smallest man on the track team, yet he attempted great heights and incidentally tied for fourth in the pole vault.

Henry Driscoll, teammate of Lynch, performed in the hurdles and in the pole vault. The trio were among our best.

In March the Cal frosh held a meet against the combined high schools of Oakland. The frosh had a clean sweep of the events. They scored $102\frac{1}{2}$ points to the combined schools' $14\frac{1}{4}$.

Captain Blume ran a third in the 100. The time was 10:1. Leo Barrett was tied for third in the pole vault. Cecil Wright leaped in the high and running broad jump.

Early, very early, the Stanford freshmen issued an invitation to O. H. S., Tech, and Berkeley to participate in a quadrangular track meet. Berkeley made 22 points, Oakland 8 points, and Tech one point. The final score was: Stanford freshmen, 91; O. T. B., 31.

George Blume ran the century in 10:1, taking third place. Jack Helm with very little training took a third in the high hurdles and ran second in the low timbers. Cecil Wright was beaten out for first place in the broad jump by only a few inches. Oakland was third in the relay.




The fact that freshmen made the team speaks well for our teams for the next few years.

Goble has a dangerous slashing drive which won him a place on the team. He is an experienced and heady player.


Higgins is an orator of the courts. He has talked opponents without number out of tennis games. At times, though, he keeps still long enough to win a few tournaments.

However, most of the fellows who made this team are seniors. If future tennis teams are to be turned out here as they have been in the past, more beginners will have to learn the racquet game.



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
PLAY-DAY




