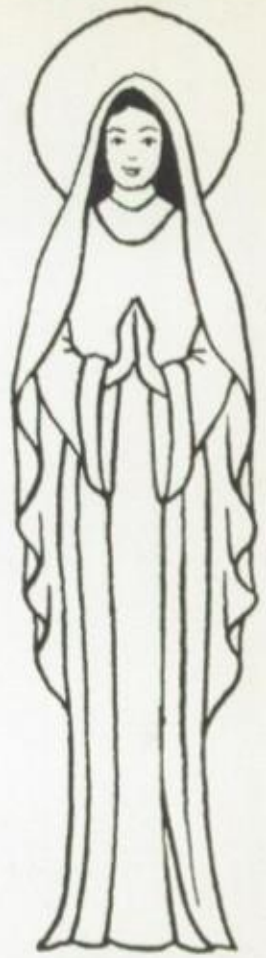

And no man shall pluck it out of His hand.

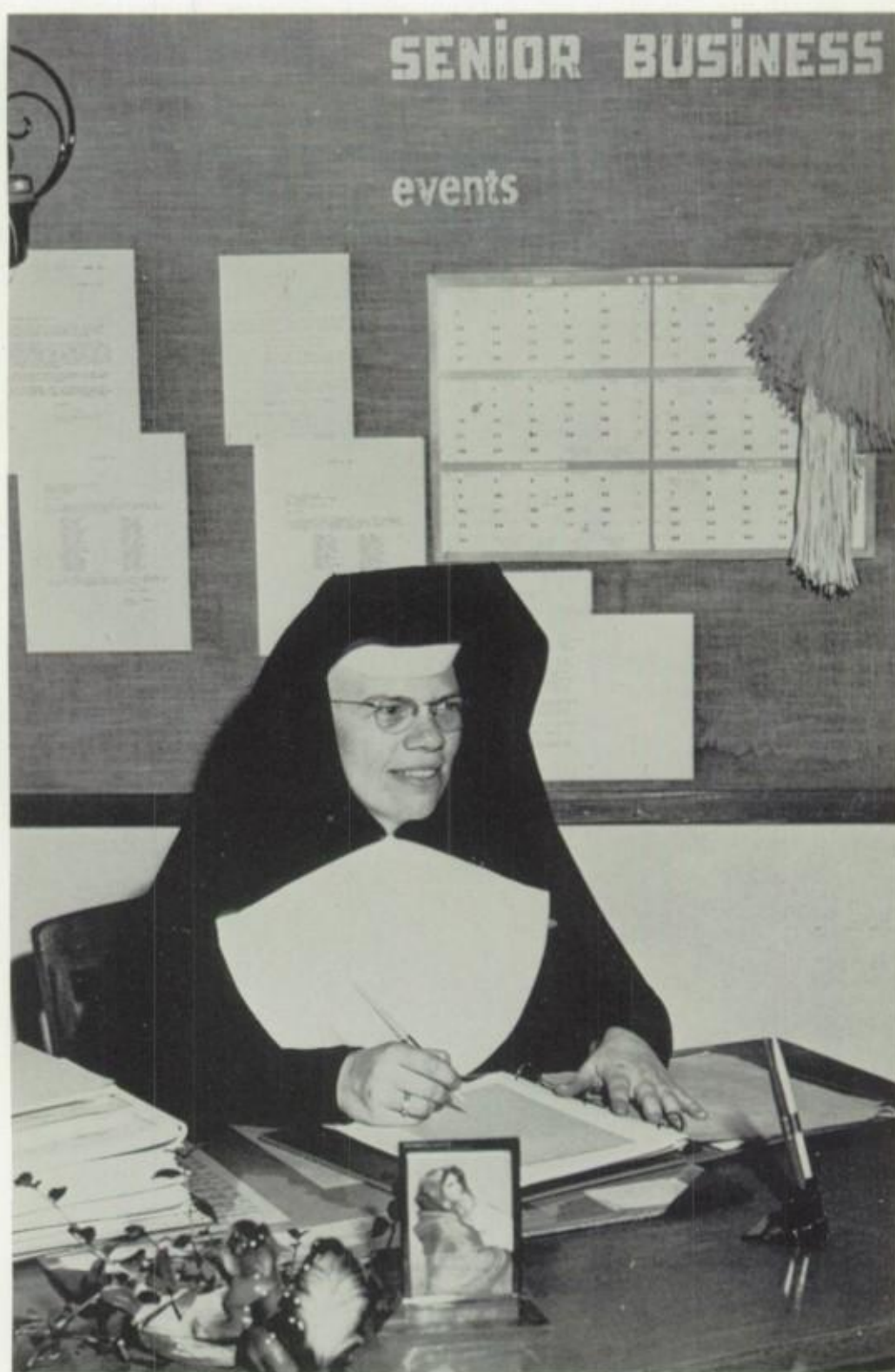

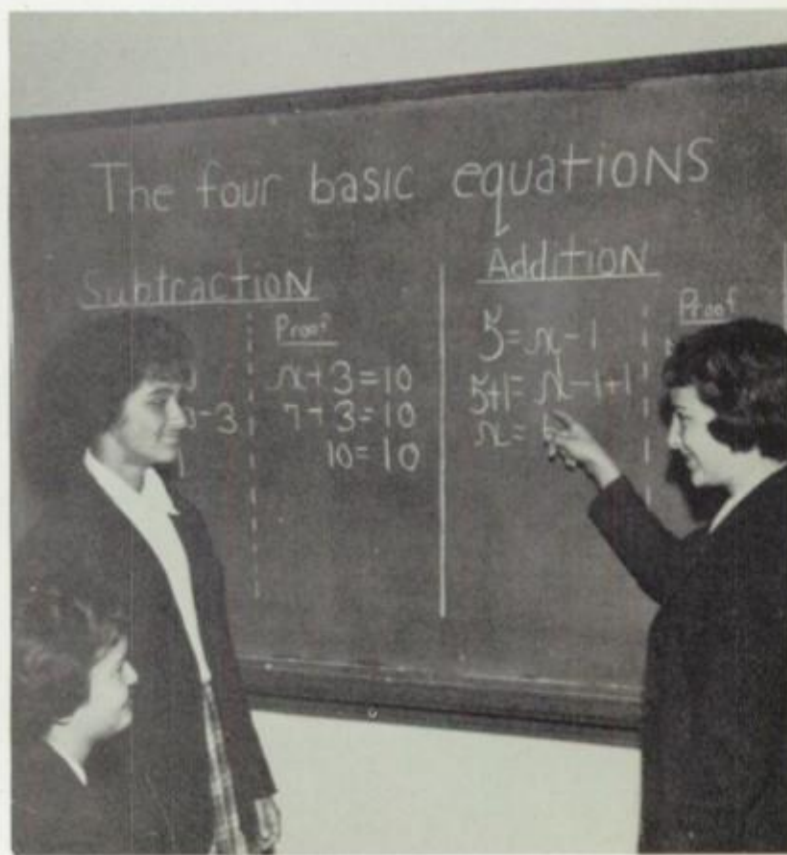

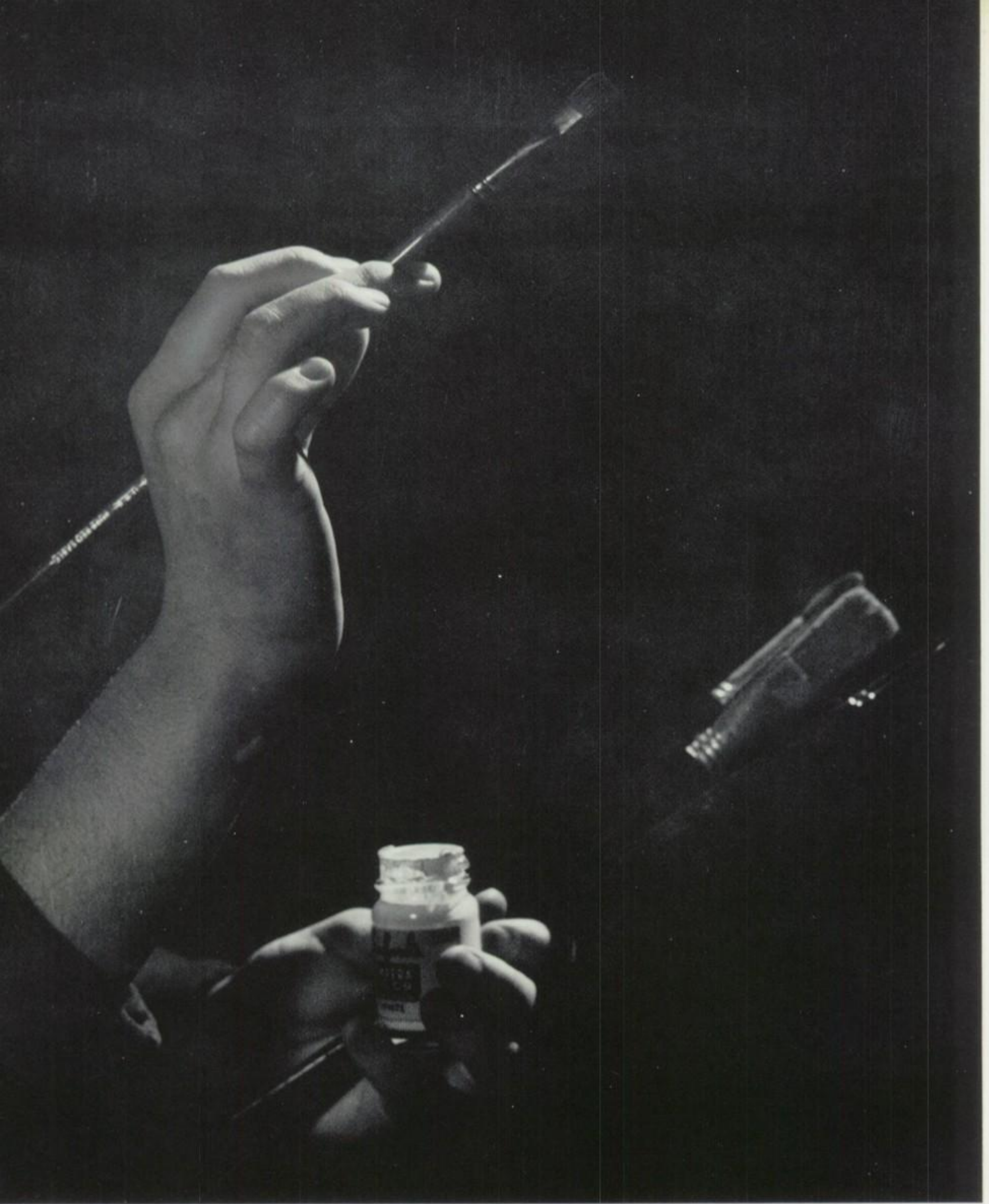

Directed by Sister Mary Theodora, Presentation's art department strives to develop well the God-given talents of each student.

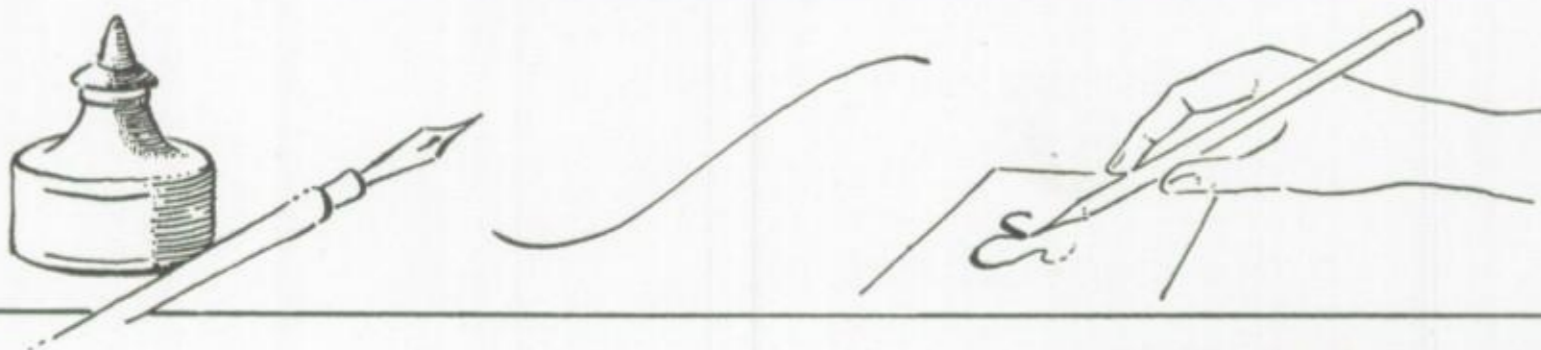
In the three year course, the student first becomes acquainted with the various skills in the field of art and then tries to master them. Creativity and self-expression are always encouraged.

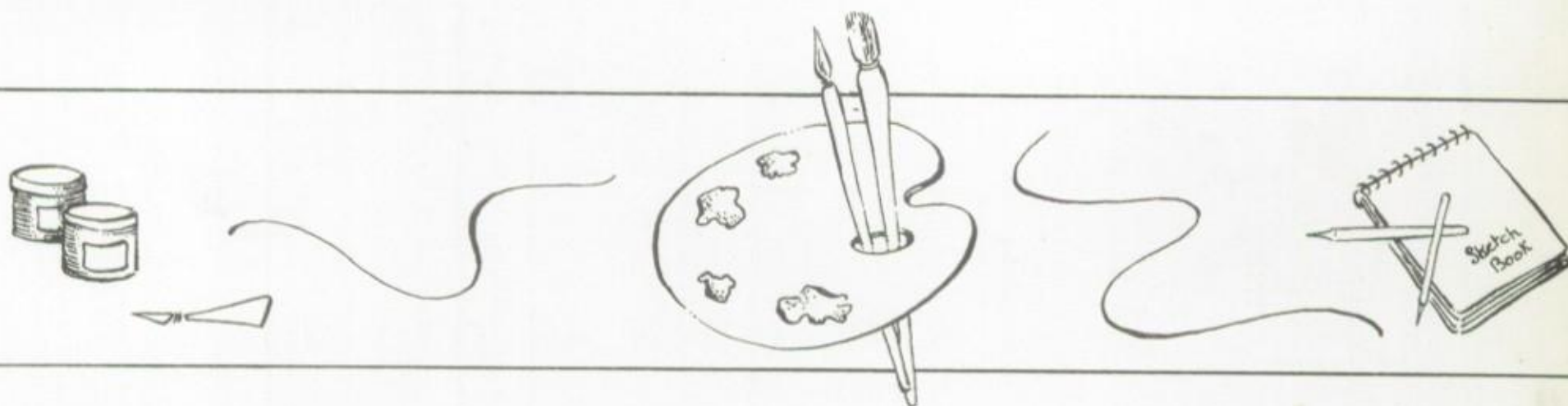

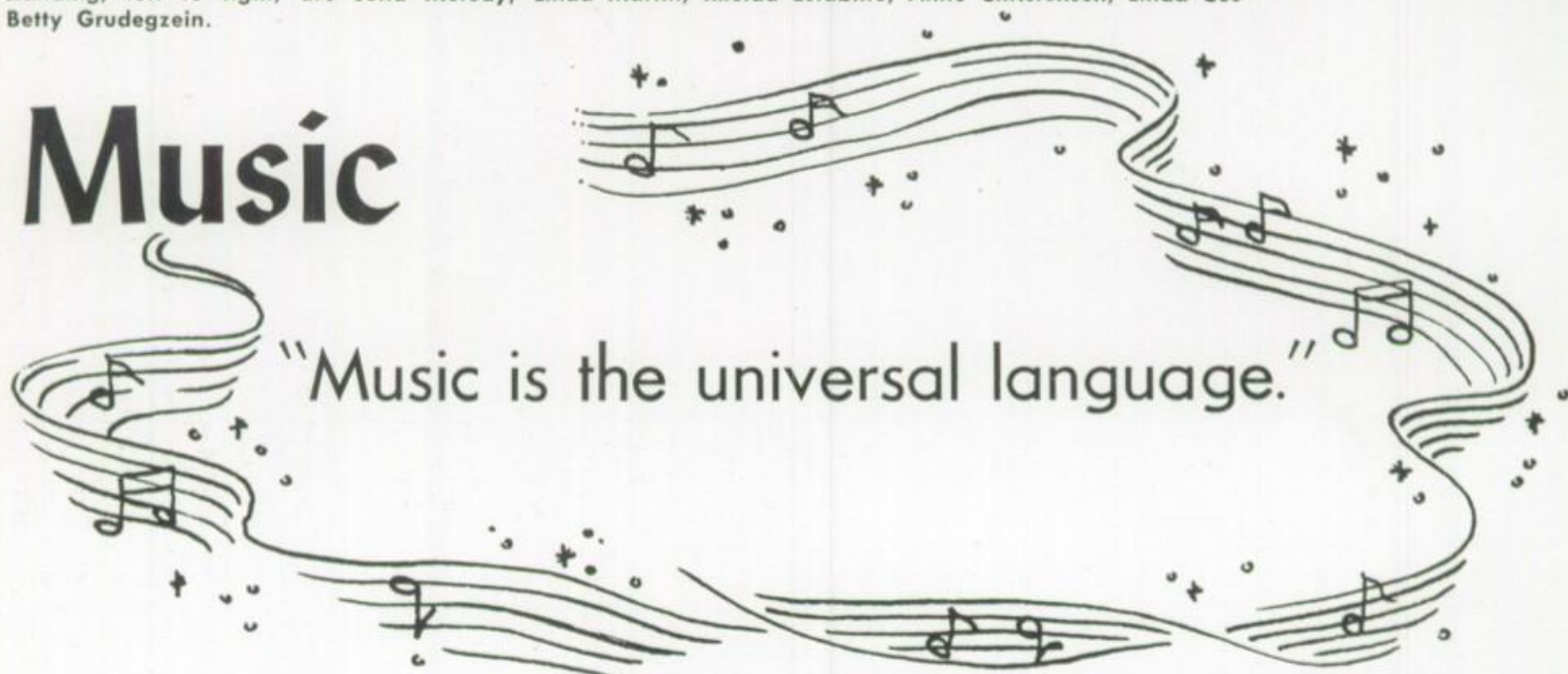
