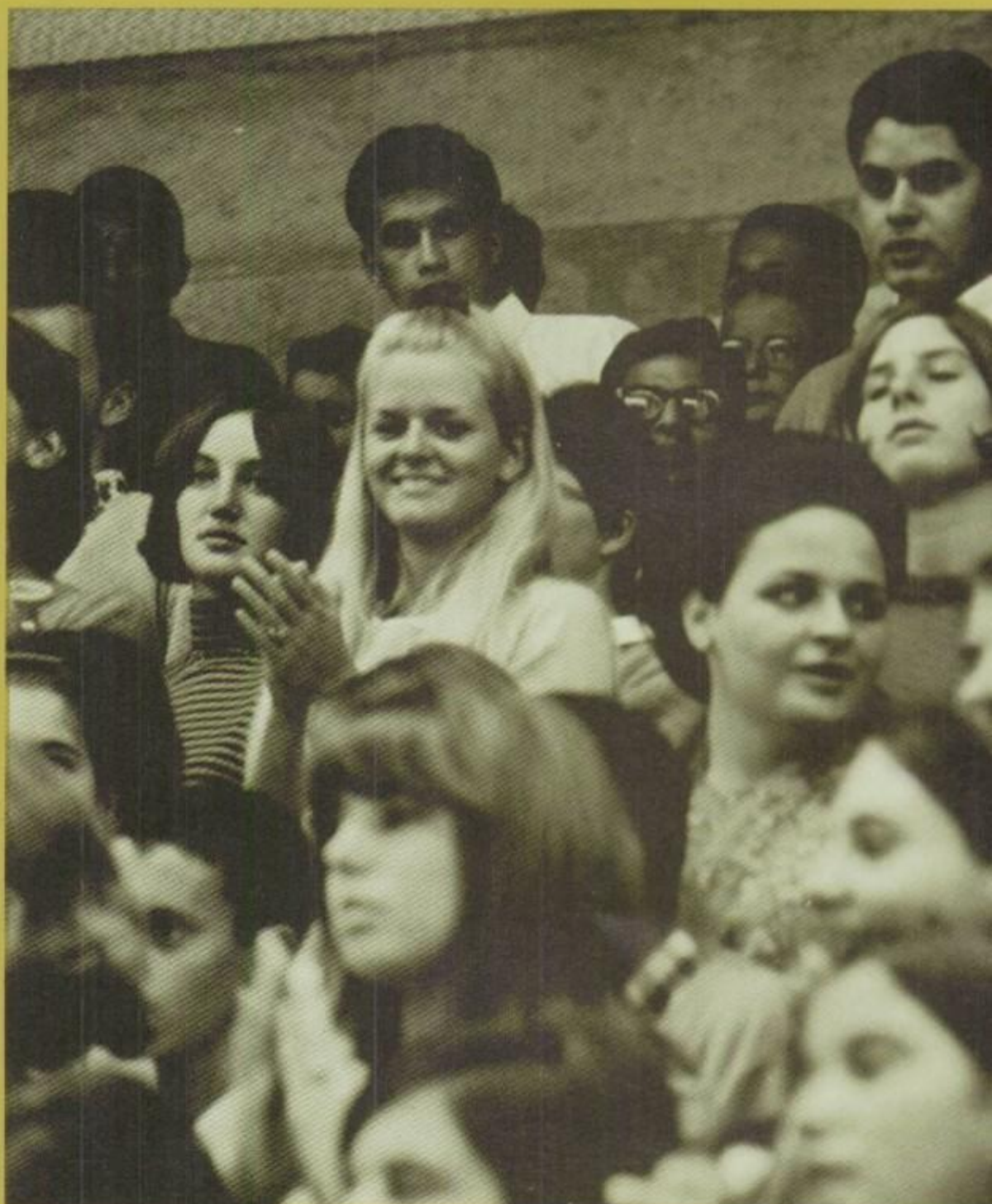




# LEARN, TRY, PERSIST!

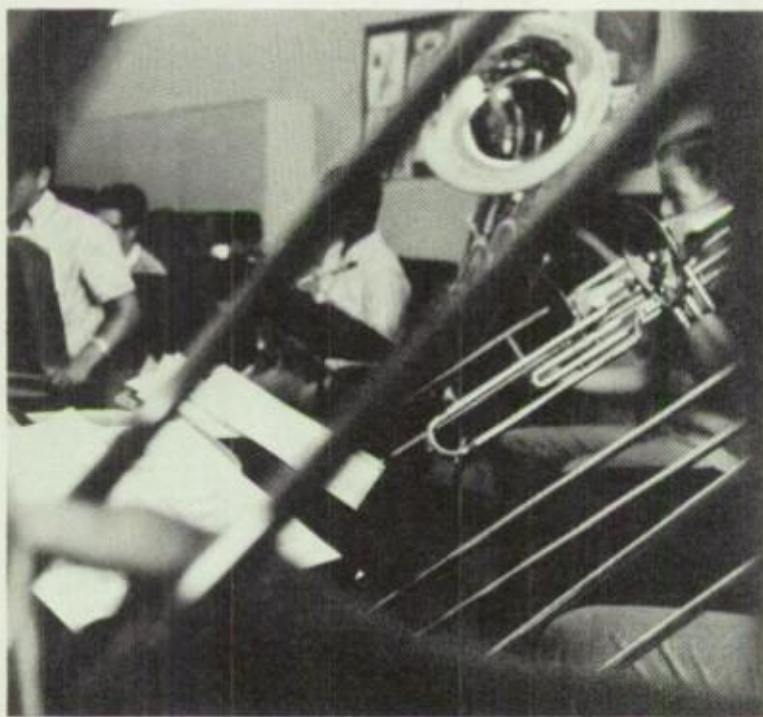

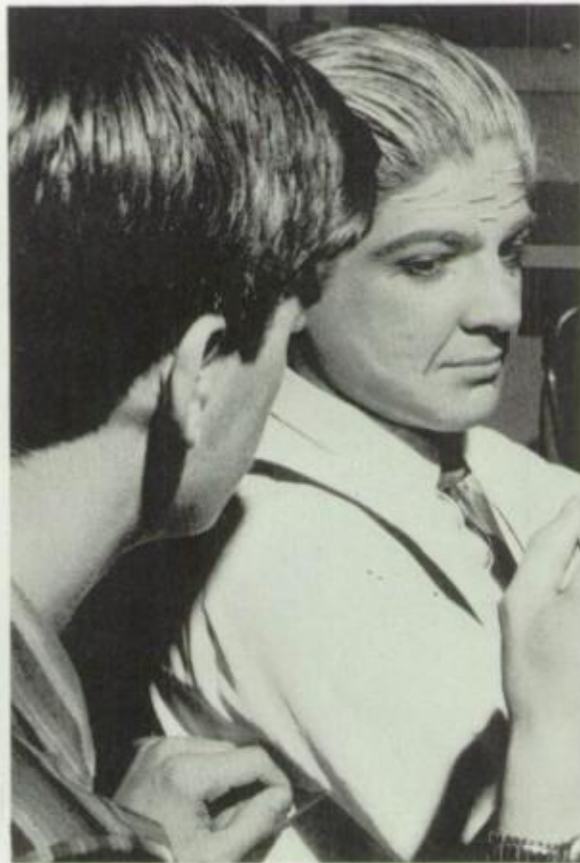


The experience was rich and varied. Some of us would continue, but others would leave the campus for new and exciting aspects of life.

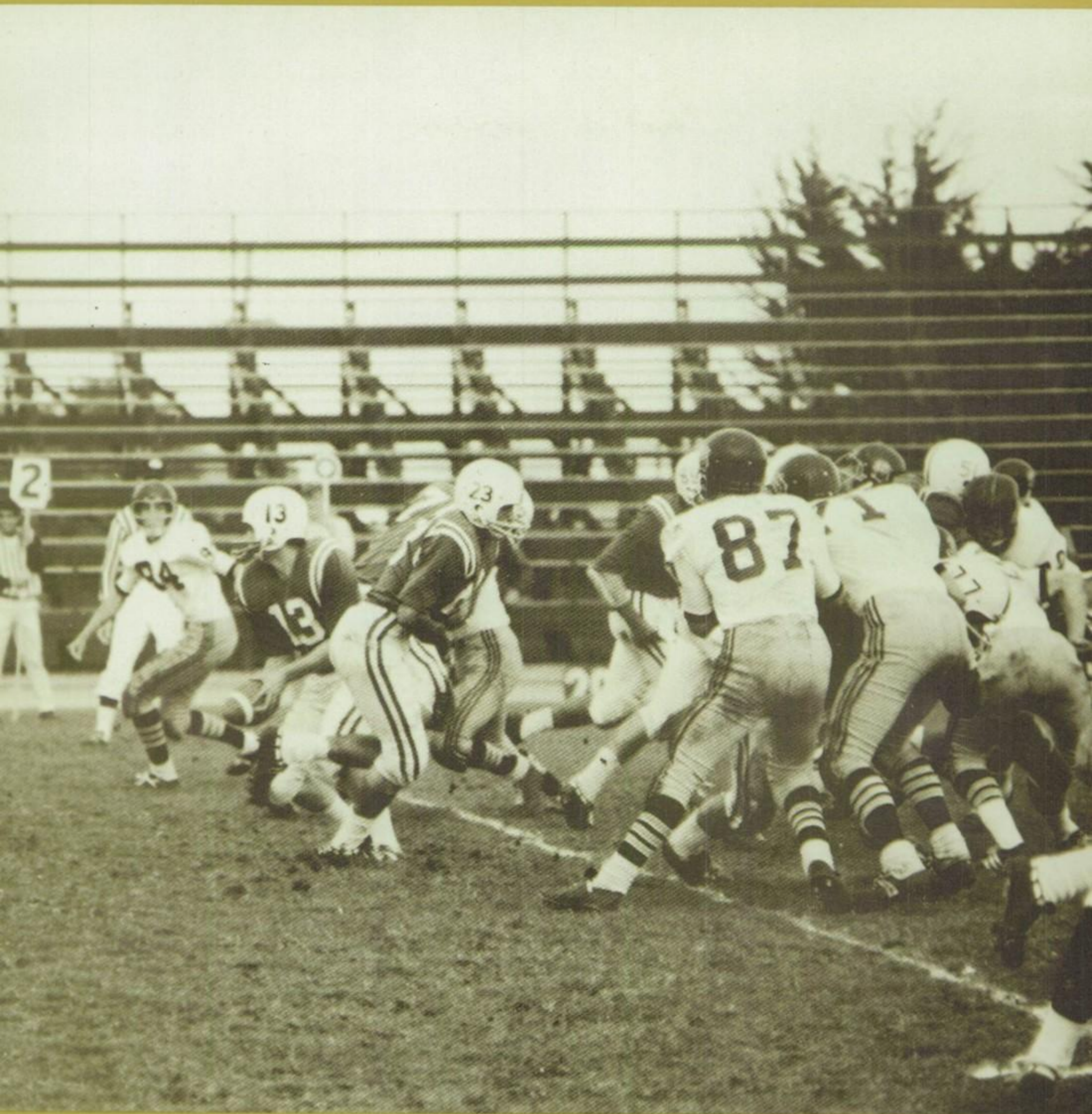

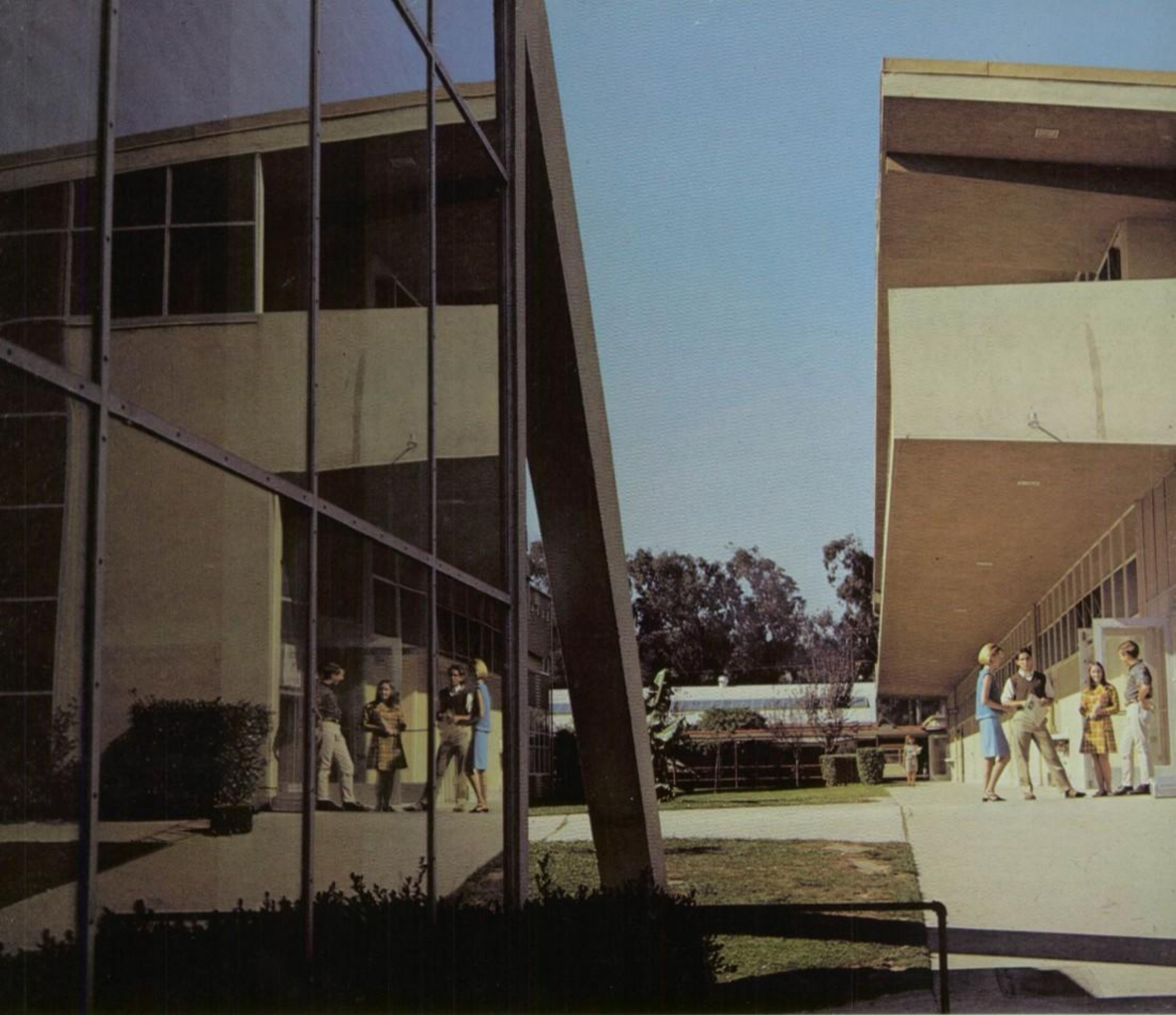

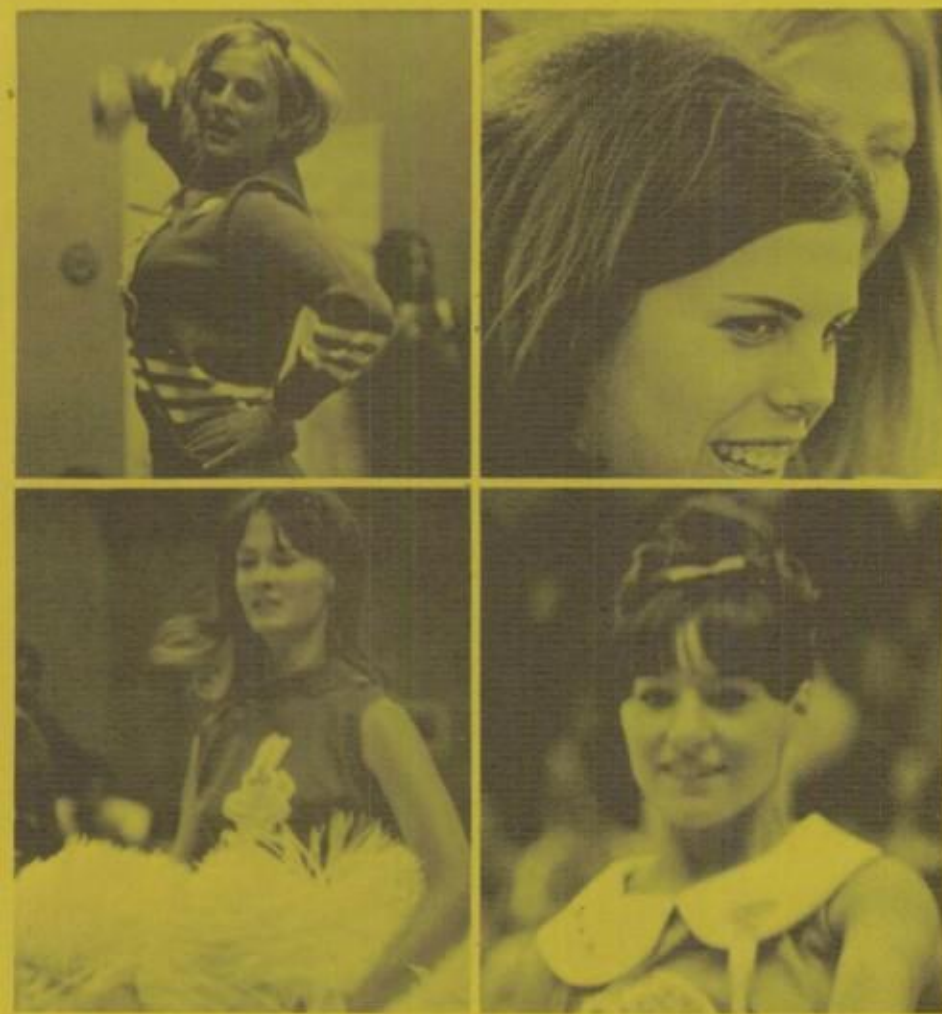

Activity and SSFHS are synonymous.

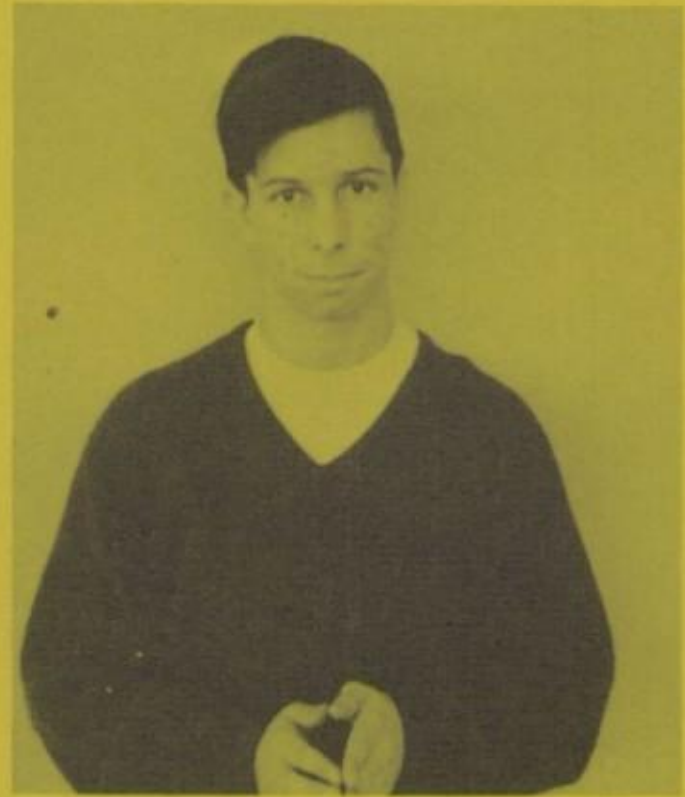

## INTERNATIONAL LIVING FOR UNDERSTANDING

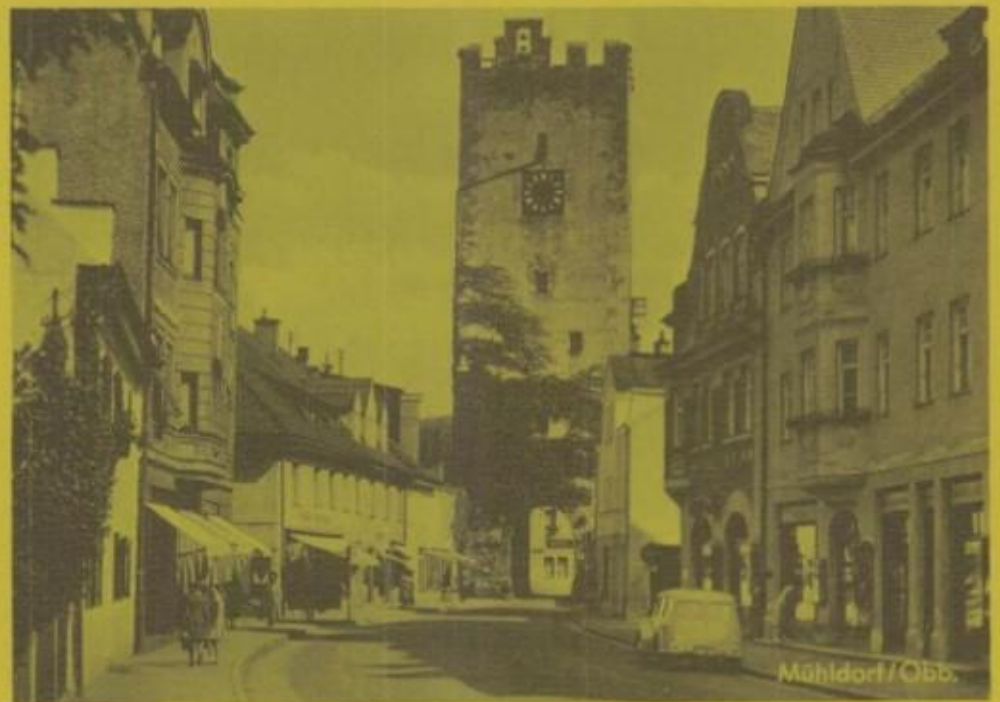
Students selected to participate in the *Foreign Exchange Program* experience actual living in a country outside of the U.S.A.

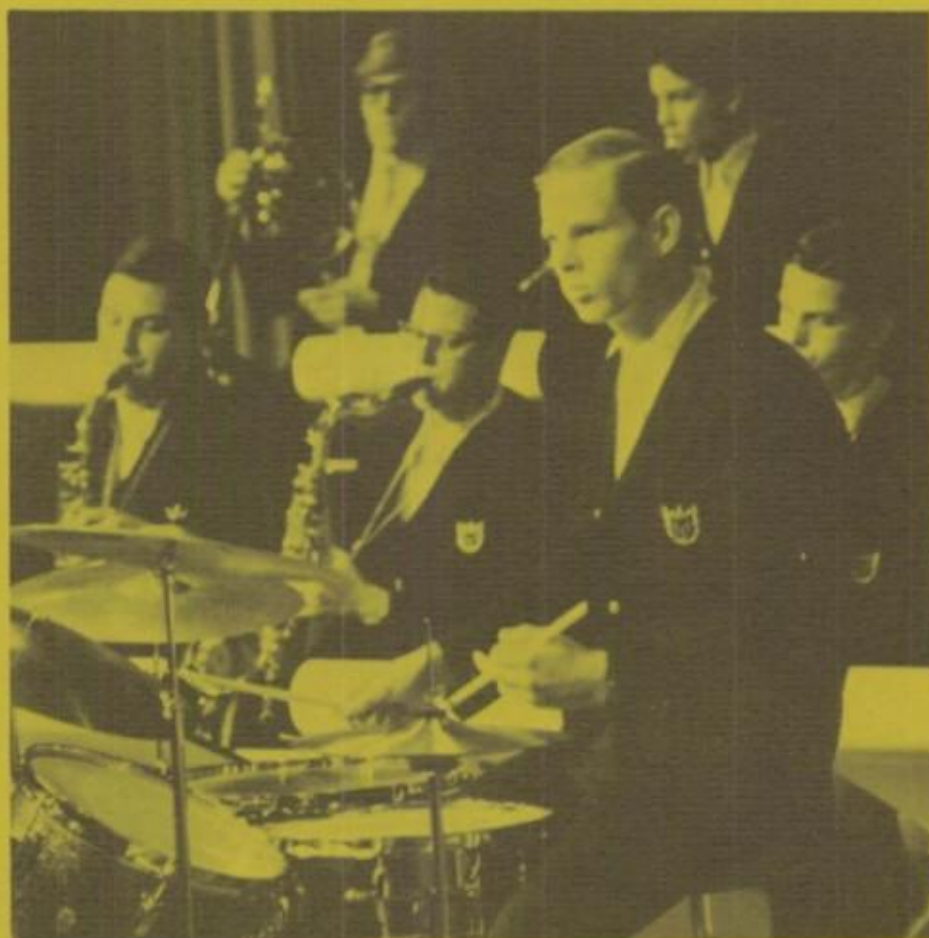

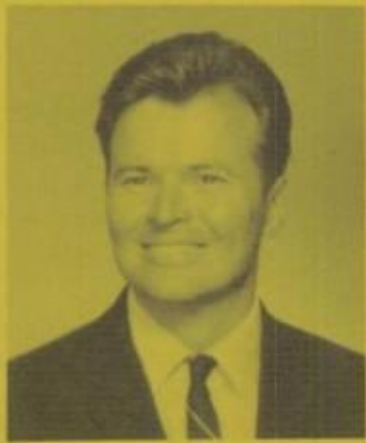

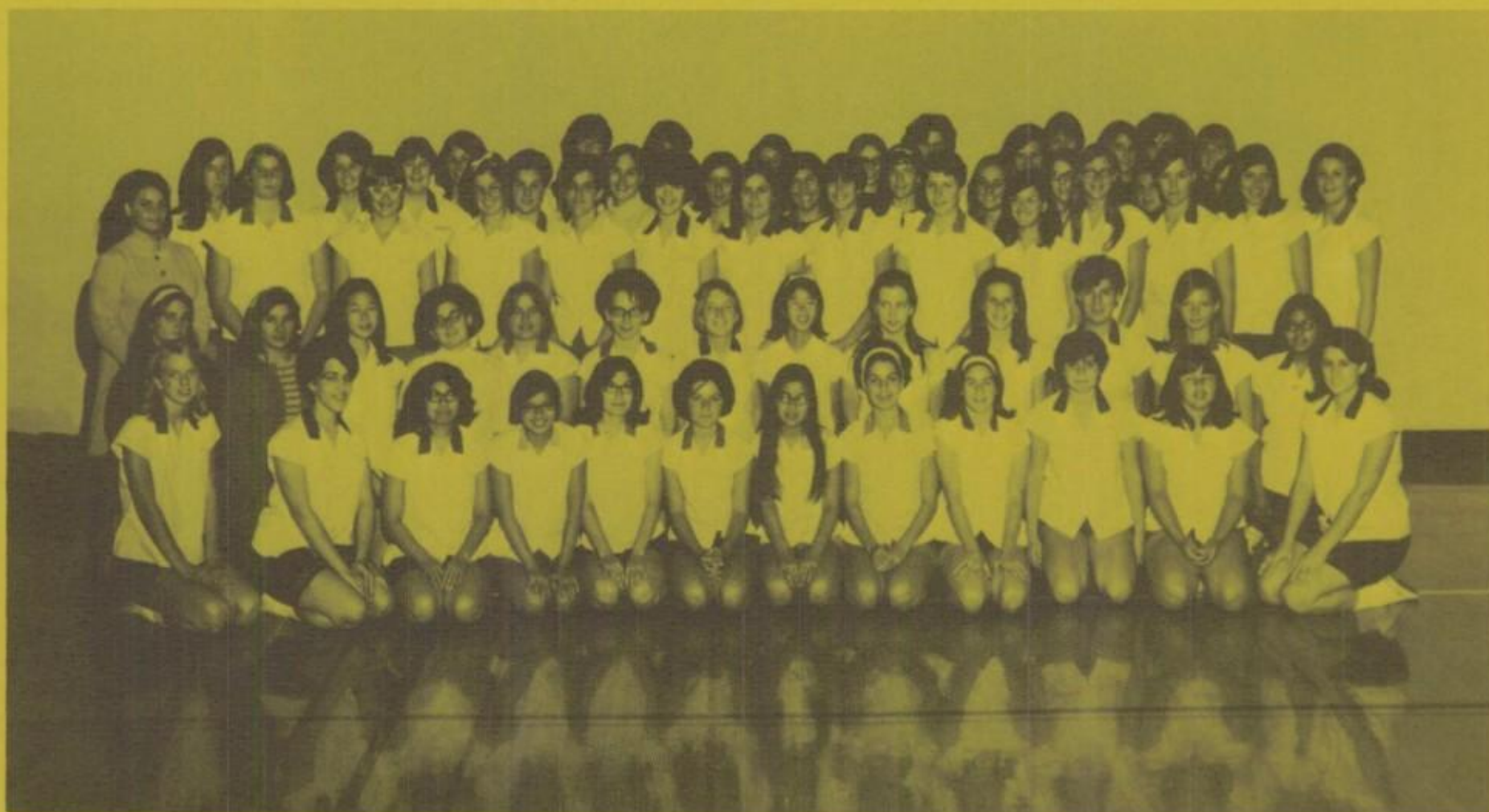
It is hoped that each girl who participates will have a better understanding of herself; both her abilities and limitations, and that she will respect these abilities in others.

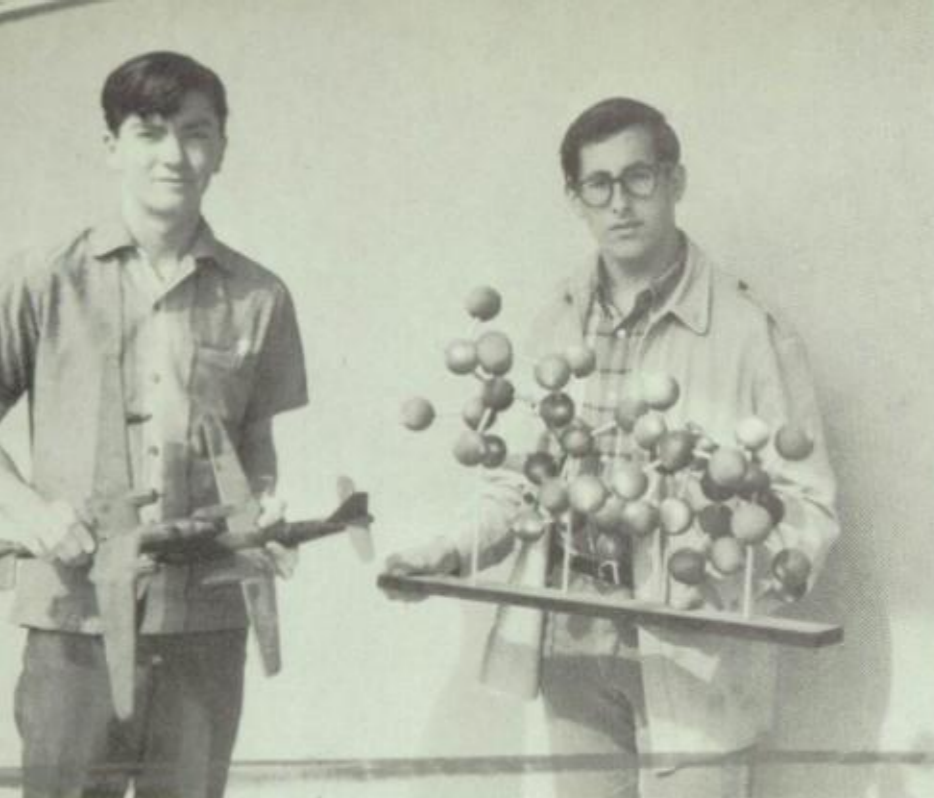
The band participates in the C.M.E.A. Festival, and the University of Nevada Festival, and again at the San Jose State affair.

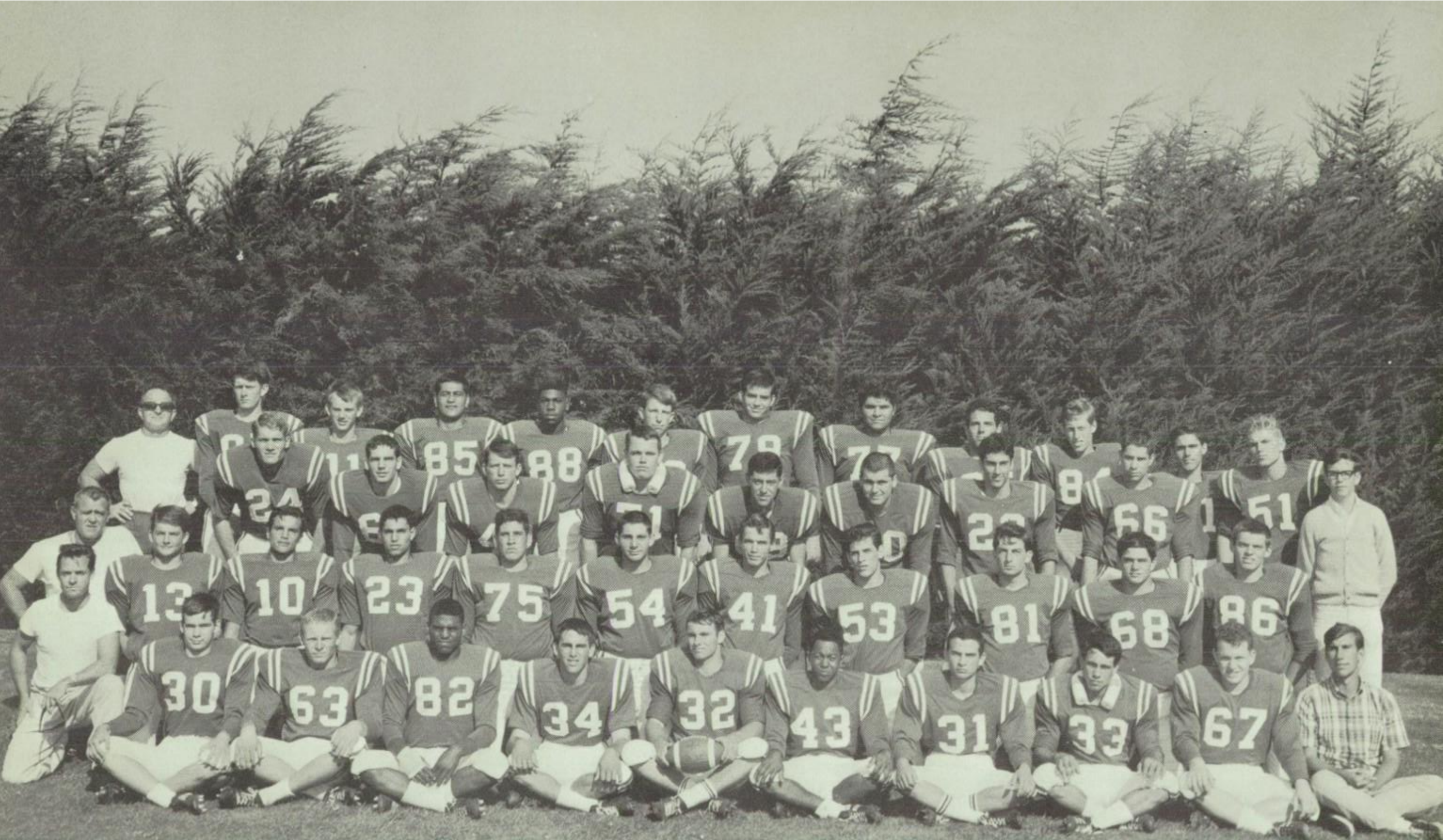

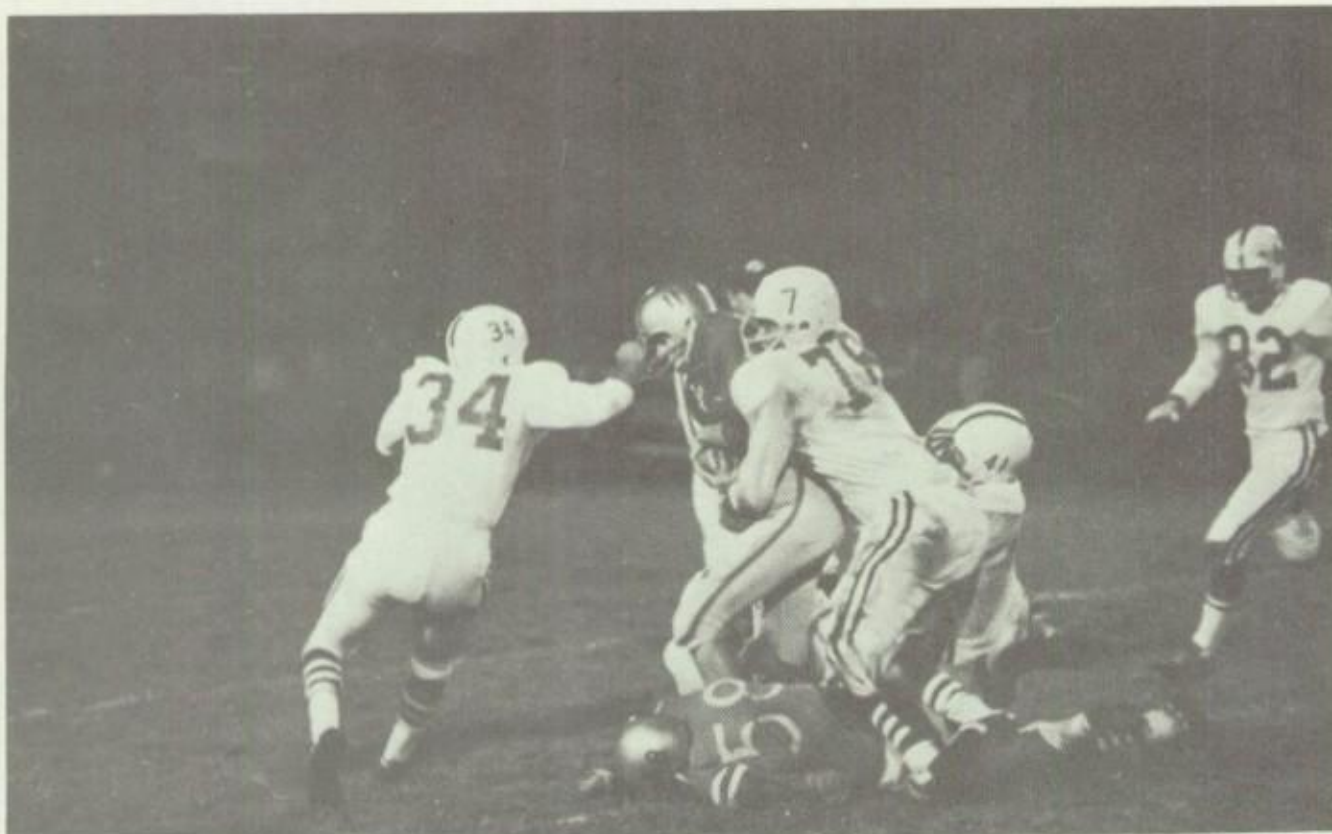

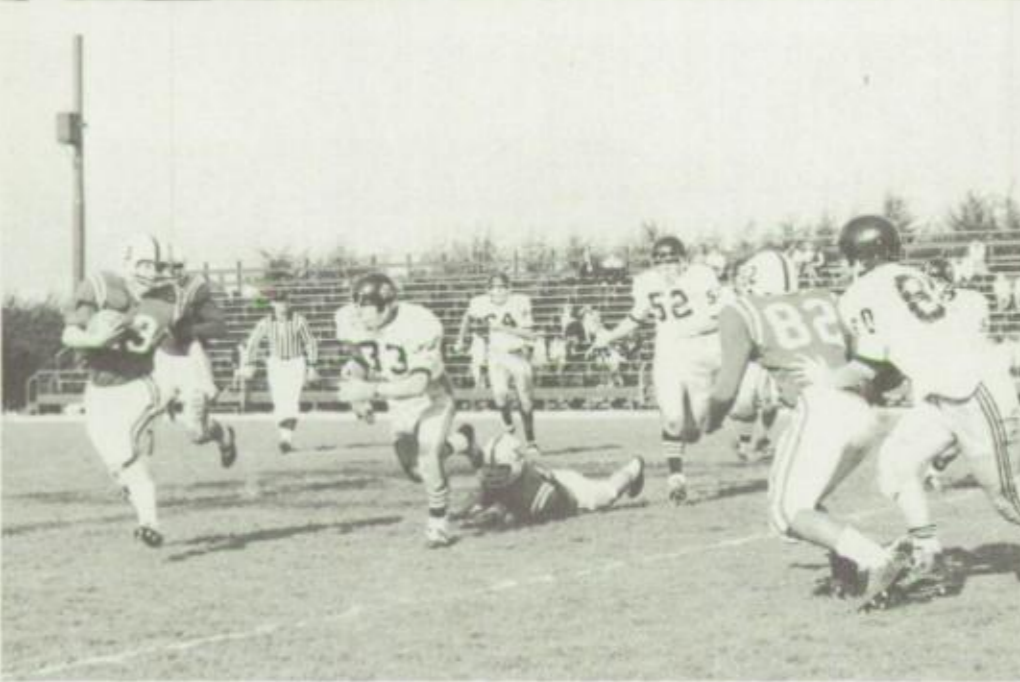

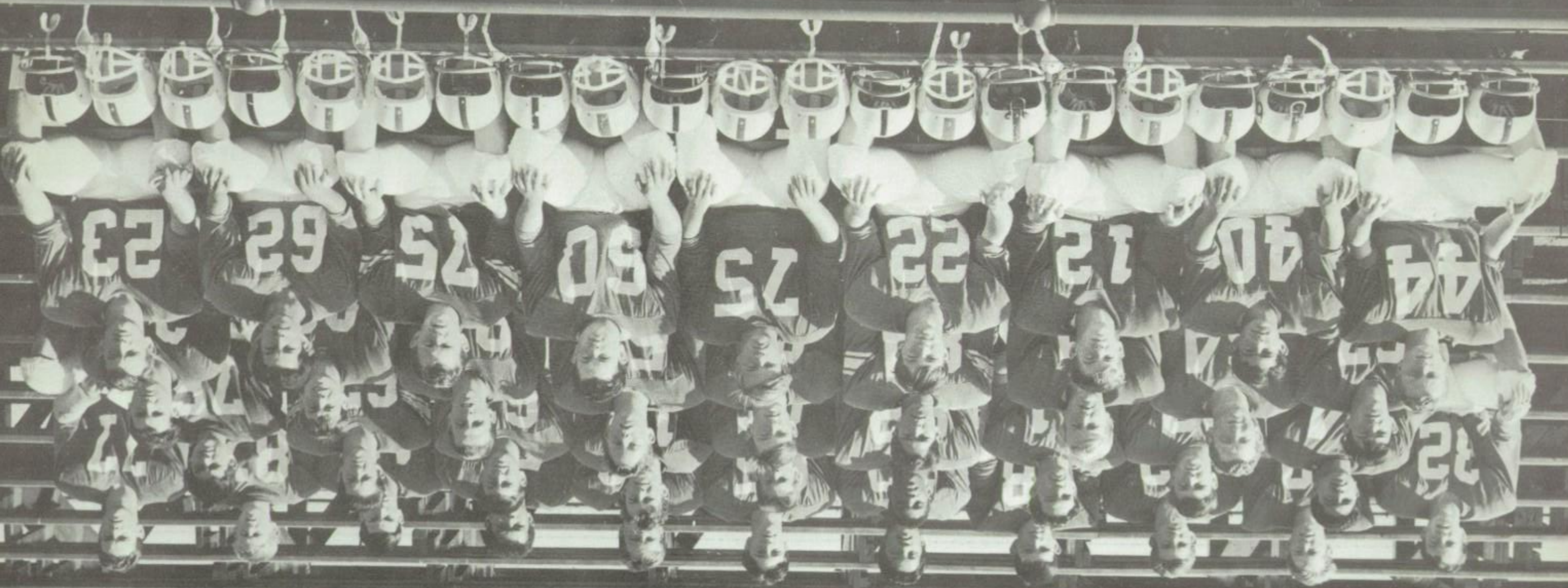

## CHAMPS !

"If championship frosh-soph teams are an indication of how well the school will do when the underclassmen make the transition to varsity, then South San Francisco's football domination is far from over," thus stated a local sportswriter at the ending of the 1967 football season.

The Braves' sophomore team have also won four straight NPL crowns! Coached by *Bud Goins* and *Sam Bonanno*, the team have captured 28 straight victories over a four year period, a feat similar to its "big brothers".

The past season saw the sophomore team gaining 276 yards per contest while yielding only 124, and scoring 192 points compared to the opposition's 39.

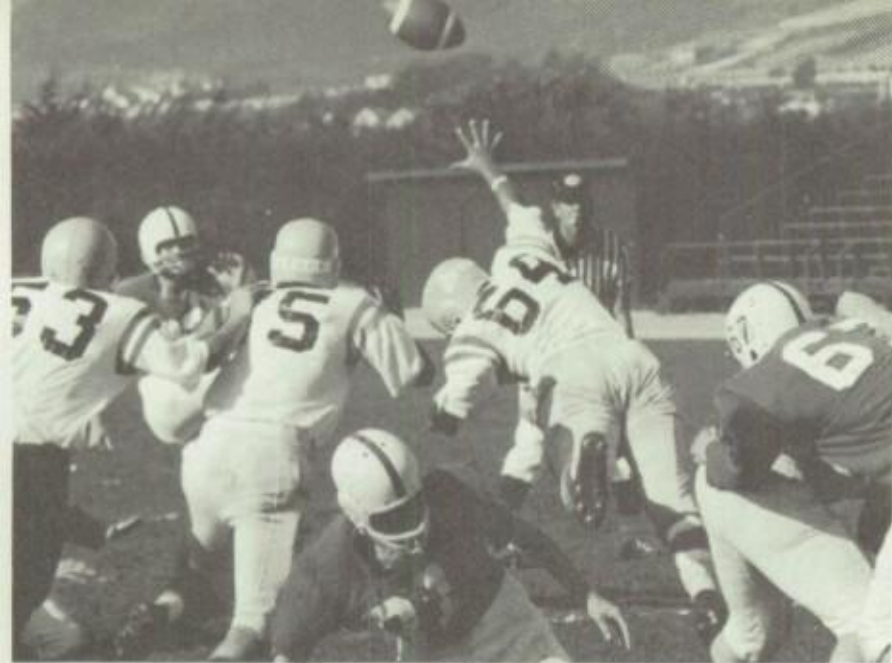

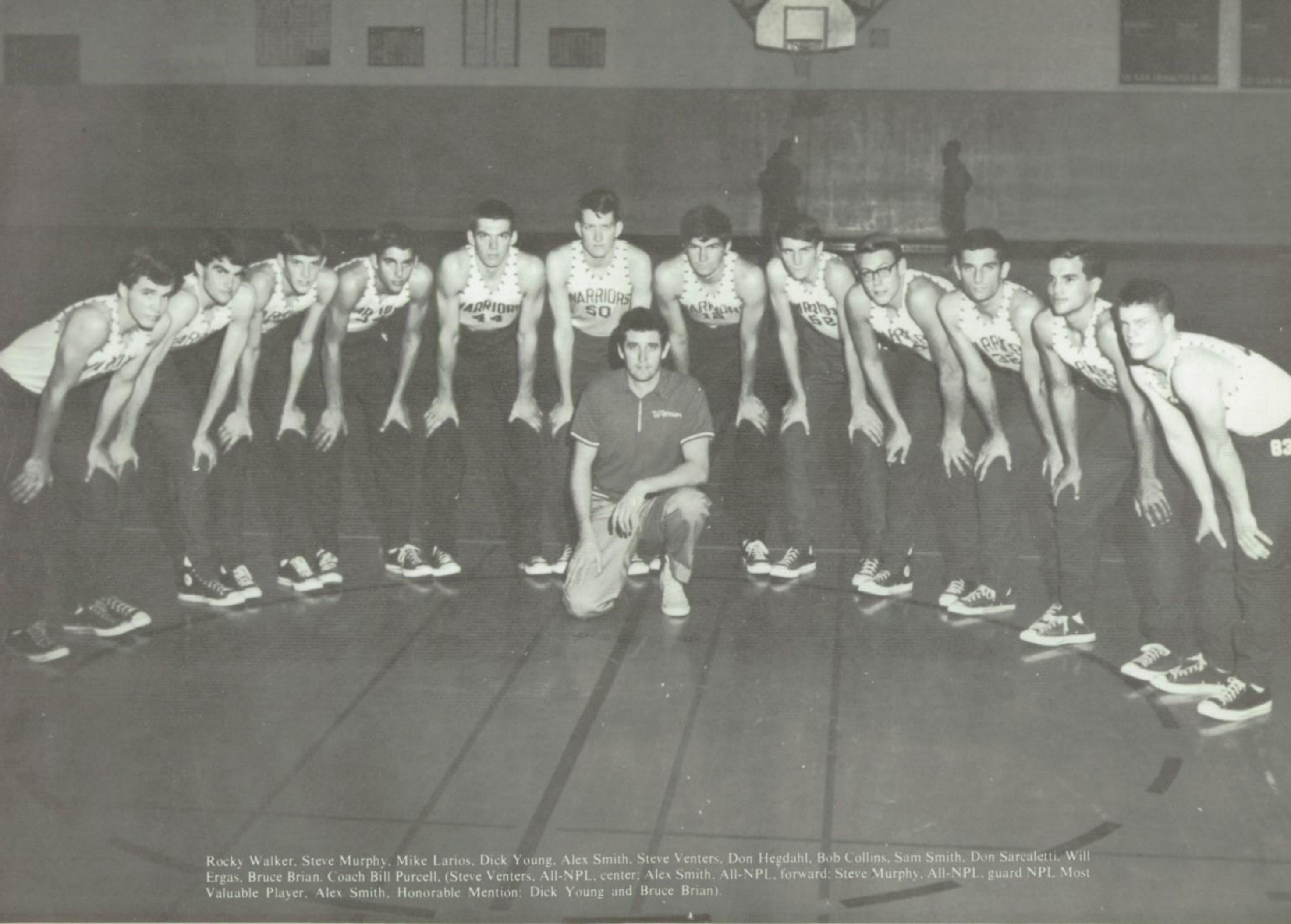

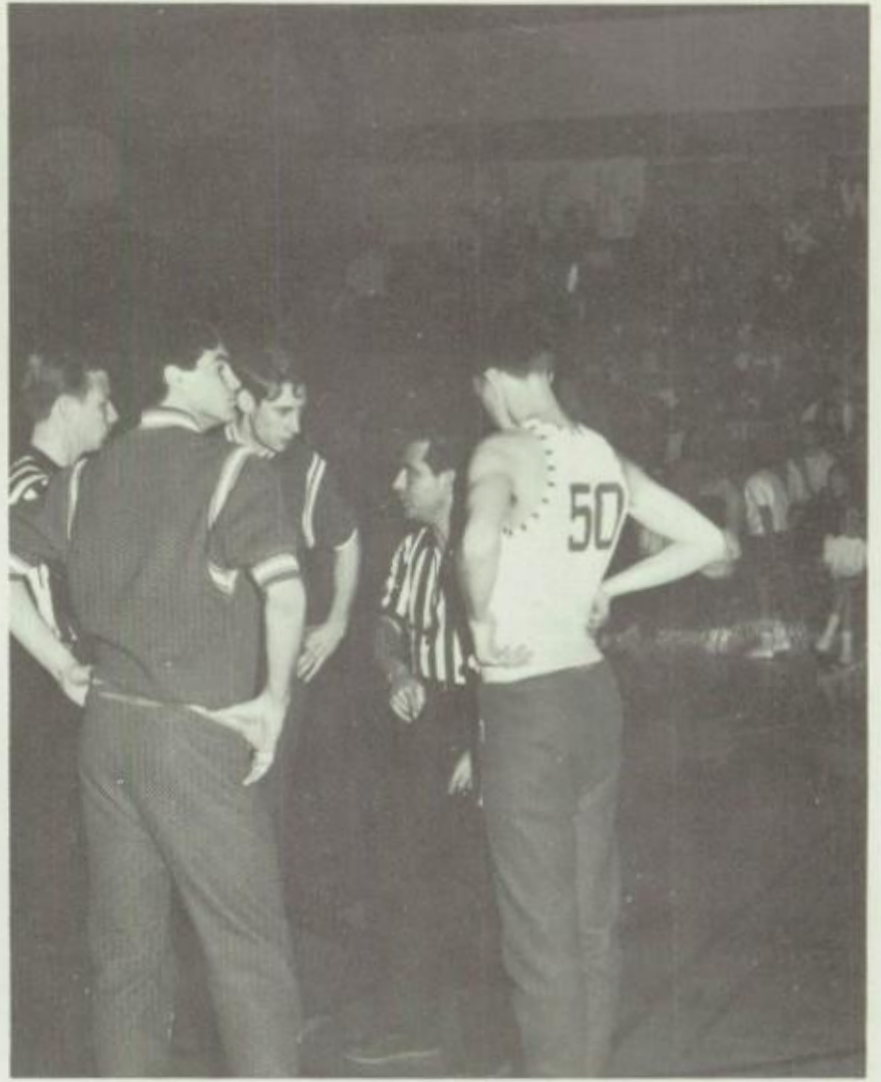

"Don't be a seer if you only think you know what is going to happen!"

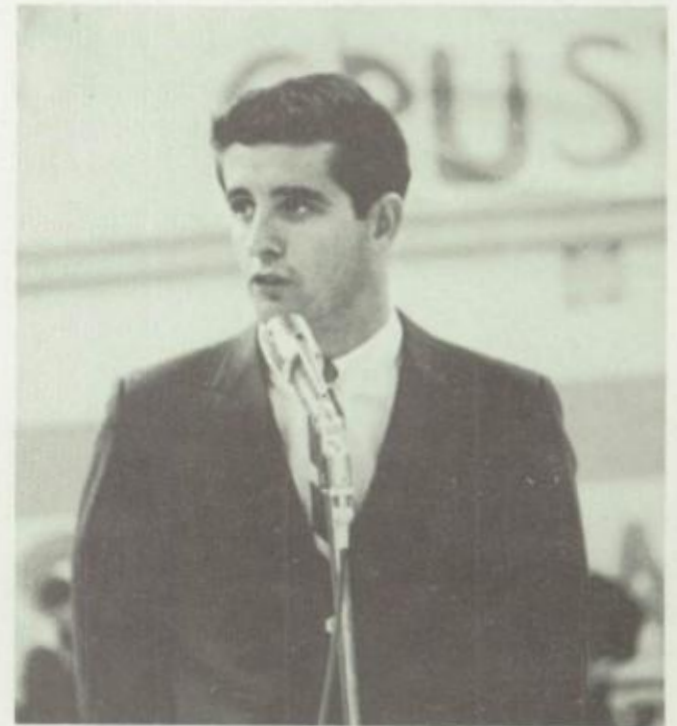
The above phrase can well apply to those prognosticators who, at the onset of the basketball season, refused to acknowledge the basketball superiority of Purcell's Warriors.

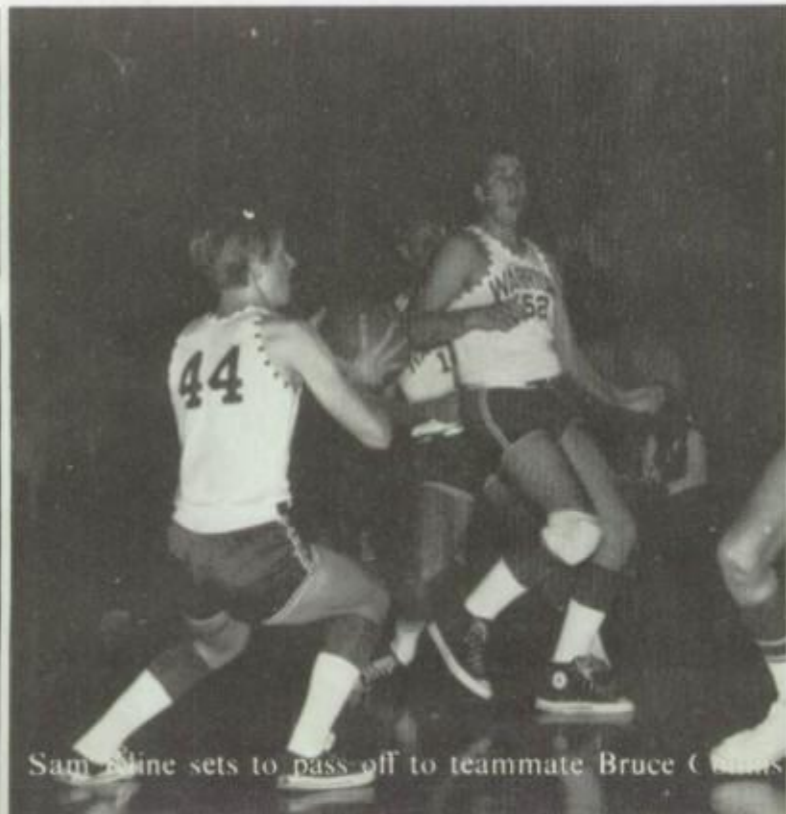

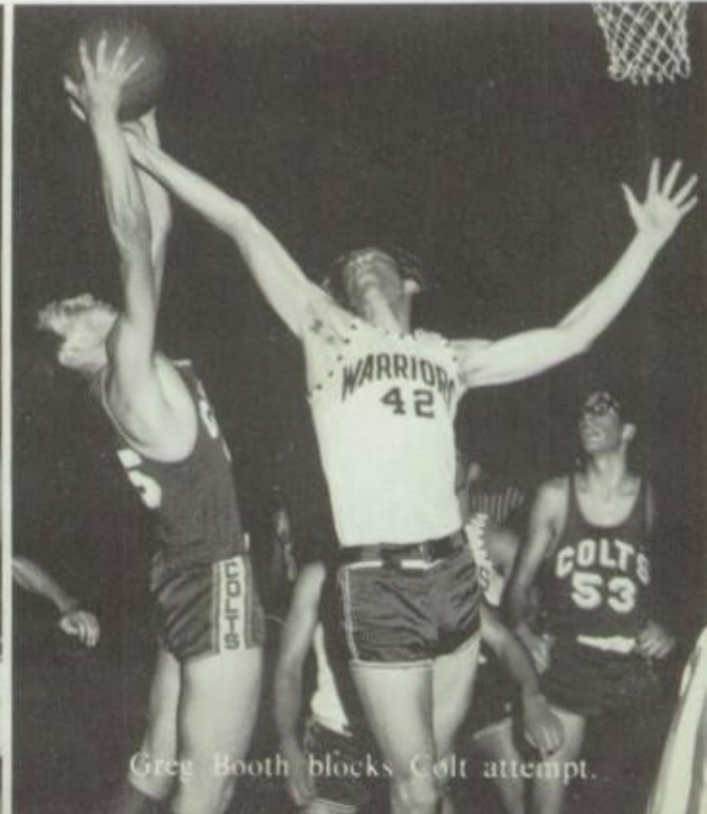

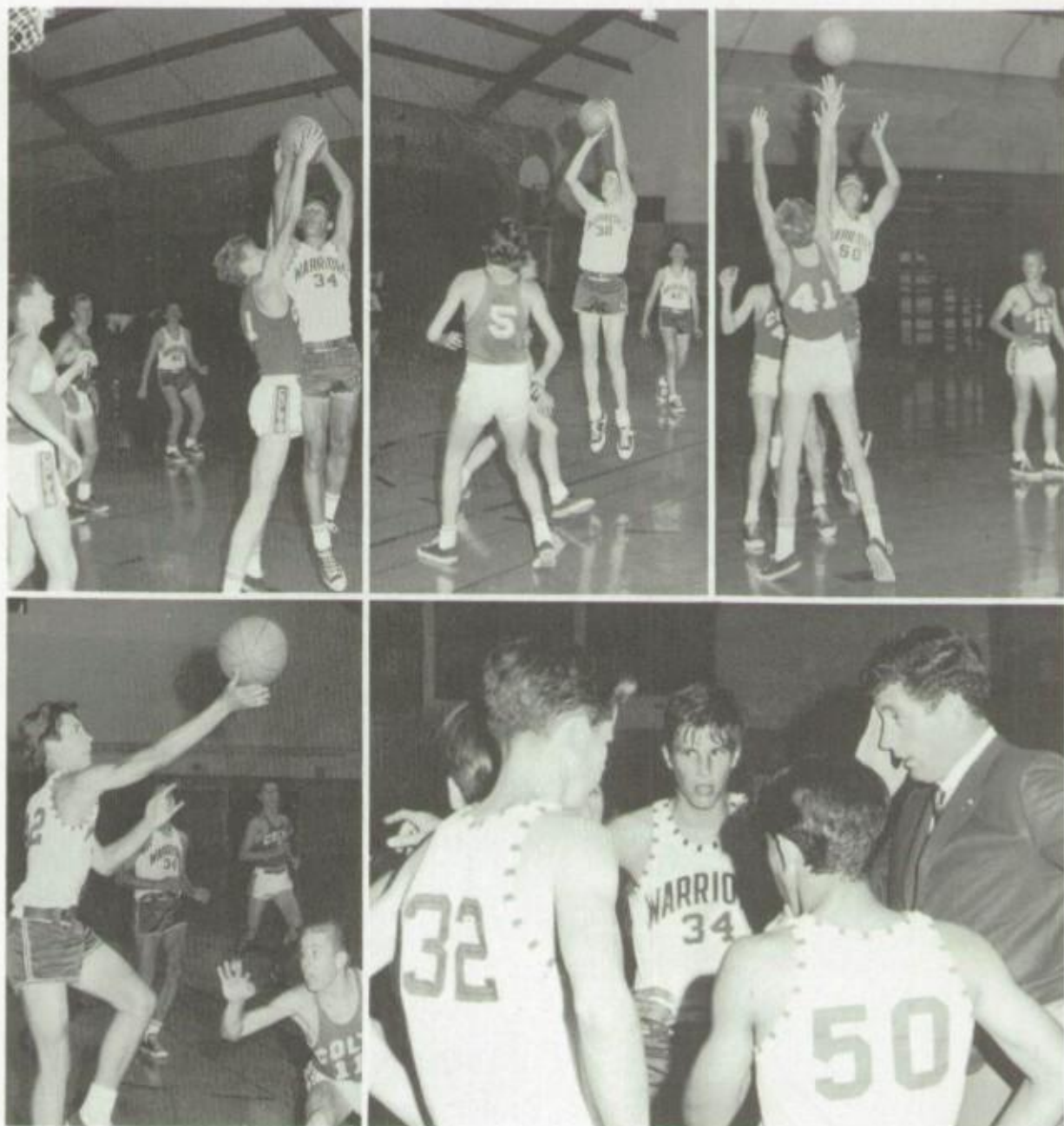


# C's TIE FOR SECOND

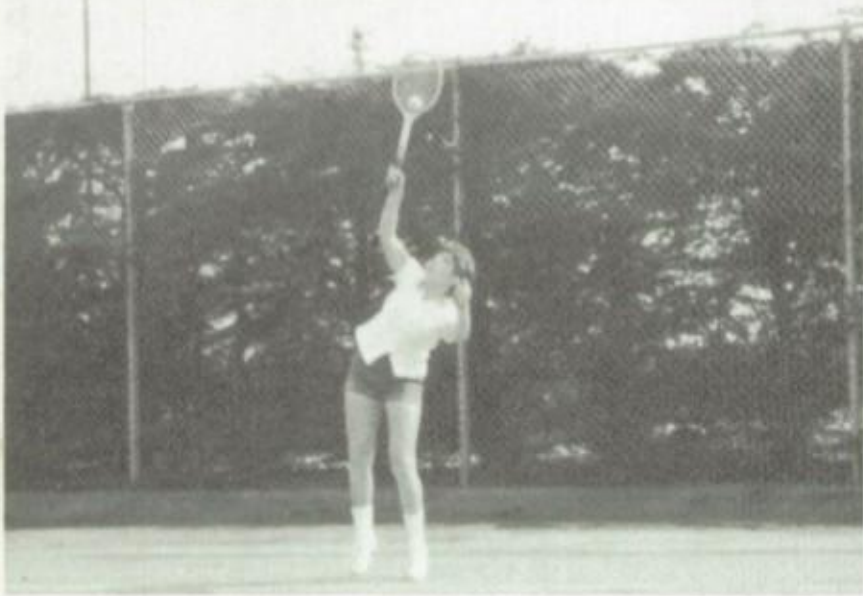
