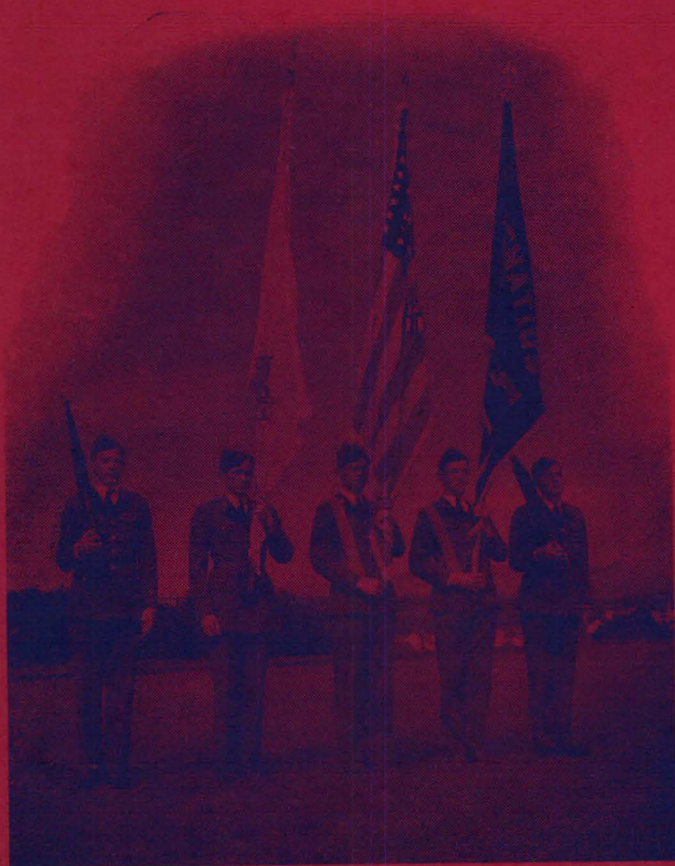

ST. IGNATIUS HIGH SCHOOL

History. St Ignatius High School is the preparatory department of the University of San Francisco, and like the University, it traces its foundation to those October days in 1855 when Reverend A. J. Maraschi inaugurated the educational work of the Jesuit Fathers in San Francisco by opening a school for boys in a one-room structure situated on the present site of The Emporium at what is now Market Street near Fifth. Here in 1862, in larger buildings, nearly five hundred boys were receiving their education. Later, from January 1880 until their destruction in April 1906, the High School shared with the College those memorable buildings on Hayes Street at Van Ness Avenue. After 1906 and until June 1929, St. Ignatius College and High School was quartered in a very inadequate building, constructed hurriedly in the first months after the fire and earthquake, on the corner of Hayes and Shrader Streets.

Through the generosity of the friends of the school, and notably through the magnificent gift of \$100,000 by the late Senator James D. Phelan, the present modern school building was constructed and made ready for use by August 1929.

Location. Situated on Stanyan Street at Turk, on an elevated slope to the south and west of Lone Mountain, the High School building commands a view of Golden Gate Park, the Richmond District, the Presidio, and the Pacific Ocean. The School is reached directly by the Turk Street (No. 31) cars, and quite conveniently by the Fulton Street (No. 5), or the Geary Street (B and C) cars.

System of Education. The educational system in use at the High School is guided by the principles set forth in the Ratio Studiorum, a body of rules and suggestions outlined by the most prominent Jesuit educators in 1599, revised in 1832, and attended up to the present day with unfailing success.

Truly psychological in its methods, and based upon the very nature of man's mental processes, it secures on the one hand that stability so essential to educational thoroughness, while on the other it is elastic and makes liberal allowances for the widely varying circumstances of time and place. While retaining, as far as possible, all that is unquestionably valuable in the older learning, it adopts and incorporates the best results of modern progress. It is a noteworthy fact, however, that many of the recently devised methods are admittedly and in reality mere revivals of devices recommended long ago in the Ratio Studiorum.

As understood by the Jesuits, education, in its complete sense, is the full and harmonious development of all those faculties that are distinctive of man. It is more than mere instruction or the communication of knowledge. The requirement of knowledge, though it necessarily pertains to any recognized system of education, is only a secondary result of education itself. Learning is an instrument of education, which has for its end, culture, and mental and moral development.

Consonant with this view of the purpose of education it is clear that only such means, such as Science, Language, and the rest, be chosen both in kind and amount, as will effectively further the purpose of education itself. A student cannot be forced, within the short period of his school course and with his immature faculties, to study a multiplicity of the languages and sciences into which the vast world of knowledge has been scientifically divided. It is evident, therefore, that the purpose of the mental training given is not proximately to fit the student for some special employment or profession, but to give him such a general, vigorous and rounded development as will enable him to cope successfully with the unforeseen emergencies of life. While affording mental stability, it tends to remove the insularity of thought and want of elasticity which is one of the most hopeless and disheartening results of specialization on the part of students who have not brought to their studies the uniform mental training given by a systematic high school course. The studies, therefore, are so graded and classified as to be adapted to the mental growth of the student and to the scientific unfolding of knowledge. They are so chosen and communicated that the student will gradually and harmoniously reach, as nearly as may be, that measure of culture of which he is capable.

It is fundamental in the Jesuit System that different studies have distinct educational values. Mathematics, the Natural Sciences, Languages, and History are complementary instruments of education to which the doctrine of equivalents can not be applied. The specific training given by the one can not be supplied by another. The best educators of the present day

are beginning to realize more fully than ever before that prescribed curricula, embracing well-chosen and co-ordinated studies, afford the student a more efficient means of mental cultivation and development. This, however, does not prohibit the offering of more than one of such systematic courses, in view of the future career of the individual. While recognizing the importance of Mathematics and the Natural Sciences, which unfold the inter-dependence and laws of the world of time and space, the Jesuit System of education has unwaveringly kept Language in a position of honor, as an instrument of culture. Mathematics and the Natural Sciences bring the student into contact with the material aspects of nature, and exercise the deductive and inductive powers of reason. Language and History effect a higher union. They are the manifestations of spirit to spirit, and by their study and their acquirement the whole mind of man is brought into the widest and subtlest play. The acquisition of Language especially calls for delicacy of judgment and fineness of perception, and for a constant, keen and quick use of the reasoning powers.

Finally, the Jesuit System does not share the delusion of those who seem to imagine that education, understood as enriching and stimulating the intellectual faculties, has of itself a morally elevating influence in human life. While conceding the effects of education in energizing and refining the student's imagination, taste, understanding and powers of observation, it has always held that knowledge and intellectual development, of themselves, have no moral efficacy. Religion alone can purify the heart and guide and strengthen the will. This being the case, the Jesuit System aims at developing side by side the moral and intellectual faculties of the student, and sending forth into the world men of sound judgment, of acute and rounded intellect, of upright and manly conscience. It maintains, that to be effective, morality is to be taught continuously, it must be the underlying base, the vital force supporting and animating the whole organic structure of education. It must be the atmosphere that the student breathes; it must suffuse with its light all that he reads, illuminating what is noble, and exposing what is base, giving to the true and false their relative light and shade. In a word, the purpose of Jesuit teaching is to lay a solid substructure in the whole mind and character for any superstructure of science, professional and special, as well as for the upholding of moral life, civil and religious.

Rating of the School. The High School is included on the list of Accredited schools published by the office of the Examiner of Schools of the State University. The State University is the official accrediting agency for the State of California.

The School also maintains membership in the National Catholic Educational Association; in the American Jesuit Educational Association; and in the Western Association of Schools and Colleges.

Endowment and Increased Facilities. At present the sole endowment of the High School is in the lives of the consecrated religious who devote themselves for no salary to the

work of Catholic Education. Their services, although equivalent to thousands of dollars annually, make it barely possible to operate the school on a satisfactory basis with the aid of fees collected for tuition and the occasional gifts of friends. There is a vast field here for generous benefactors who believe in the type of education that St. Ignatius High School has given and is giving to the boys of San Francisco. Those wishing to associate themselves with this work may donate towards the establishment of an endowment fund by founding a scholarship, or towards the maintenance of adequate library and laboratory facilities.



THE PROPOSED GYMNASIUM

Twenty-five thousand dollars has been collected for the Gymnasium Fund. Over one hundred thousand dollars will be needed to finance an adequate building.

Competitive Scholarships. By agreement among the Catholic High Schools of the Archdiocese, Competitive Scholarships are not to be made available to eighth grade graduates. Students who need the aid of a scholarship should present themselves to the school Treasurer at 2130 Fulton Street.

For those who wish to include the High School among their beneficiaries, a convenient form of bequest would be:

SCHOLARSHIPS

The Lewis Scholarship. During the year 1928 the sum of \$6400.00 was presented to the High School as a fund for an annual scholarship. This scholarship was given in memory of Charles F. Lewis, a student of the High School at the time of his death, and is to be known as the **Charles F. Lewis Scholarship**. Its object is the education of deserving boys and the award is to be made annually by a faculty committee.

The John Gallwey Scholarship Fund. During the year 1940 the sum of \$2500.00 was presented by Neil Powers as a permanent fund to help in the education of deserving boys. This fund is to bear the name of the donor's distinguished friend, Doctor John Gallwey in whose memory it was established, and the scholarship which it supports is to be awarded at the discretion of a faculty committee.

Loss of a Scholarship will result at once, should a scholarship student drop below eighty-five per cent in his studies, or prove unsatisfactory in conduct.

EXPENSES

As the institution is not endowed, it is partly supported by the fees paid for tuition. All fees are payable in advance in monthly or half-yearly installments, the latter being preferred.

All tuition and fees are payable strictly in advance. The tuition, however, may be paid monthly in advance without special arrangement.

Please note: No student will be admitted to a semester examination, be granted any diploma, certificate or credit until his account has been satisfactorily settled with the Treasurer.

GENERAL REGULATIONS

1. **Administration.** The administrative offices of the President and Treasurer are located not in the high school building but in the faculty residence at 2130 Fulton Street.

All arrangements pertaining to financial matters or the payment of tuition must be made directly with the school Treasurer. Appointments may be made by phoning SKYline 1663.

2. Admission. Every candidate for admission must present testimonials of his good moral character and satisfactory credits from the school he has previously attended. Students to enter First Year must have completed the eighth grade of Grammar School.

Entrance Examinations. Students entering the First Year (or ninth grade) must take entrance examinations in fundamental English and Arithmetic. These examinations will be given on the third Saturday in May and the second Saturday in June. An entrance examination will be given before the opening of school in September only when the quota of students is not filled before that time. Prospective students are asked to register early, to take the entrance examination, and to notify the school whether they wish to do the examination in May or June.

3. Credits. The progress of each student is determined as well by his daily class work as by his period and semester examinations. The school year is divided into two semesters and each semester is divided into three periods. A comprehensive examination is given at the end of each period, and at the end of each semester. After each of these examinations a report of the student's standing is prepared for the information of parents. These reports indicate the quality of work being done by the student and merit serious attention. Marks from 93 to 100 are of A quality and indicate excellent performance; marks from 85 to 92 are of B quality and indicate good work; marks from 78 to 84 are of C quality and indicate fair work; marks from 70 to 77 are of D quality and indicate barely satisfactory work. Marks below 70 are unsatisfactory and may indicate that the student is deficient either in class application and home study, or in ability. Parents are urged to encourage their sons to strive for at least a B average.

The examination at the close of each semester is weighted to count as one third of the semester average. The final grade or average for each semester should not be lower than 70. When, however, superior work in the second semester more than averages slightly unsatisfactory work in the first semester, a satisfactory final average for the year will be given. Such will not be the case when the final average of the second semester is unsatisfactory.

Promotion. The progress of a student towards graduation from high school is measured by the number of courses satisfactorily completed year by year. It is common practice to assign him four courses each year so that in four years he will have completed sixteen courses and so merit graduation. In most communities in California an additional three or four courses, i.e., one each year, in Physical Education are required. Obviously then a student is said to have second year standing when he has successfully completed four courses; third year standing when he has completed eight courses, and fourth year standing when he has completed twelve courses. No

student can be presented for graduation, therefore, unless he has satisfactorily completed sixteen courses of study in addition to three or four courses in Physical Education.

Successful completion of a course in Fundamental Religion, assigned to Catholic students during each of the four years, is an additional requirement for receiving a diploma of graduation.

A student passes a course when he earns a semester average of 70 per cent. All marks below 70 per cent are unsatisfactory. Unsatisfactory marks, however, are of two kinds. Marks below 60 per cent are outright failures so that the course must be repeated before credit can be allowed. Marks between 60 and 69 per cent are outright failures only if a student has more than two such failures in any one year. A student who has two or less "conditioned failures" is allowed an examination at the end of the Summer Recess to raise the unsatisfactory grade to 70 per cent. Should a student fail to appear for this examination, or should he not succeed in raising the mark, his "conditioned failure" becomes an outright failure and he must repeat the subject in class.

A student is said to have failed for the year and is likely to be dismissed when he is an outright failure in two or more subjects, or a "conditioned failure" in three subjects.

Student Failures. A student who fails for the year either by reason of three conditions or two failures (as explained above) will ordinarily be asked to go elsewhere as the school will not keep in its classes boys who are indolent about their education. When for some good reason a pupil is allowed an opportunity to repeat a subject, or group of subjects, he will be on probation, and will be expected to leave should he do unsatisfactory work for the second time in any course.

Delayed Examinations. When a student is absent during the times assigned for Period or Semester examinations, he will be allowed, on payment of the established fine, to take delayed examinations at a definitely appointed time. Should he, without grave cause, again absent himself, he will forfeit all right to credit in the examination and his record will be marked accordingly.

Exemptions. No student in the fourth year classes will be exempted from examinations. Students, however, in the lower classes who have received a mark of 90 per cent or over for any subject in each period of both semesters will be exempted from the final June examination in that subject.

High School Diploma. To be eligible for a diploma of graduation, students must complete a minimum of nineteen five-period courses. Three of these may be in Physical Education and Military Training. At least sixteen courses must be in Academic subjects, including not less than two years of Latin and the minimum subject requirements for entrance to college. Diplomas are classified as follows: To a student who completes less than four years of Latin is awarded the **General Diploma**; to a student who completes four years of Latin is awarded the

Classical Diploma: to a student who completes four years of Latin and two years of Greek is awarded the **Honorary Classical Diploma.**

Recommendation. Students who plan to enter select colleges must from the very beginning of their course seek grades of high value. Colleges will not usually admit without examination students who are unable to present a number of recommending units or credits. A recommending mark in this high school is 85 per cent. When a teacher gives such a mark he signifies that in his opinion the student can be expected to pursue the subject with success in college.

Student Report Cards. There are three period examinations during each of the two semesters of the school year, and after each of these a report of the student's work is prepared for the parents. This report is mailed usually two weeks after the period examinations. When the report card is stamped "unsatisfactory", parents are advised to inquire about the reason and seek a remedy.

Parents' Nights. Early in each semester, a night will be selected and announced when the faculty will be in the classrooms from seven thirty to nine thirty o'clock to receive parents and discuss student progress. It is suggested that parents take advantage of this opportunity to help their sons, especially when report cards indicate that the boy is doing poorly. Parents may call at other times, though these visits will be more satisfactory if arranged by appointment.

Home Study and Duty of Parents. All the endeavors of the Faculty will fail to ensure success unless the students prepare with diligence and constancy their home exercises and recitations to be given in class. Parents, therefore, are respectfully urged to do their duty to see that their sons devote at least **two hours every day** to the study of their lessons and to the preparation of their written home assignments. **This home study should be in addition to whatever time they are allowed for study during school hours.** Students who come unprepared to recite are looked upon as morally absent, and, like absentees, they must bring satisfactory written excuses from their parents to the Director of Studies to avoid censure.

4. Regularity and Punctuality. Classes assemble at 8:45 in the morning, and are dismissed at 3:05 in the afternoon. The noon recess begins at 12:00 and ends at 1:00.

No student should be absent at any time, except for the most serious reasons. When a student must be absent with good cause, parents should notify the Vice-Principal at once, **by telephone if possible**, and when the student returns to school he must present a note of excuse for the school files stating the cause of the absence.

When parents desire their sons to be absent, the matter should be referred to the Principal beforehand by means of a written note which will obtain his approval. All notes received are kept on file as a record of the causes of absence or tardiness.

All Written Work required from a class during a pupil's absence must be handed into the teacher as soon after the pupil's return to school as possible. In the case of rather prolonged absence, the pupil is required to pass written examinations on the class-work completed during his absence.

No student who is tardy, or who has been absent, will be permitted to enter the class-room without having obtained a note from the Prefect of Discipline.

During the noon recess no student will be allowed to leave the school premises except where a written note from parents expressly states that they wish him to come **home** for lunch **regularly** every day. Otherwise it is required that students either eat lunch in the school cafeteria or bring their own lunch. For the protection of their sons, parents are requested to give honest cooperation to the faculty in this matter.

Students are not permitted to make appointments with the doctor or dentist for an hour which comes within the school day.

5. Street Car Student Rate. The street car operators make available for students a reduced rate. Certificates to obtain this rate may be had at the office of the Vice-Principal. Street car tickets may be purchased at the student book store.

6. Conduct. The Faculty expects from all students the manners and deportment of gentlemen and in justice to itself it must take cognizance of any misconduct of its students, though committed outside of school. Though the government of the

school is mild rather than severe, yet for the maintenance of order and discipline, without which good results are impossible, punctual attendance, strict obedience, assiduous application and blameless conduct are required of every student. Any serious neglect of these essential points subjects the offender to effective correction and even to dismissal.

The hazing or "initiation" of students is strictly forbidden either within or beyond the school premises. Reports concerning this matter will be given most serious consideration, and offenders will be punished, or even dismissed from the school.

Smoking is forbidden in the school buildings, at athletic contests and in the vicinity of the school, under severe penalties.

7. Fraternities and Clubs. An Act of March 13, 1909, of the California Legislature makes it unlawful for any pupil in any secondary school of this State "to join or become a member of any secret fraternity, sorority or club," made up of pupils in the public schools, or to take part in its organization or formation, and it requires Boards of Education to suspend or expel any pupil who refuses or neglects to observe the provisions of the Act.

St. Ignatius High School, recognizing the wisdom of this legislation, and earnestly desiring to maintain the whole-hearted spirit of equality and democratic simplicity that has hitherto marked the attitude of all its students toward one another, forbids any of its students to form or be members of any such organization, and will visit with the punishment of expulsion any violation of this Act of the Legislature.

8. Religion and Morals. To attain the end which the Faculty of St. Ignatius High School has set before themselves, the intellectual and moral advancement of their charges, the habitual use by these of the means of grace is absolutely necessary. Catholic students are therefore urged to receive frequently the Sacraments of Penance and Holy Eucharist.

It is an established custom that all Catholic students be present for the 8:00 o'clock Communion Mass on the First Friday of each month of the school year. This public corporate act of Faith on the part of the students is so essential a function of the school program that excuses for absence should not be sought, nor will they be easily accepted. The cooperation of parents in fostering this public act of devotion to the Sacred Heart is earnestly requested. Morning classes are not begun until 9:35 on the First Friday.

A special instruction is given weekly on the principles of Christianity; and once each year, three days are devoted to the Spiritual Exercises of St. Ignatius in the Students' Retreat. Students not of the Catholic Faith are expected to conform respectfully to the religious exercises of the school.

9. Medical Service. Through cooperation with the Department of Health students receive the same public health service as those in tax supported schools. A nurse from the Health Department visits the school each Tuesday and Friday.

10. **Withdrawal of Students.** When the withdrawal of students is contemplated, courtesy requires that due notice be given to the school authorities.

STUDIES

General Statement. In the choice of subjects for study, little is left to the discretion of the student. The course of studies lasts four years, and is planned in accordance with the principles of education previously stated under the heading, System of Education. It aims at imparting a thorough general training through "the harmonious development of all the faculties distinctive of man." At the same time, it fully satisfies the subject requirements for entrance to standard colleges.

The study of Latin Classics is required of all students, and some Greek is prescribed for able students on the well-founded theory that there is no better means than these of inspiring proper delicacy of judgment, fineness of perception, and concentrated, keen, quick use of the reasoning powers. In English and Social Subjects, Mathematics, and Science, the program set down follows the usual division of subjects in approved high school courses.

Schedule of Studies. During each of the four years of high school, all Catholic students will be assigned to a course in the **Fundamentals of Religion.**

During the first two years of high school each student is assigned the following curriculum:

(Note: Students who during the first year have maintained an average of **B** or **85 per cent** in their studies, will be assigned to special classes in Greek during the second year.)

A one semester course in **typing** for which no academic credit is allowed is offered as optional for students who wish to profit by this service.

From the following three groups of courses each student may select **one entire group** at the end of the second year. In making his selection the student should be guided by his plans for College entrance.

Physical Education and Military Training. In addition to the academic courses, each student will be required to complete one year of Physical Education, and two years of Military Training. A third year of Military Training may be pursued by interested students. Those completing the third year satisfactorily receive a Certificate.

Exemption from Physical Education classes will be granted by the Directors of Physical Education, but only on advice of the Medical Examiner.

Exemption from Military Training will be granted by the Professor of Military Science and Tactics, but only for the following reasons: Inability to drill by reason of physical disability, as certified to by the Medical Examiners; or non-citizenship of the United States.

ACCELERATION OF STUDENTS DURING THE WAR

To cooperate with those who believe that there are certain advantages to be gained during the war by graduation from high school in less than four years, we are prepared to grant a diploma of graduation to students who by taking extra courses complete the minimum requirements for graduation in less than four years. Such students, however, will receive the General Diploma unless they have completed all requirements for the other diplomas.

Students who leave school before completing the minimum requirements for graduation are advised that this school will not accept work experience or military training as equivalent to academic courses necessary for graduation. When approval has been obtained, academic courses done in schools listed by the Army and Navy Institute and credited as satisfactory by them will be accepted in fulfillment of graduation requirements.

LIBRARY

For the convenience of teachers and students in the preparation of supplementary assignments, the school maintains a Library of approximately five thousand volumes and subscribes to about thirty representative magazines and periodicals. The

Library is under the direction of Mrs. A. Twaddel. The Library is open daily from 8:15 until 4:30 p.m.

Students may borrow books from the Library under the following conditions:

1. They must have a Library Card, which will be issued on request to those presenting an Associated Student membership card.

2. They must accept responsibility for books borrowed on their card and be prepared to replace lost or damaged books to the satisfaction of the librarian.

3. They must return books when due, or submit to a two-cent fine for each extra day.

Students are urged to use the Library as a means of acquiring and developing wholesome reading habits for life, and are cautioned that the fullest advantage for all can be obtained only when those who use the Library respect its properties, and maintain such silence and decorum as is conducive to reading and study.

Those who damage books or disturb other students may expect to lose their right to the use of the Library.

TEXT BOOKS

The approximate cost of a complete set of books for the first year is ten dollars. From the second year on, the cost is somewhat higher. All text books may be secured from the Student Book Store.

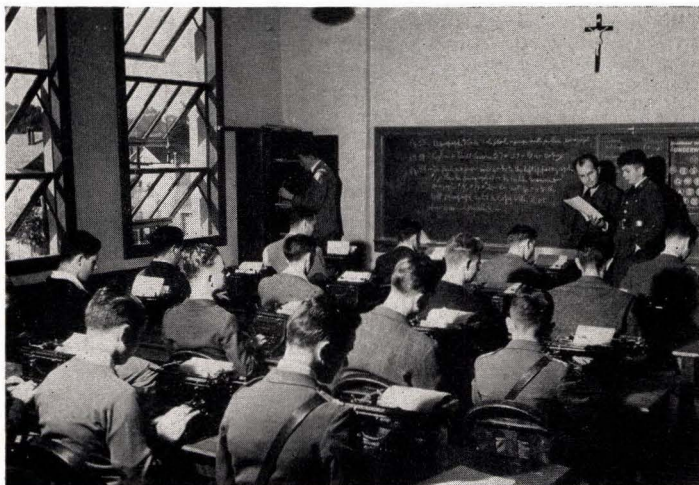

ORGANIZATIONS

The Congress, with membership limited to Sophomores. Moderator, Mr. Thomas F. Flynn, S.J. M.A.

The High School Orchestra and Band offer opportunities for musical development and furnish programs for public literary exercises, military and athletic events. Moderator, Mr. John A. Brady, S.J.

The Associated Students is the corporate organization of students of St. Ignatius High School of self-government and direction according to the measure permitted it.
