## Administrative Team

This year our administrative structure consists of four basic extensions: the principal, Sister Celeste; the vice-principal, Sister Sharon; the Dean of Students, Ms. Hack; and the Dean of Studies, Mr. May. By the means of new committees, more members of the faculty and student body are involved in making the necessary decisions. In this manner, the administration has been able to form a bridge between the faculty and the students.

In her position as Principal, Sister Celeste is generally responsible for the overall running of the school. Sister views herself as someone who works within the school community ensuring that Christian values and attitudes are evident in the atmosphere of the school. Sister also works with the faculty and Religious Activities Council to clarify the purpose of Saint Rose, and to help the teachers, the students and their parents grow in faith. Sister Celeste defines her role as that "of a bridge between the philosophy and goals of Saint Rose and the internalization of these values by the students."

Sister Sharon is vice-principal, and she views her part in the administration as one of suggesting fresh ideas, evaluating feedback and revising proposals, which lead to the result of a smooth and effective relationship between the students and faculty.

Ms. Hack, in the role of Dean of Students, feels she is a part of the support system which counsels and sets limits for the students. "Some appreciate this support, others come to appreciate it later, and I imagine there will always be the few who never reach the level of appreciation."

Mr. May's role as Dean of Studies spans from planning and scheduling classes to the counseling of students in need of academic help. He also relates to the administrative team the concerns brought to him by the students.

These four people form the administration. As with a suspension bridge, the administration is the supporting cable which joins the faculty with the Student Body to form a greater union, the Saint Rose Community.



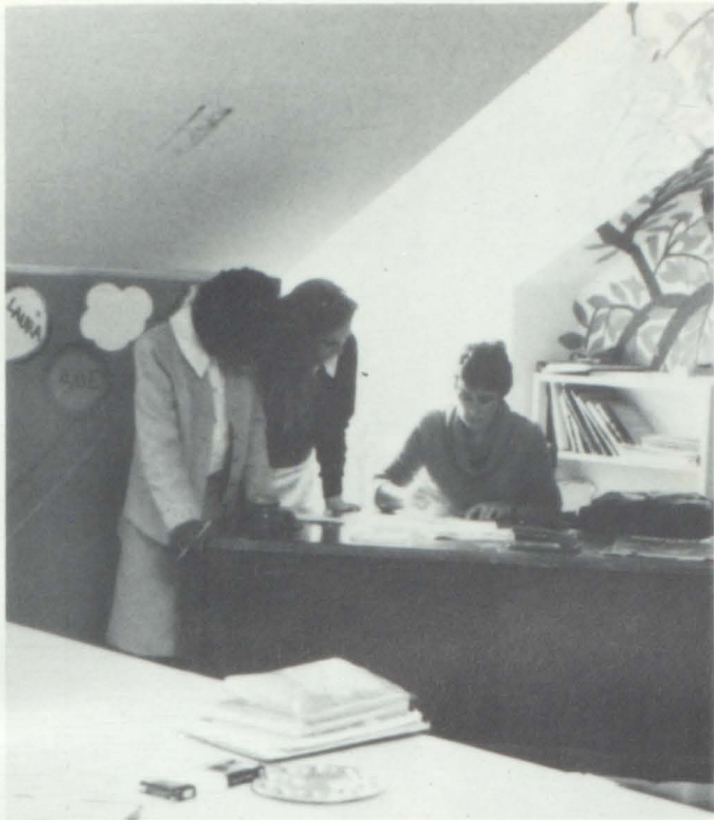

Sister Sharon Cross, O.P.—Vice-Principal



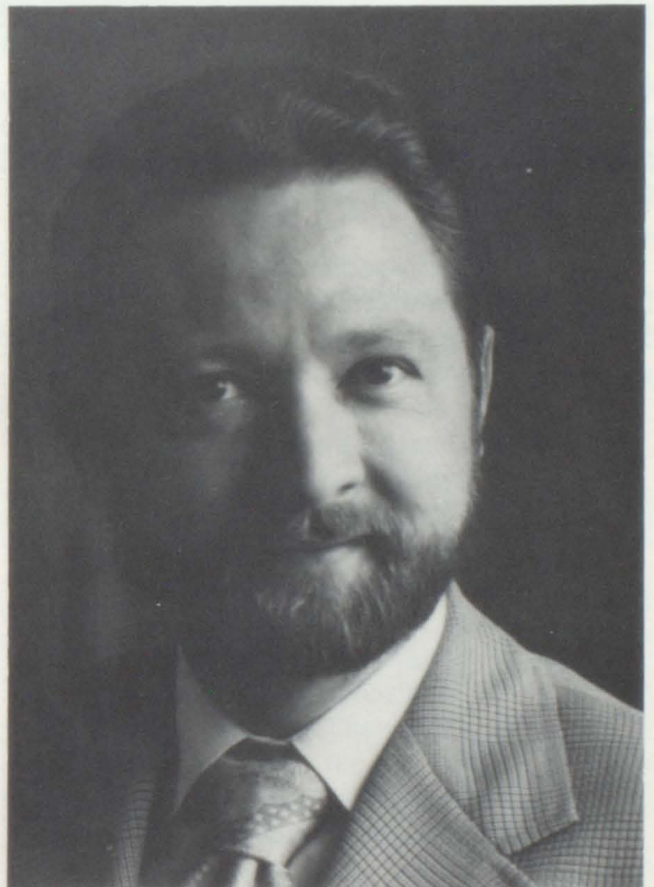

# Peace And Social Action

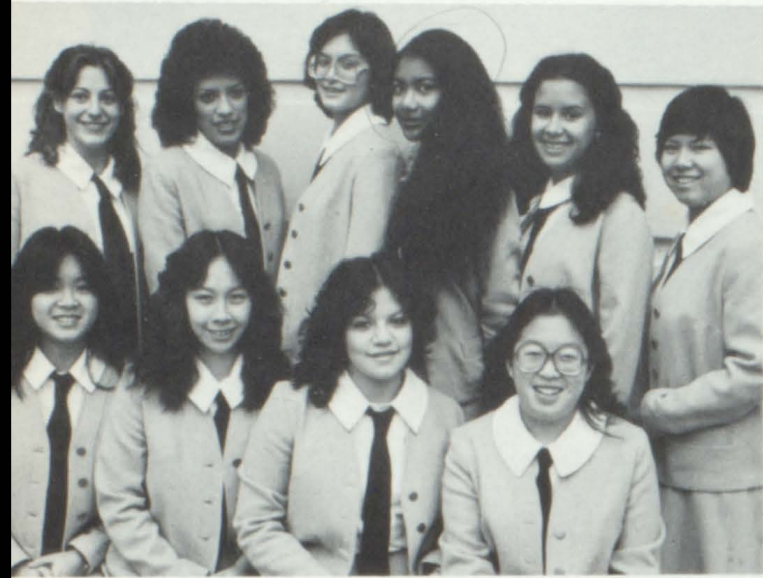



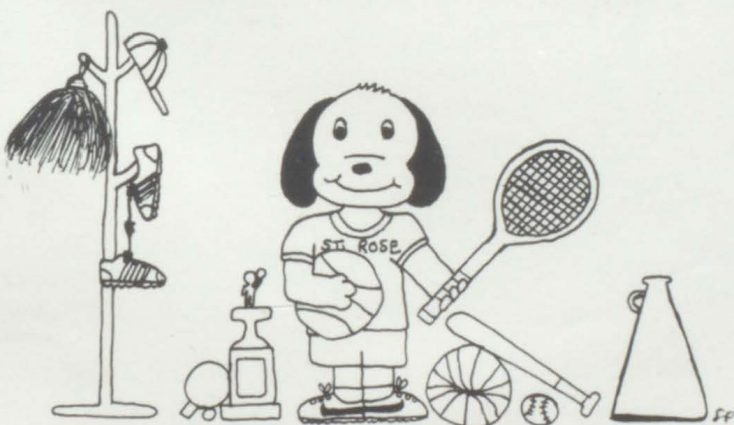
Gold and White and G.A.A. are two organizations that try to involve as many students as possible in sports around St. Rose. Rallies and cheers are very effective for morale within the school.

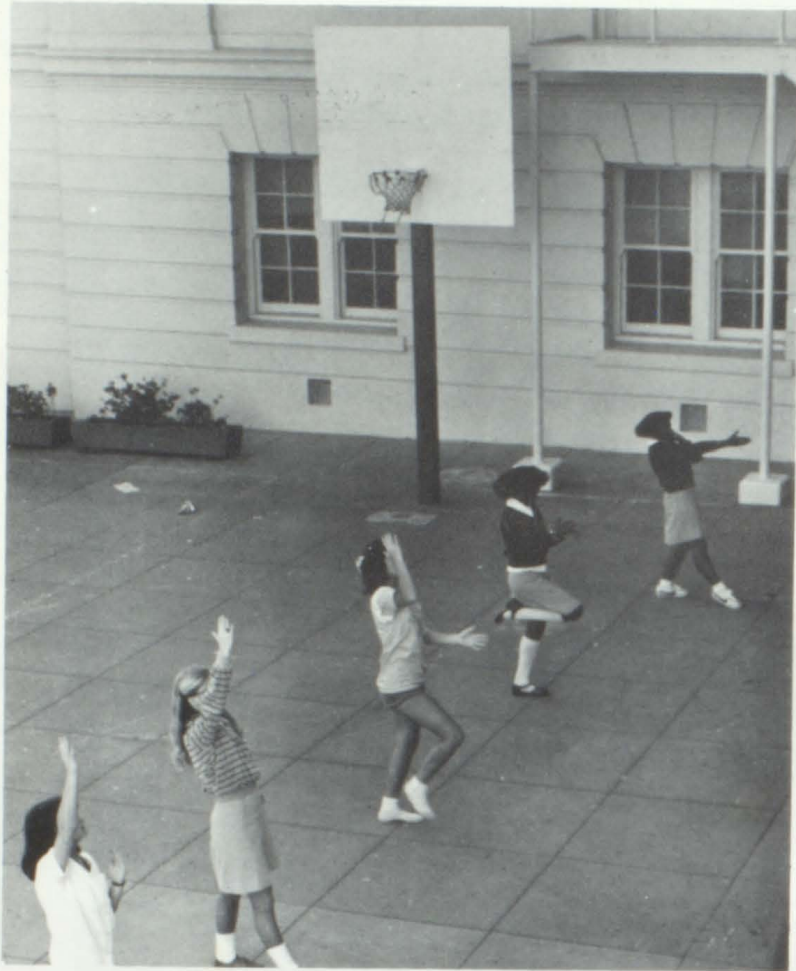

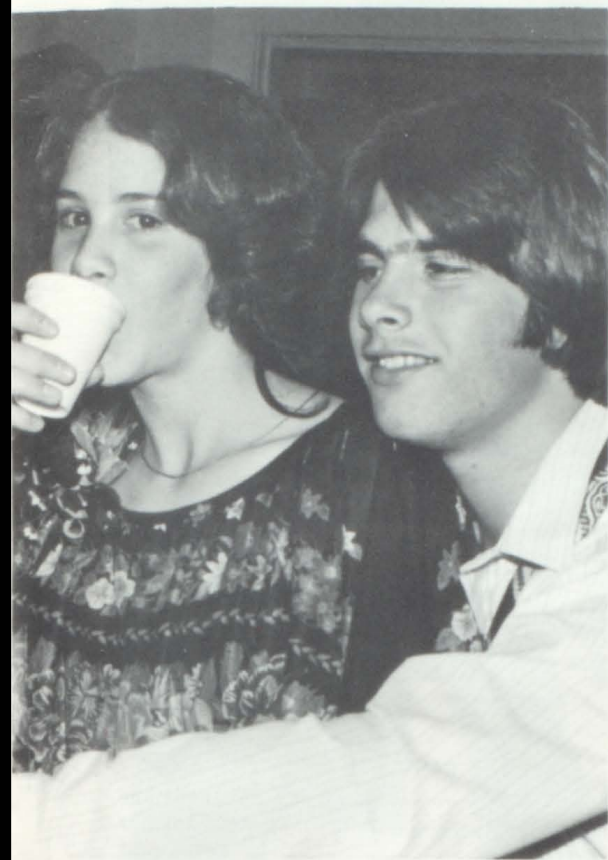
## Pine Tree Paradise

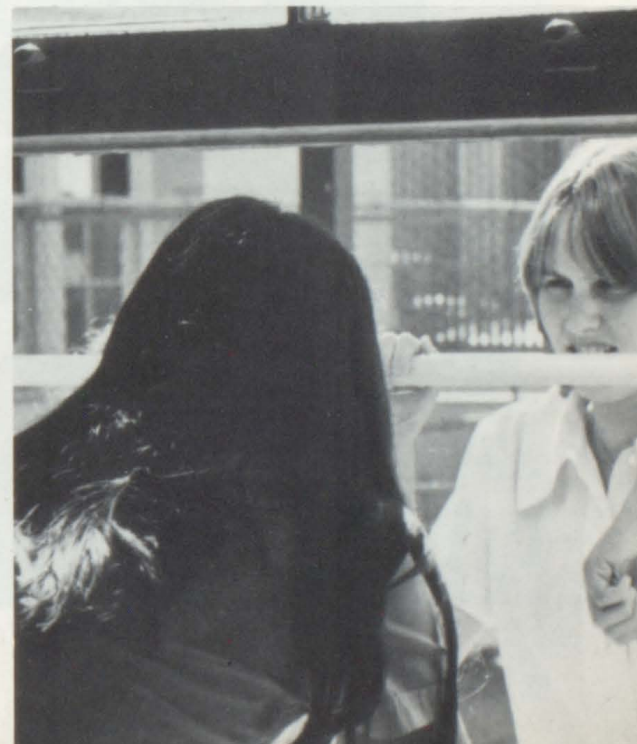


# CLASSES
