






Seniors Spank Junior and Birds Lose Also

Accompanied by Junior Red Cross sponsor Mrs. Judith Borcher, the team demonstrated first aid and basic health skills at schools, hospitals and villages, while

meeting and talking with African youth.

"I know basically I'm American," said Pat
Nicholson, "but when we were dancing in Dunpong, I
thought I was one of the Ghanains."

How do African youth dress? "The kids will wear Afro styles one day and the next day they'll wear their traditional African dress," said Nelson Coleman.

Mark Alexander, who was made an honorary Ashanti chief, said the Ghanaians were very friendly and they "DIG James Brown, Aretha Franklin and Jimi Hendrix.'

Money for the trip (\$10,500) was raised from contributions and special student projects.

"This is what a Christmas Assembly should be


like," said choir member Janice Cobb.










School Dances Few But Enjoyable





Progress in Student Government Told



Willie Davis

This year Wilson underwent a major change in student government. Instead of working under a Constitution, a new Charter system was voted in which gave students a real voice in students' happenings.

Under the new setup the principal granted students the power to rule in certain areas of school life, such as: budget, scheduling of events, and appointing the President's Cabinet. The Charter calls for the election of a President and Vice-President only, with the President selecting all other officers, who are responsible to him. Before, all officers were elected and were difficult to remove if they did not perform their duties.

After watching Willie Davis, Wilson's first "charter" president and first Junior president, and Timothy Barrow, it appears that student government at Wilson has come of age.





Warriors Miss Play-offs - But Not by Much


Coach Fil Jularbal summed up the season this way: "We were so close; and yet, so far from play-off chances."



quarterback Greg Jimenez were particularly outstanding.


The team led the league in both offense and defense.




Soccer Team Has Talent, Poor Record



Warriors Take All in AAA







Berkeley.





Baseballers Lose First Four


Prospects still looked dim for the varsity baseball team as April rolled around.

Faculty Takes Bowling Title


The faculty bowling team won the championship for the fall semester in the 22-team Faculty Bowling League.
