Stage sets were the work of the stagecraft class, and make-up was done by April Nieves and Sylvia Ojeda. Senior Jane Nieves was the stage manager.



Stage sets were done by the stagecraft class, and make-up responsibilities were shared by many.







In Play-offs -- A Winning Season



Wilson's 1970 Varsity Football Team had its second winning season in its eight year history and earned its second play-off berth. Small in size but big in spirit, Wilson became the quickest team in the league.

Poly was Wilson's first league competition and the Warriors emerged victorious, 14-6, as Bruce Rhodes plunged over from two yards out in the first quarter, and Gene Woodard scored later on a 16 yard run.

In the second game the Washington Eagles visited Wilson stadium to be smashed by the Green Machine, 26–14. Lincoln hosted the Warriors in the third game and stung the Warriors, 32–0. This was Wilson's first loss and the first time they had been shut out during the season.


Balboa next shut out the young Wilson team, 33–0. Defending champion Lowell the socked it to Wilson in a grueling battle, 21–12, after Wilson almost pulled the upset of the season.

As the Warriors went into the sixth game of the season against Mission they couldn't afford a loss if they were to earn a play-off berth. The Warriors shut out the Bears, 12–0. Thus Wilson's last game would determine whether the team would make the play-offs. Wilson hosted Galileo on a warm Saturday morning and at first it seemed as though it would be a long day as the Lions stunned the Warriors by scoring on their first drive. But Wilson rallied to defeat the Lions, 32–6.

Wilson placed four players on the All-City roster: Jerry Garcia, Gene Woodard, Allen Giovanetti, and Greg Johnwell.

The coach's choices were: Bruce Rhodes, outstanding player; Robert Starks, outstanding lineman; Gene Woodard, outstanding back.





The JVs led their league in both total offense and defense, allowing few points (an average of two touchdowns) while scoring in large clusters themselves.



Greg Dominguez and Andrew Lockwood pull the double-reverse, Results: a long gain for Wilson.










In the play-offs Wilson played the Poly Parrots. Though the Warriors played tough and led through most of the game, the outcome was disastrous, with the final

Bobby returned to the mound in the third game to face the defending champions, Lincoln, and he rose to the occasion by fashioning a five-hitter to prevail, 10-2.


The Warriors suffered their second one-run defeat of the season in


the fourth game when Mission sneaked past them, 5-4.


