
Natural Togetherness Characterized The School Year — '72-'73






KEST Radio Visited by Wilson Students

After the show, many phone calls complimenting the show were received at the station. As a result Woodrow Wilson was invited back to participate in another show






International Dancers Thrill Big Audience











Determination, Talent Turned Season Around

It would have been absurd to predict in September that Wilson's varsity football team would play for the City Championship in November.

The Warriors opened their regular season in September with a heartbreaking 8-0 loss to Lowell's Indians. In an attempt to rebuild morale, defensive coach Don Toomer gave the team a pep talk following the game. He concluded by saying, "Men, we will see them again."

Wilson rebounded with a 21-20 win over Washington. But then came the disappointing and humiliating loss to the Mission Bears, 26-0.

Still the Warriors came back with consecutive victories, blowing past Lincoln, 22-16, and outlasting stubborn Galileo, 6-0, scoring with 1:17 remaining in the game.


The Warriors could have cinched a play-off berth by whipping Balboa, but the Warriors got spanked, 21-20, and had to wait for Mission's romp over Galileo to get into the play-offs with a 3-3 record.

Again the Warriors came back in the play-off game to rock the once-beaten Bears, 6-2.

Play-Off Win on Brilliant Play In the Mud








Going into the play-off game the Warriors, with a 3-3 record, weren't given much of a chance against the Bears, with their 6-1 record. Also, the Bears had shut out the Warriors, 26-0, in their regular season encounter.

The only Mission score came on a blocked punt midway in the first quarter.

The Warriors scored the winning touchdown late in the fourth quarter, but had to stop two deep drives by Mission to protect victory.













Warriors Sweep To Round Robin Cage Title










Warriors Regained Eyes to Take Play-Off Crown


a shy 5 point loss to the Memorial big men.


The Warriors ended their season by defeating the Arroyo Dons for fourth place consolation of the tournament. Julius Bolds was named one


